# CORRECTION CENTER OPENING STILL INDEFINITE

EAGLE RIVER: The opening date for the new South-central Correction Center at Eagle River is still indefinite, according to a spokesman for that facility.

An inspection of the Center held recently resulted in tentative approval, with two of the buildings yet to be completed.

Although it is anticipated that the facility will be fully staffed before the end of the year, it is doubtful that any inmates will be housed there in 1973.

The Center had originally

been scheduled for completion last April, but a series of problems, mostly involving equipment arriving on time have been blamed for the project falling so badly behind schedule.

An Open House, at which time the public would have been invited to visit the Center has been postponed indefinitely.

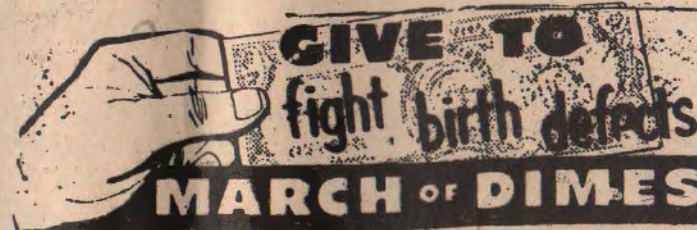
The accident took place at the intersection of Birchwood Loop Road and Birchwood Spur.

## AID TO BE OFFERED TO FOSTER GRANDPARENTS

ANCHORAGE: Help for foster grandparents and aides for persons requiring health care is on the way to Anchorage, a federal official has promised.

Dr. Umsaw Kawabori told foster grandparents and members of the Older Person's Action Group that a bill approved in the Congress will mean up to 20 more employes

for the year-old foster grandparents program. The local program now receives \$94,000 yearly.

The foster grandparents program which has devoted 14,212 hours to the care of children, is a program for senior citizens who are paid to help care for children. Slow to attract recruits there is now a waiting list of more than 20 who want to care for children.

Kawabori told the group of 30 that although the bill has been approved in Congress the money has to be allocated officially.

A third program to fund a senior citizens assistance program has been approved also. The health aid will not be

fully organized for another two or three years, Kawabori said. But when it is, Anchorage could have a program for senior citizens to work as health aides for persons who can not afford regular nurse care.

Kawabori complimented the Anchorage foster grandparents program saying it is one of the best in the country. "We'll be watching your progress up here very closely, and with a lot of expectations," he said.

Another foster grandparents program has been suggested for Fairbanks.

## AERIAL MOOSE SURVEYS ARE SCHEDULED

ANCHORAGE: Aerial moose surveys will be flown over much of southcentral Alaska as soon as there is sufficient snowfall, the Department of Fish and Game reports.

Moose are easier to count over snow covered terrain, says game biologist Dave Harkness, but the surveys must be flown before the bulls start to drop their antlers in late November and December.

The purpose of the aerial survey is to determine the feasibility of holding antlerless hunts and to provide a sample of the moose population in a particular area.

Biologists tally the number of bulls, cows and calves, then compare this information with the type of management desired for that area.

The ratio of bulls to cows and young animals to adults varies greatly over different parts of Alaska.

The best calf/cow ratios have been observed in areas where moose have been newly transplanted. Following moose transplants to Yakutat and parts of southeast Alaska, high cow/calf ratios were noted.

The lowest calf/cow ratios are usually seen in the

areas where the moose population is relatively "full" in relation to the available habitat, and which contain mostly older, less productive animals.

The desirable ratio of bulls to cows depends on the type of management being pursued, Harkness says. If an area is being managed for maximum production, a relatively low bull/cow ratio may be desired.

If an area is being managed for trophy bull moose, more restrictive hunting seasons on bull moose, together with a harvest of some cows, might be in order.

DISCRIMINATION**

ANCHORAGE: A letter has been sent to the State Office of Civil Rights alleging some 200 Alaska native boarding home students have been discriminated against by the Anchorage Borough School District.

The letter alleges the students were discriminatorily kept out of school this fall for about one week for testing and placement purposes while other students were attending classes.

The civil rights office has not filed a formal complaint against the district and is currently gathering information from school administration officials.

School administrators said the program was complicated this year because of the uncertain fate of the students when the Johnson - O'Malley Review

summer. In addition, the officials said, many of the boarding home students did not arrive until after school had started, arrangements had been made in advance for orientation and lodging in Anchorage. An additional complication, the school district said, was the closing of the Nome - Beltz and Sidiak dormitories, which created a need for an additional 300 students into the program here and in other parts of the state.

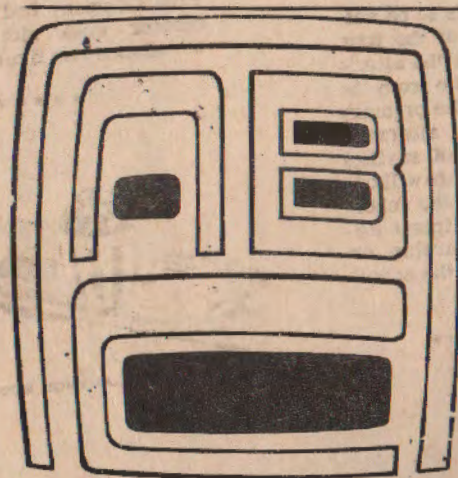

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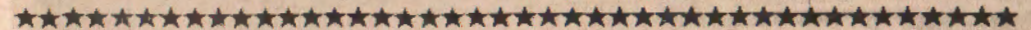
# THE SPIRIT OF '76 in your own home!

## "The Seeds are Sown"

PLATE NO. 1 — ISSUED JANUARY 1, 1973 — In 1775, the people of the American Colonies were becoming convinced that they could no longer be subjected to the dictates of a foreign power. Patrick Henry echoed their convictions, when he issued the ultimate challenge . . . "GIVE ME LIBERTY OR GIVE ME DEATH"

## "Independence is Declared"

PLATE NO. 2 — ISSUED JANUARY 1, 1974 — On July 4th, 1776, fifty-six courageous men voted their approval of a Declaration of Independence. This document, the most profound statement of democratic principles ever written, formally announced the dramatic birth of a new nation . . . The United States of America.

## "A Test of Courage"

PLATE NO. 3 — ISSUED JANUARY 1, 1975 — Once declared, Independence had yet to be won. At Valley Forge during the bitter cold winter of 1777 and 1778. General George Washington and his troops placed their trust in their Creator, then successfully pitted their courage against seemingly overwhelming odds.

## "Liberty is Proclaimed"

PLATE NO. 4 — ISSUED JANUARY 1, 1976 — "Proclaim Liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof." Two centuries later this same proclamation still rings. The Liberty Bell with its simple inscription has become one of the most cherished and revered symbols of American freedom.

## GAME PET POLICY IS OUTLINED

**JUNEAU:** Want to keep a grizzly in the garage? How about a wolverine for a watchdog? Plan to import an armadillo for a lap pet? Better check first with the Alaska Department of Fish and Game on the regulations covering the importation and holding of wild animals as pets.

Frank Jones, director of the department's game division, says that an increasing number of wild animals are being brought into Alaska as pets, and that in most cases, such importation is illegal.

"People have been bringing in every type of exotic animal imaginable," said Jones. "This includes mountain lions, leopards, lynx, wildcats, foxes and wolves and none of these may be legally imported into Alaska."

Jones said that a permit must be obtained by the Department of Fish and Game to capture, transport or hold alive any wild game animal for any reason.

"The Department is not issuing permits for big game animals, furbearers or marine mammals, and no permits are issued for the capture of any Alaskan wild game animal for use as a pet," Jones said.

Permits are not issued for the capture or holding of any species which if released into the wild would be likely to survive, reproduce and become a nuisance or successful predator unless the animal has been surgically neutered.

In addition, no permits are granted for animals on the rare and endangered species

Permits are not required for domestic species such as farm animals and dogs and cats.

He stressed that individuals, pet shop owners and animal importers must have a permit from the Department of Fish and Game BEFORE possessing any nondomestic bird or animal. Permits are issued through the Division of Game, Department of Fish and Game Support Building, Juneau.

**ANCHORAGE:** Atlantic Richfield Company will award four \$1,000 scholarships to graduating Alaska high school seniors in the 1973-74 school year.

Robert E. Wycoff, vice president and regional manager for Alaska said in announcing the scholarship program that it is aimed primarily at providing educational assistance to Alaskan youths who show leadership potential or the capacity to make a significant contribution to the state.

Scholastic achievement, Wycoff added, is to be a consideration in the selection process, but it is by no means to be the overriding one. Also to be considered are the candidates financial need, character, seriousness of purpose and how realistic are his or her educational goals.

Applications, transcripts, and letters of recommendation will be due by February 15, 1974.

Wycoff said two scholarships will be awarded in the Anchorage Borough schools, one scholarship in a community north of Anchorage, and one scholarship in a community south of Anchorage.

One alternate is to be selected for each of the four scholarships but the alternate should not be from the same school as the primary recipient. Each alternate will receive a \$100 savings bond. The alternate will become eligible for the scholarship if the recipient declines the scholarship or fails to exercise the scholarship.

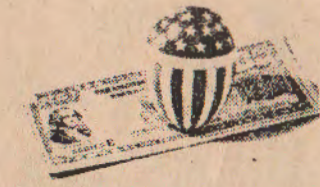
## ONLY MINOR INCIDENTS OCCUPY FIREMEN

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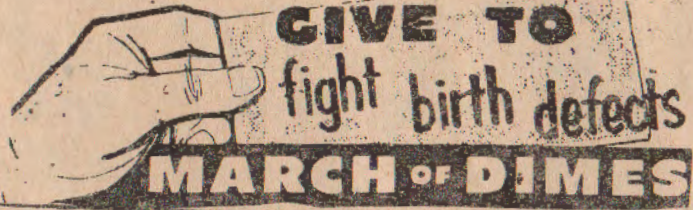
