The meeting has been scheduled for Thursday, September 28th, at 7:30pm at Cnugiak High School in the multipurpose Room.



BUTTE: The residents of the Butte near Palmer have requested assistance in getting the Department of Highways to make certain changes in signs at the approaches of the old Knik River Bridge.

William B. Barnhardt, a businessman in the Butte area has enlised the aid of Bob Kallenberg of Chugiak, candidate to the State House of Representatives, and Harold Bartko, candidate to the State Senale, both Repbulicans, in getting the Highway Department to change the signs which are now posted.

According to Kallenberg, who personally has inspected the signs, the first sign on the Glenn Highway alternate, reads simply, "Dangerous bridge ahead..9 miles", no more. Nine mile further down the road, right at the approach to the bridge is the sign which indicates that the bridge is dangerous only when the load exceeds the restriction of 3 ton, single axle or 4 ton double axle.

Banhardt and other Butte residents feel that the first sign is misleading, and has caused many tourists to turn back at the sign, before they can learn that the bridge is perfectly safe to passenger vehicles and light trucks.

They are asking that the sign giving the load limit of the bridge be placed at the sag

ANCHORAGE: Residents of the Old Chugiak, Birchwood and Peters Creek areas will still vote in the Anchorage Borough Election, according to Borough Clerk, Mary Nettleton.

Ms. Nettleton said some confusion exists among the residents of those precincts because of the reapportionment which placed them in State legislative District 6 for the Primary and General Election in November.

Reapportionment did not pertain to the Borough Boundaries, only to State Election Districts, she said. Although residents of the above listed areas voted in the Mat-Su Legislative district, they are not in the Mat-Su Borough, but still in the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, just as in past years.

COMMUNITY CENTER EXPLAINED

TO CHAMBER

EAGLE RIVER: The proposition which would authorize the Borough Assembly to provide a Community Center Building for the Greater Chugiak Area, was explained to the local Chamber of Commerce last Monday at their regular meeting.

Ed Pysher, Staff Director for the Greater Auchorage Area Borough addressed the Chamber and attempted to answer questions on the subject.

According to Pysher, the votcrs will be asked to authorize the Assembly to use whatever method they deem advisable to them. This could include lease-purchase of an existing building, bonding or obtaining a loan from the FhA or a bank.

Pysher said that this would not be paid through a mill levy, but that rental of the offices in the building would defray the debt and pay for the upkeep of the building.

The amount that the voters are asked to authorize the Assembly to spend for the building is \$350,000.00.

Pysher said that the building would not be a Community Ceuter in the sense that it would be available for meeting space for local organizations. Rather it is planned as a means of housing local offices of the Borough under one roof. These would include the Department of Health, the Department of Enviornmental Quality, Animal Control, as Well as providing housing for equipment and personnel for the Fire Department. Voters in both Service Districts 9 and 8 (Chugiak and Eagle River) will be asked to approve the proposition.

Pysher said that the chance that the rental from the building would not meet cost of defraying the debt and upkeep and that the residents of the area might be taxed to make up the difference as "practically nonexistant".

VICTORY FINALLY COMES TO MUSTANGS






EAGLE RIVER; The enrollment at the Eagle River Elementary School is now up to 364 students, according to Mr. J. B. Whitmore, Principal.







LAND BUYERS ARE WARNED

ANCHORAGE: An increasing number of individuals who have open to entry sites are listing them for sale with local realtors or are running advertisements in the newspapers.

Some are asking \$4,000 to \$5,000 for a site with no improvements of any kind, and on which a filing fee of \$10.0 and a few years of annurental of \$40.00 per year has been paid.

The individual buying one of these sites will be faced with the requirement of having it surveyed at his own expense and at his own initiative within ten years of the original effective date of the lease, then paying the appraised value of the land at the time of the original entry.

The Division of Lands has noted one "ad" that stated that two fresh water streams ran through the site which also had 400 feet of other water frontage on one side. If the two fresh water streams have wager flowing or frozen within the banks year round, there is danger that the individual buying the site will find himself with very little land when the survey is made.

The maximum water frontage allowed by law is 400 feet.

In this case both sides of each creek could qualify as water frontage as well as the 400 feet on one side as descrived in the entry which would greatly reduce the acerage allowed.

A case of this kind was adjudicated recently by the Division of Lands when a surveyor found creeks on an entry site which also had 400 feet of lake frontage. The entryman was given the choice of taking about an acre of his original with 400 feet of water frontage or cancelling his lease and selecting another site. He chose to cancel the lease.


