

WILLIS FILES FOR RE-ELECTION TO BORO ASSEMBLY

HORSE KILLED WHEN HIT BY CAR ON BRIDGE

EAGLE RIVER: A horse which had wandered onto the Eagle River bridge in the early hours of the morning last Monday was killed instantly after being struck by two cars.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the horse was struck first by a car driven by Joel B. Ray who was northbound at the time.

The impact threw the animal into the path of a second car, driven by Becky Watts of Eagle River.

The accident took place at approximately 2:15am on Monday, August 28th.

The horse was directly on the bridge when struck by the cars.

Damage to one car was estimated at \$500. The other at \$150.

Becky Watts was taken to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Fire District ambulance where she was treated for cuts and bruises.

One fire truck from Eagle River responded to direct traffic at the scene.

State Troopers had not as yet learned the identity of the owner of the horse. The animal was described only as being brown in color and wearing a halter.

STATE TROOPERS TO CONDUCT CONTACT PROGRAM

ANCHORAGE: The Alaska State Troopers have announced that they are going to conduct a "Contact" program again this year.

This program, which was begun in July of 1971, was to aid the troopers in investigation in areas not within the jurisdiction of the Anchorage City police.

Businessmen in this area were contacted and given a questionnaire which asked for such information as the location of doors or windows in the establishment, the location of burglar alarms, who to contact in the case of a break-in or burglary, etc. Questionnaires will again be sent to the same businessmen and to others who may not have been included last year.

Any businessman who was not included in the contact program last year, and who would like to participate in it at this time, is asked to call the Alaska State Troopers at 272-1561 and a copy of the questionnaire will be mailed to them.

STATE PROVIDES FREE TUITION AT PRIVATE COLLEGE

SITKA: Alaskan students attending Sheldon Jackson College in Sitka will be eligible for free tuition under terms of recently passed state scholarship grant legislation.

The accredited two year private college has a tuition of \$975 per year, which is well within the limits of the formula for student assistance based on the costs of educating a student at the State University.

For students who can demonstrate the need for full tuition it will mean that they can attend Sheldon Jackson College for the costs of fees, and if necessary, room and board still much less than they would pay elsewhere.

Dr. Orin R. Stratton, President of the two-hundred student college said that he expected a number of students to make use of the state's new grant program.

He said, "This is one of the finest things a state can do for it's citizens - now a student can choose the close personal atmosphere of a small private college at or below the cost of state education. It's a boon for students who have wanted to attend a private liberal arts college at or below the cost of state education. Sheldon Jackson offers Aviation, Forestry, Fishery and Wildlife Management, Education, Data Processing, Business Administration, Logging Management and Secretarial Science.

College officials said that applications are still being accepted but warned that quick action by students was necessary since the state was processing the grant applications in the order received.

Although a fairly large amount was appropriated for the grant program, it is not expected to cover all grant applications.

BACK TO SCHOOL

ANCHORAGE: Colonel M.E. Dankworth, Director of the Alaska State Troopers, reminds all motorists that today is the first day of school in most areas of the State.

This is the first school experience for many children, some of whom will be walking to school or riding bikes as well as arriving on the bus.

To provide safety, more crossing guards have been added in many areas, as well

DRIVER INJURED IN MILE 21 COLLISION

BIRCHWOOD: The most recent collision at the intersection of North Birchwood Loop and the New Glenn Highway sent one driver to Providence Hospital with multiple injuries.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Thomas G. Gibboney, of Anchorage, driving a 1967 Chevrolet had stopped and was preparing to turn left onto North Birchwood Loop.

He was struck in the rear by 1964 Ferrari, driven by Ralph R. Stefano of Anchorage, who was unable to stop in time to avoid the collision.

Damage to Gibboney's car was estimated at \$1,500. The Ferrari sustained an estimated \$3,000 damage according to the Alaska State Troopers.

Stefano was cited for failing to keep a safe distance.

The injured man was transported to the hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. ambulance.

ANTLERLESS MOOSE SEASON CANCELLED

ANCHORAGE: The antlerless moose season and permits in Subunits 13B and 13C have been cancelled, the Alaska Department of Fish and Game announced today.

Ron Somerville, regional game supervisor in Anchorage said that current information indicated that moose survival during the past severe winter was not adequate to warrant an antlerless season this year.

Snow fall in the Nelchina Basin last winter was one of the heaviest on record, he added.

Hunters holding permits for 13B and 13C will be allowed to apply for antlerless seasons in other units when permits are available later this year.

PARACHUTING TO BE SEPT. 2

Sky Diving will be featured at 3 p.m. Saturday September 2 at the Alaska State Fair Inc., events at the Palmer Fairgrounds. Two lifts of five men each are scheduled to jump, using smoke in their free falls to be better visible from the ground. With the Horse Show scheduled for most of the day, followed by Dog Cart Races in the evening, and live music promised by local musicians at the Bandstand, a full day can be planned by the visitor. Since the vegetables and crops are to be a new batch, newly judged the day before, the exhibits will be fresh to the out-of-town visitor. The abundance of rides and concessions ought to keep the whole family happy all day.

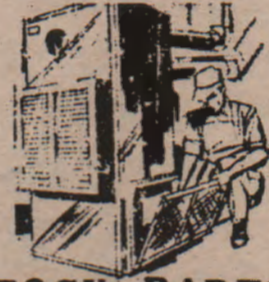

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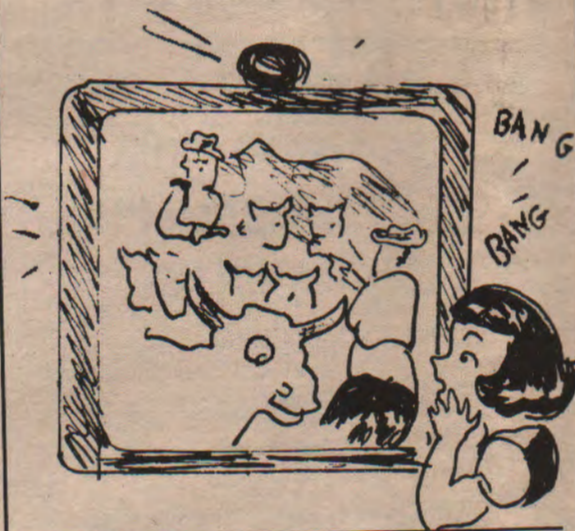

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Alaskans Donate \$8,500 In Fund To Aid Teenager

Alaska State Troopers, businessmen and private citizens from all parts of the state have, during the past months, donated a total of \$8,500 to aid a state trooper's son who was injured in a car accident last spring.

The donations are for Pat Shafer, 18-year-old son of Lt. Ralph Shafer, commander of the Fairbanks detachment of Alaska State Troopers.

The boy received head injuries April 24 in Ketchikan and has been in a coma and undergoing intensive care since.

Following the accident several people began contributing to aid the Shafer family and the Ralph Shafer

Fund was set up by the Fraternal Order of Alaska State Troopers.

Troopers say they have now received a total of \$8,500 for the fund. The largest part of this was \$6,292.03 raised during a benefit show in Fairbanks earlier this month.

Lt. Shafer had served as detachment commander in Ketchikan and patrol sergeant in Anchorage before being assigned as the detachment commander in Fairbanks.

He said he wanted to express his appreciation to all who have been so generous in their aid and sympathy to his family.

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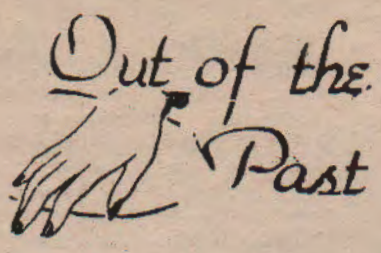

For a growing number of Americans, retirement is not becoming a reality. Despite increased Social Security benefits in recent years, steadily increasing inflation is forcing senior citizens to seek continued employment.

How serious is the problem? William A. Reasoner, president and chief executive officer of Wadell & Reed, Inc., a Kansas City-based national financial services complex, says: "There are currently more than 2.5 million persons over 65 years of age in the labor force—about 65 per cent of these working full-time." Reasoner's company manages and sponsors the United Funds, Inc. and United Continental group of mutual funds, with assets of approximately \$2.7 billion and more than 500,000 shareholder accounts.

A recent study shows that the average person over 65, working full-time, year-around, can expect

to earn roughly \$7,000 today. As a part-time worker, he can earn roughly \$3,200. "These income levels," Reasoner says, "if combined with Social Security and pension benefits, can provide a comfortable income, the chance to travel and the opportunity to enjoy social events without the worry of strict budgeting."

The problem he says, is that many retired persons are not able to work because of health problems or other factors. "This brings the frightening prospect of trying to live on a fixed income while prices for food, medical and other requirements continue to increase."

With the future certain to bring an increasing number of older persons—and fewer young jobholders to support social programs—there will be a dramatic increase in the need for adequate business and personal pension programs, Reasoner concludes.


