BIRCHWOOD GIRL SERIOUSLY HURT IN FALL FROM TRUCK

OLD CHUGIAK: A 16 year old Birchwood girl is in critical condition following a fall from the back of a pick-up truck in which she was reported to have been riding.

Mary French, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elden Freuch of Bowery Lane in Birchwood was transported to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the ambulance of the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company.

She was then transferred to Providence Hospital where she was found to be suffering from extensive head injuries and was placed in the intensive care unit.

The accident took place on Friday, August 4th at 7:12pm at Mile 18 on the Old Glenn Highway.

The name of the driver of the truck, and the cause of the fall are not known at this time.

Willis said that several factors will influence his decision. Primarily there are personal considerations and the wishes of his family, also there are the many years he has devoted to his career in Civil Service. The office of Borough Mayor is a full time job, and he would have to resign from his job at Ft. Rich ardson if he were elected.

Also, Willis is up for reelection as Assemblyman for Section 1 of the Greater An chorage Area Borough. He feels his first allegiance is to this area and would have to fall are not known at this time.

candidate night" was sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce in hopes that it might help dispel some of this confusion as well as letting the voters get a look at the candidates and learn in the three minutes allotted to each one, his or her stands on the issues.

Lee Jordan, of the Board of Directors for the Chamber of Commerce acted as Master of Ceremonies, Moderator and at times referee for the meeting.

Before introducing the candidates he took advantage of their captive stalus to give them a brief rundown of the local problems which, the Chamber has been trying to find solutions to during the past two and a half years of it's existance.

These included lack of police protection, road maintenance, concern over manditory unification, unhappiness over the recent reapportionment which split the area and the hopes of getting a road link with Girdwoodover Crow pass through Chugach State Park.

Jordan pointed out that the present population of the Greater Chugiak Area is approximately 7,500 with a 15% to 20% annual growth potential to a projected 27,000 by 1990, according to a study made by the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

Each candidate was then allowed three minutes in which o speak to the audience, for some this was bearly time to get warmed up, and for others it appeared to be too long.

Candidates were called at randam, as their names were drawn from a box.

A prime area of concernexpressed by a majority of the candidates was the need for

BILL ARMSTRONG IS TOP VOTE GETTER AT MTA

ELECTION

PALMER: It was Chugiak night at the Annual MTA meeting in Palmer, with William Armstrong, of Eagle River garnering the most vote and winning the three year seat to the Board of Directors, and O.W. "Bill" Lowe, of Peters Creek winning the Grand Door Prize, an 18 inch color TV set.

Armstrong, who had been swept into office with a total of 78 votes as compared to the next highest candidate, incumbent Paul Hupper, of the Butte who tallied 69 votes

A total of 179 members had

Membership Me ting and Electim. The other two candidates from the Greater Chugiak Area, Gerald O'Conner and Robert Thomas were far down on the list with 32 and 3 votes re pectively.

Those at the meeting said that they had voted for Armstrong because they had been impres ed by his technical background in the field of communications, which he had outlined in his remarks prior to the election

It was the opinion. I some of those present that the outcome of the meeting had been undiubtedly affected by the train disaster near Houston which prevented the candidates and members from Big Lake, Willow, Houston and Talkeetna from getting to the meeting.

In addition to the election of directors, the membership approved all three ammendments to the By-Laws.

In his address to the membership Paul Huppert, president of the Board, thanked the Bard, Management and Staff members for their services during the past year, which he pointed out had been a challenging and difficult one.

He cited the steps which MTA has taken to correct some of the problems, such as a complete engineering and feasibility study to update and revise it's Area Coverage dedign. Also he told of the steps which were being taken to join the Rural Telephone Bank, an organi ation which will be a major source of Association funding in the future.

He compared the cutover to Direct Distance Dialing and the Eagle River to Anchorage microwave system as ex-

amples of poor cooperation in the case of the former and proper cooperation in the case of the latter.

In his report, Manager Max Clements, dwelt on the growth of MTA since it began in 1957 with approximately 400 subscribers as compated with the almost 5,000 telephones in service today.

He pointed out that the Eagle River exchange has 1108 of the e phones and the Chugiak exchange 844 for a total of 1,952 which is more than 300 more phones than the next largest area, which is Pauner with 1,658. This is also 878 phone more than the total of 1,074 which represents the phone in service in the remaining exchange of the system.

He told of proopsed additions to the Chuglak, Eagle
River and Palmer exchanges
and of plans to purchase two
radio facilities to provide
scriber service to remote
areas such as the Trapper
Creek-Petersville area accross the river from Talke-tna and to the McKinley
Park Hotel Complex area,

Asplund's announcement today that he would not seek reelection was accompanied by the following statement.

"As a citizen vitally interested in the future of the Anchorage community and the State of Alaska, and having had the privilege of serving three terms as Borough Chairman, I now find myself at a crossroad."

"After nine years as Chairman, I have decided not to seek election as Anchorage Borough Mayor in the October election."

"The decision was not easy but frankly, I would like to do a few things for myself and my family. I do not plan to retire, only change what I have been doing. I have had a tremendous challenge in being able to build a completely new government into a viable and proven effective approach in solving problems on an area-wide basis."

"I will leave ofnce in October feeling that the Anchorage Borough is launched and that at least we leave a cleaner community for those who follow."

"My staff has done an excellent job as well as the dedicated employees to whom I can say 'Thank you' for serving well."

A"After leaving office, I intend to keep an active interest in the Anchorage Community as Alaska will always be my home. I leave with a feeling of good will towards everyone in the Greater Anchorage Area Borough."

LOCAL VOTING PLAN STILL UP IN THE AIR

CHUGIAK: Voting arrangements for the reapportioned Greater Chugiak Area are still pretty much up in the air with the Election Supervisors office trying to iron out the wrinkles in e-tablishing polling places, and finding a way to let residents know in which area they will be voting.

While there is no provlem for voters in Eagle River and Eagle River Valley precincts, who, as in the past will vote at the Eagle River Element ary School, those in Chuglak, the new Fire Lake Precinct and Birchwood Precinct are likely to be confised, particularly those living at the fringe areas and who are un certain whether they are in House District 9 or 6.

The Election Supervisor is in the process of drawing up an official map, and have promised to make it available to the Courier to be printed in next week's issue.

The new Fire Lake Precinct will vote at Chugiak High School as will the Chugiak Precinct. Tentatively the Birchwood Precinct will vote at the Birchwood Elementary School. A polling place for the Peters Creek Precinct has not been announced.

All Star teams for Eagle River and Birchwood-Chugiak are now practicing for the event, according to a spokes man for the local Girls Softball Association.

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

ARSON ELIMINATED AS CAUSE OF

OLD CHUGIAK: Arson was eliminated as the cause of a brush fire which was reported near Chugiak Gardens in Old Chugiak this week.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company has suspected arson when they were called out on three seperate occasions to fight the fire at this location each time after they were convinced that it had been completely extinguished.

It was after the third call that they discovered that traces of the fire was con tinuing to smolder under the moss, only to break out into flames again.

A spokesman for the Fire Company stated that if the fire should start up again after the last attempt to bring it under control, they would have to bring in a bulldo er to dig out all traces of the inflammable moss.

HOMES ARE SOUGHT FOR U.J BOARDING STUDENTS

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area are being asked again this year to open their homes to high school aged students from remote villages.

Last year there were two dozen boarding home students ool, most of them 9th graders. mation.

So far this year, homes have been found for only 19 students, according to Andy Kirk. Chugiak High Teacher in charge of the project at the local school.

Kirk said that this year the State Boarding Home Program hopes to place about 30 students in this area. These homes would be for both boys and girls in grades 9, 10 and 11.

It is felt that the best situations developed where several boarding home students stayed in the same house.

Kirk explained that the program provides \$150.00 per student per month. This has proved to be ample, but on the other hand is not intended to be a money making deal.

According to Kirk last years boarding home parents felt it was a worthwhile experience and most of them are planning to do it again this year. Many of the students this year will



CANDIDATE CONCERNED ABOUT HIGH PROPERTY TAXES

WASILLA: High real property taxe, and legistlation to bring them more in line with the ability t pay, are the principal concern of Rose Palmquist of Wasilla candidate to the State House of Representatives from District 6.

Mrs. Palmquist says that there are a number of ways by which this can be accomplished, and this will be one of her goals if she is elected.

SHORT HUNTING SEASON SEEN

Restrictions in the caribou hunting season in the Nelchina Basin have been announced by the Department of Fish and Game after a recent aerial photo census turned up fewer animals than expected.

The new hunting season for Game Management Units 11, 13 and 14 will be from Aug. 10-Sept. 20, with a bag limit of one caribou per hunter.

Ron Somerville, Anchorage regional game supervisor, said the cut-back in the hunting season was being made until the Fish and Game Department could make an assessment of the population status of caribou in the Nelchina Basin, and could determine how many caribou the range should support.

Somerville said although an exact count has not yet been made from the photo census, preliminary indications are that the Nelchina caribou population is down.

Department biologists were able to census the herd for the first time since 1967. Unfavorable weather conditions had prevented previous attempts.

Earlier this year, the Board of Fish and Game acted to shorten the caribou season to end on Dec. 31 from a previous closing date of March 31. Somerville said that although the new seasons may be conservative, he feels they are warranted until researchers can obtain a complete picture of the Nelchina hero.




