CHUGIAK: Three local residents have filed for the Anchorage School Board, all for the three 3-year terms which are open.

The candidates are Ken Bell of Eagle River, Robert L. Rogers of Old Chugiak, and Clarence McGrane, of Birchwood.

Bell, who lives on Baranof Street in Eagle River, has run unsuccessfully for the one year terms to the School Board in 1970 and in 1971. He is a fifth grade teacher at Ursa Major School on Ft. Richardson. He is the father of two children, both of whom attend Homestead Elementary.

Bell is primarly interested in seeing that teachers and administrators are allowed to exercise more authority and that the school board does not enter into areas which should be left up to the administrat-

Robert L. Rogers lives at Mile 17 k/2 on the Old Glenn Highway. He is a real estate salesman, associated with Yukon Realty.

He is a two year resident of the area and of Alaska, and has two children both of whom attend Chugiak High School,

WILLIS UNAPPOSED IN BOROUGH ELECTION

EAGLE RIVER: Ed Willis, of Eagle River, is unopposed in his bid for re-election to the office of borough assemblyman from the local Section lof the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

When the deadline for filing arrived at 5:00pm on Friday September 1st, no other candidate had filed for the seat on the Assembly from this area.

Willis will automatically return for another three years this October, unless a write in campaign is launched for another candidate, the only way now that '.e could be opposed.

This will be Willis's third term of office, he was the second elected Assemblyman from this area since the formation of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, The first three year term was held by Gleun Briggs, of Eagle

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT HERE TOPS 2,000

CHUGIAK: School enrollment in the three local elementary schools and at Chuglak Junior Senior High School topped the 2-000 mark with first week figures totaling to 2,387.

This still is considerably under the anticipated enrollment, however more students are expected to show up as the month progresses.

Enrollment at the Chugiak Elementary is 320, which includes kindergarten.

Eagle River Elementary School has an enfollment of 352 (including kindergarten). 358 (also including kindergarten) and Birchwood Elementary has 301, including Special Education and Kindergarten.

Chugiak Junior hign enrollment is 568 and Senior High is 488 for a total of 1056 at the Junior-Senior High Com-





FUNITURE STORE NOW OPEN

PETERS CREEK: Aused furniture store has just opened for business at Mile 21 1/2 on the Glenn Highway.

Mr. Thompson said that he has had considerable experience in the used furniture business. His parents owned a used furniture store in California so he literally grew up with the business.

Their present stock fetures a number of items of household furniture, which include a selection of major appliances.

STILL NO WATER AT SCHOOL WELL

OLD CHUGIAK: There is still no water at the well which is being drilled at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds, site of a possible Chugiak Elementary School.

The well is now down to 241 feet. According to a spokesman for the school administration, the driller had to switch to 5 inch casing when he was unable to drill any deeper with the 6 inch casing.

Apparently he was able to proceed only a few more feet with the five inch casing when he struck rock and was again unable to proceed.

He is planning to switch from the cable tool rig which he has been using to a rotary drill which will enable him to penetrate the rock.

The contract calls for him to drill to a maximum of 400 feet in an effort to find sufficient water to supply a school.

The present site of the Chugiak Elementary School has never had an adequate water supply, and CBA who administers the Carnival Grounds had proposed an exchange of land for the site presently occupied by the existing school, providing water can be found.

The contract for drilling the well is held by Jones and Young Drilling Company, of Anchorage.





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
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
