

FIRE DAMAGES HOME IN EAGLE RIVER

HEARING ON NEW KNIK BRIDGE POSTPONED

THE BUTTE: The public hearing which was to consider the construction of a replacement for the old Knik River bridge has been postponed.

The meeting, originally scheduled for Thursday, September 28th will be held instead on Thursday, October 5th, at which time Commissioner of Highways, Bruck Campbell is expected to be in the area.

The Highway Department has requested emergency replacement funds from the Federal Government, and is asking for supportive facts on the importance of that portion of the Old Glenn Highway.

Bob Kallenberg, of Chugiak, a candidate for the State House of Representatives from District 6, stated that the present bridge, which was constructed in 1936 under the jurisdiction of the old Alaska Road Commission is deteriorating to the point where repairs are too costly.

The Homecoming game will be played on Saturday at 8pm in the Anchorage Football Stadium against West High.

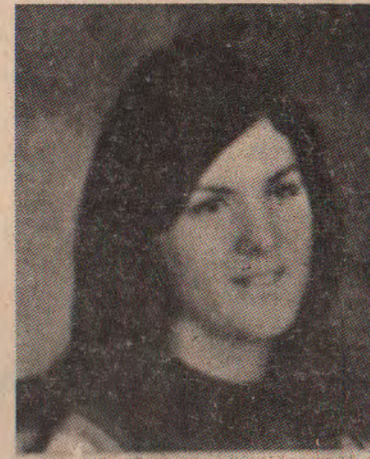

EAGLE RIVER: A three bed room frame dwelling on Park Place in Eagle River was heavily damaged by fire on Saturday, September 23rd.

The Eagle River Fire Department received the call at 10:18pm, and arrived to find the building in flames.

The house was owned by the Ernest L. Dennis family.

There was no one at home at the time the fire broke out, according to a spokesman for the Fire Department.

Damage to the \$30,000 home was estimated at \$20,000.00.

Fire gutted the kitchen, living room and one bedroom of the building, with smoke damage to the remainder of the rooms. The fire which was believed to have been caused by faulty electrical wiring, apparently started in the kitchen.

Fiberboard paneling was believed to have been the cause of the rapid spread of the flames to the rest of the house.

An engine and tanker plus a pumper from the Muldoon Fire Station responded to the call.

The loss was covered by insurance according to a spokesman for the Fire Department.

The present load limits prohibit fire trucks from the Butte Fire Company to use the structure. The Butte Fire Company is responsible with serving the Goat Creek area. Also school buses can not use the bridge. Kallenberg also pointed out that the bridge is the only way that residents can leave the area in time of flooding.

Cost of building a replacement for the bridge has been estimated at 4 50 5 million dollars.

The public hearing will take place at 7:30pm at the Butte Fire Hall on Plumley Road, next to the Barnhardt mill.

BELL PROPOSES SOLUTION TO TEACHER DISPUTE

ANCHORAGE: Kenneth Bell, of Eagle River, a candidate for a three year seat to the Anchorage School Board, last night proposed a solution to the dispute with the teachers which triggered the walkout last spring, and which threatens another walkout in November.

Bell made known his seven point program to a meeting of the school board this Tuesday.

His plan consists of seven steps, starting with (1) Calling an Executive Session of the School Board, (2) Inviting a Committee of the ABEA and also Chuck Wingrove, who had acted as intermediate in the previous dispute, (3) To review the mediation report

MEN UNHURT IN FALL FROM CLIFF

EKLUTNA: Two Anchorage men escaped without serious injury following a fall from the cliff above Thunderbird Falls last Sunday afternoon.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Thomas Kimble, and Chris P. Fedele, both of Lake Otis Parkway had slipped and fallen from the cliff.

Fedele managed to catch himself on a ledge about fifty feet below the top, and climb back up to safety, however, Kimble fell all the way to the water below the falls, and was pulled out by fellow campers.

He was transported to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company ambulance, where he was found to be suffering from only minor cuts and bruises and from chill.

In previous years there have been instances where persons had fallen to their death from the slippery rocks at the falls.

BOROUGH ELECTION INFORMATION

CHUGIAK: Residents of all precincts in the Greater Chugiak Area will go to the polls next Tuesday, October 3rd, to vote in the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Election.

This includes those in the Chugiak, Birchwood and Peters Creek precincts, despite the fact that they voted in the Mat Su legislative district in the primary election.

Following are the location of the polling places: Eagle River and Eagle River Valley precincts, Eagle River Elementary School. Fire Lake and Birchwood precincts, at Chugiak High School. Chugiak Precinct at the Chugiak Elementary School and the Peters Creek precinct at the Peters Creek Chapel at Mile 21 1/2 Glenn Highway.

The polls will open at 8am and close at 8pm.

Voting at this election will be on the punch card ballots, which will be counted by the computer at the data processing department of the Anchorage School District.

Borough Clerk, Mary Nettleton said that all the ballots should all be counted and

the returns completed by 10:30pm on Tuesday. However she pointed out, this could be delayed if voters should vote for write-in candidate Joan Asplund by pasting prepared stickers with his name printed on them on the punch card ballots. The stickers will prevent the computers from accepting the cards and they would then have to be processed by hand which would slow down the count considerably. Ms. Nettleton pointed out that the ballots provide a space for names to be written in, and when the name is written in with a pencil, this does not interfere with the function of the computer. She has recommended that those who wish to vote for the write in candidate use pencil.

Issues which will appear on the ballots in this area are:

Three school board candidates to be elected for three year terms, one candidate to the school board to be elected for a one year term; a borough Assemblyman from Section one, and Borough Mayor.

There are thirty candidates running for the three year

school board seats. Of the thirty, three are residents of the Greater Chugiak Area. These are Ken Bell, Clarence McGrane and Robert Rogers. Of the ten candidates for the one year term, none are local residents.

Incumbent Assemblyman Ed Willis is unopposed in his bid for re election.

Thirteen candidates are vying for the office of Borough Mayor. Since the Mayor must get at least 40% of the votes cast to be elected, a runoff election for this office is very likely.

Also on the local ballot, the voters of Service Area 8 (Chugiak) will elect one member to the Board of Supervisors. Incumbent William

(Buck) Ramsey is the only candidate for this office.

Voters in Service Areas 8 and 9 (Eagle River) will also vote on whether to authorize the Assembly to construct a \$350,000.00 Government Office Building to house local borough offices in this area.

The ballot will also have four areawide propositions.

Proposition "A" will authorize a new service, that of public transportation, at a mill levy of .4 mills for the years of 73-73, 74-75, and 75-76.

Proposition "B", this is

Major emphasis was on the all year school", Bell said. Ball pointed out that in fact only 1/5, or eight pages or the thirty two page report is concerned with the all year school issue.

He went into detail of the issues the remaining thirty two pages recommended.

These deal with additional emphasis in reading and math, Individual instruction, More useable high school curriculum, increased responsibility for principals; Expanded teacher training, Expanded counseling services, Improved public relations, More citizen involvement and More research and evaluation of existing programs.

Bell went on to say that he believes that more emphasis should be placed on these companion recommendations in view of the fact that almost 60% of the 1,3000 public opinion forms which had been filled in by parents were opposed to the 12 month school year in any manner.

PAUL DEESE MAKES PITCH FOR DOMED STADIUM

EAGLE RIVER: Paul Deese, manager of the Galacier Pilots baseball team, and a member of the Borough Sports Facility Committee, appeared at the Monday meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce to make a pitch for the Domed Stadium Bond issue.

Deese pointed out the comparative low cost of the complex, .2 mill, or approximately \$2.00 per year for each Borough resident.

He emphasized the need for an arena in which sports now held outdoors (such as high school football, baseball etc) could be held in an enclosed building.

He indicated that it was expected that most revenue producing sports would pay most of the expense of maintaining

only building in the borough that is presently being used for sporting events is scheduled to be torn down within several years.

The Sports Complex is an issue at the coming Borough Election. The International Firm of Sverdrup and Parcel, with home offices in St. Louis Missouri, have designed the Domed Stadium. They are the designers of the "Superdome" Stadium in New Orleans. Mr. Ital Veron, a representative of Sverdrup and Parcel is presently in Alaska, and attended the meeting in Eagle River in order to be able to answer any technical questions on the complex.



GRADE SCHOOL WELL DOWN 400 FEET

OLD CHUGIAK: The well at the proposed new site of the Chugiak Elementary School is now down to 400 feet, according to a spokesman for the Anchorage School District.

This was the maximum depth which the contractor was authorized to drill.

The well casing has been perforated at several locations and is being pumped.

According to the contractor, the most they have been able to produce to date is 20 gallons per minute, which is not considered enough water to supply the school without an enormous storage tank.

Unless pumping can develop the well into producing a considerably larger amount of water, the administration plans to return to the school board and ask for funds to drill another well at a different location on the Carnival Grounds property.

It is hoped that even if the second well does not produce

the necessary amount the two wells can be tied together to provide enough water.

This is the method which is being utilized at the present site of the Chugiak Elementary School, where three wells are combined.

The change in location of the school was proposed because of the inadequate water supply at the existing site.

The reason for the cancellation was given as the lack of turnout at registration.

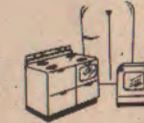
The classes which have been cancelled for this semester include all art classes, drama class, Film making class and pre school music.

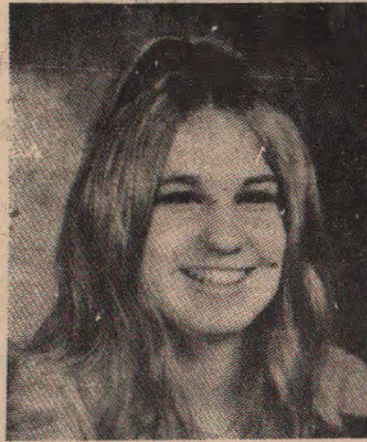

The twenty day session, which lasts from October 16th to November 10th, is to help upgrade reading teaching techniques.

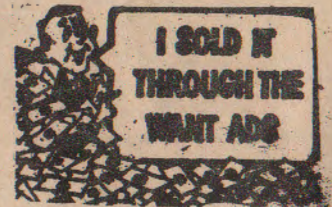
