HORSE KILLED WHEN HIT BY CAR ON BRIDGE

A horse EAGLE RIVER: which had wandered onto the Eagle River, bridge in the early hours of the morning last Monday was killed instantly after being struck by two cars.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the horse was struck first by a car driven by Joel B. Ray who was northbound at the time. The impact threw the an-

imal into the path of a second car, driven by Becky Watts of Eagle River.

The accident took place at approximately 2:15am on Monday, August 28th.

The horse was directly on the bridge when struck by the cars.

Damage to one car was estimated at \$500. The other at \$150,

Becky Watts was taken to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Fire District ambulance where she was treated for cuts and bruises.

One fire truck from Eagle River responded to direct

STATE PROVIDES **FREE TUITION** AT PRIVATE COLLEGE

SITKA: Alaskan students at-tending Sheldon Jackson Col-lege in Sitka will be eligible for free tuition under terms of recently passed state scholarship grant legislation.

The accredited two year private college has a tuition of \$975 per year, which is well within the limits of the formula for student assistance based on the costs of educating a student at the State University.

For students who can demonstrate the need for full tuition it will mean that they can attend Sheldon Jackson College for the costs of fees, and if necessary, room and board still much less than they

would pay elsewhere. Dr. Orin R. Stratton, President of the two-hundred student college said that he expected a number of students to make use of the state's new grant program. He said, "This is one of

the finest things a state can do for it's citizens - now a student can choose the close personal atmosphere of a small private college at or below the cost of state educ-It's a boon for stuation. dents who have wanted to attend a private liberal arts college at or below the cost of state education. Sheldon Jackson offers Aviation, Forestry, Fishery and Wildlife Management, Education, Data Processing, Business Ad-ministration, Logging Manministration, agement and Secretarial Sc-

ience. College officials said that apfacations are still being accepted but warned that gick action by students was necwssary since the state was ng the grant applications in the order received. Although a fairly large amount was appropriated for the gtant program, it is not exp-ected t cover all grant applications.



Stefano was cited for falling to keep a safe distance.

The injured man was transported to the hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. ambulance.





Alaskans Donate \$8.500 In Fund To Aid Teenager

Alaska State Troopers, businessmen and private citizens from all parts of the state have, during the past months, donated a total of \$8,500 to aid a state trooper's son who was injured in a car accident last spring.

The donations are for Pat Shafer, 18-year-old son of Lt. Ralph Shafer, commander of the Fairbanks detachment of Alaska State Troopers.

The boy received head injuries April 24 in Ketchikan and has been in a coma and undergoing intensive care since.

Following the accident several people began contributing to aid the Shafer family and the Ralph Shafer

Fund was set up by the Fraternal Order of Alaska State Troopers.

Troopers say they have now received a total of \$8,500 for the fund. The largest part of this was \$6,292.03 raised during a benefit show in Fairbanks earlier this month. Lt. Shafer had served as

detachment commander in Ketchikan and patrol sergeant in Anchorage before being assigned as the detachment commander in Fairbanks.

He said he wanted to express his appreciation to all who have been so generous in their aid and sympathy to his family.



HORSE SHOW LISTS 14 TROPHIES





My problem concerns a close friend. In the past, before I decided to open my shop, I helped her do over several pieces.


The other day she mentioned that she had picked up this chair at the auction and wants me to help her re-upholster it.


CLOTHING STORE MOVES TO NEW LOCATION


