FEDERAL AGENTS INVESTIGATE EXPLOSIVE THEFT

EAGLE RIVER: Federal agents are investigating a break-in at the storage bunker of Machine and Drill Steel Co. of Anchorage at the Eagle River Powder Magazine.

According to a spokesman for the Alaska State Troopers the theft of explosives is a federal offense.

The bunker was broken into sometime on July 21st or 22nd. Entry was gained by a vent in the ceiling of the bunker.

An unknown quantity of dyna-

mite and prima cord was removed from the bunker.

Authorities are inclined to think this was the work of juveniles, or someone unfamiliar with explosives; as evidence showed that an attempt had been made to set fire to the dynamite and prima cord.

If they had been successful it could have resulted in their being killed, or at best blinded or malmed. FAMILY SERVICE CENTER OPENS

EAGLE RIVER: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough has established a branch office in the Greater Chugiak

Area, with the first department to locate being the De-

partment of Enviornmental Quality.

The office will be located temporarily in the GOAL Center on Artillery Road. Mr. Hugh Burner of the Department of Enviornmental Quality will be in charge of this office.

This is one of the Borough Departments which would have been housed in the Community Center which was to have been established in Eagle River.

The Community Center project was shot down when no bank would lend the money to finance the project.

Local Borough Assemblyman Ed Willis stated that the community center project is still very much alive. He is working on a package whereby the Community Center will appear on the ballot at next October's election. He said the plan will be very carefully formulated in order to avoid all the pitfalls which caused the original plan

ed or matmed.

There have also been several reports of homes having been broken into and other acts of vandalism. The most extensive act of vandalism was experienced at the residence of George Ante on Pioneer Drive. While the family was away on a weekend outing, someone had thrown rocks through all the windows in the front of their house, incliding the basement windows.

The State Troopers were in formed of the latter incident and are investigating. Mrs. Ante stated that they had not touched the rocks which had come through their window in order that the State Troopers might be able to test them for fingerprints.

HOMES ARE SOUGHT FOR BOARDING STUDENTS

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area are being asked again this year to open their homes to high school aged students from remote villages.

Last year there were two dozen boarding home students attending Chugiak High School, most of them 9th graders.

So far this year, homes have been found for only 19 students, according to Andy Kirk, Chugiak High Teacher in charge of the project at the local school.

Kirk said that this year the State Boarding Home Program hopes to place about 30 students in this area. These homes would be for both boys and girls in grades 9, 10 and 11.

It is felt that the best situations developed where several boarding home students stayed in the same house.

Kirk explained that the program provides \$150.00 per

student per month. This has proved to be ample, but on the other hand is not intended to be a money making deal.

According to Kirklast years boarding home parents felt it was a worthwhile experience and most of them are planning to do it again this year. Many of the students this year will probably come from Chevak where the school burned down last year.
