BIRCHWOOD: A public meeting, to enable local voters to meet the candidates for the school board has been firmed up for Thursday, September 28th, at Chugiak High School.

All of the school board candidates have been invited to attend this meeting and to be introduced to the voters from the Greater Chugiak Area.

Sponsors of the meeting are asking that anyone with questions that they would like to have put to the candidates call Natalie Brooks, who is coordinating the meeting, and she will add them to a list which she is preparing.

THE BUTTE: A letter to the Commissioner of Highways concerning misleading signs at the approaches of the old Knik Bridge drew prompt action, according to Bob Kallenberg, one of the authors of the letter.

Kallenberg, a candidate to the State House of Representatives from District 6, said that a sign designating the safe load limits of the bridge has been placed beside the "Dangerous bridge" sign located nine miles from the bridge approach on the Alternate Glenn Highway.

Businesses in the Butte Area had enlisted the aid of Kallenberg, and Harold Bartko, (candidate to the State Senate) asking that something be done about the signs which they felt were discouraging tourists from proceeding beyond the sign which warned of the dangerous bridge, without explaining that the danger existed only if certain load limits were exceeded.

In addition to posting the new sign, a Public Hearing has been scheduled at which time Butte area residents will have the opportunity to voice their complaints in person to Department of Highway officials.

The Hearing has been scheduled for Thursday, September 28th at 7:30pm at the Butte Fire Hall.

ACTIVITY BUS

BIRCHWOOD: An after school activity bus is being sponsored by K&E Bus Lines to enable students at Chugiak Junior-Senior High School to participate in after school activities and then ride a bus home.

The cost for riding the bus is 25¢ per day, and tickets will be sold in blocks of as few as 4 rides and as many as 40 rides. These will be sold at the High School office each morning before school starts.

There will be two busses, one serving the students who live in Fire Lake and Eagle River Areas, and one to serve those in Birchwood, Old Chugiak and Peters Creek.

The Eagle River bus will depart the school at 4:30pm each day and the other at 4:45pm.

Mr. Knight explained that he feels that an after school activity bus is much needed to enable many students to participate in those activities who otherwise would be unable to because of lack of transportation. Also this will relieve many parents of the necessity of driving to the school every evening to pick up their children.

Last year the PTA attempted to sponsor an activity bus this was not too successful, due to the fact that not enough students rode the bus to pay for the expense of operating it.

This year, Mr. Knight explained, approximately 50% of the expense of operating the busses will be covered by the Anchorage Borough School

The name Babische is Athabaskan, and is what they call the twine which they use to bind their snowshoes with. It is symbolic of the yearbook's traditional role in binding the individual to their high school memories.

"Everyone on the staff has really been working hard to come up with new ideas," says Babische's editor, Roxy Knecht. "We don't want this year's book to be something put away to gather dust. It's going to be something that all of us can really remember school by."

The staff has come up with some new ideas. Added is a new academics section to deal with classes and in-school activities. Over fifty pages of color will include shots of choir and band outdoors in concert form. Track, graduation the wrestling tourn

ament, and other events which take place too late to get in the yearbook will be featured in a summer supplement. The cost of this supplement will be included in the price of the book and will be ready before school next year.

These new additions, plus the fact that the book will be college-size (9x12) and consist of over 200 pages, cost money.

Denis Yarbrough, advertising manager says, "Even though we will be charging eight dollars a book that won't take care of our costs. I hope that the businesses in this area will support our new ideas and now all we need is money to make this one of the "All American" yearbooks in the country."

The cow, Alaska leader for milk and fat production in the 2 1/2 to 3 year old class, brought \$1,350 at the auction, reported Arthur L. Brundage professor of animal science in the university's dairy cattle research program here.

Brundage said Kerttula informed him his family planned to establish a small registered breeding herd and Alaska Ormsby Perfection would be one of the foundation animals for the herd.

Programmed School Input", cept, a recruit can be guaranteed a specific school assignment of his choice upon completion of an initial duty assignment.
