Learning to speak, read and write better is part of the training as well as developing skills and work habits needed to get and keep a job with good pay.

The training is expecially helpful for youth who have dropped out of school and cannot find a good job, however, high school graduates are also eligible.

Quite a large number of youth have dropped out of school to help support their families and for many other reasons. If the family does not have enough money to help train them for a job, this training can help.

The training, according to Mrs. Gallant, will be given outside Alaska in facilities located in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, so that trainees will not be too great a distance from Alaska. Well qualified instructors guide the young people into programs varying from 6 months up to 2 years in length, that are snited to their abilities and interests. Specialized training is offered in a number of fields, including automotive mechanics, selling business machines, transportation and heavy equipment operations, food services, construction and metal trades and health eservices,





#### PLASTIC TIRE CHAINS MAY REPLACE STUDS

JUNEAU: In a continuing search to improve vehicle traction during winter dri -ing, the Alaska Department of Highways has turned to space age plastics in hopes of finding improved traction aids that are virtually harmless to paved asphalt roadways and concrete bridge decks.

The Highway Department has received 100 sets of a newly developed tire traction aid to be tested on patrol cars of the Alaska State Troopes and various State and municipal vehicles throughout the State.

The physical appearance of the newly developed chains resemble a set of normal steel tire chains, except they are composed of a plastic material called "elastomer", rather than steel. This material is much harder than rubber and appears to be very durable.

Claims by the manufacturer state they will last up to 30 times longer than steel chains and will provide up to 71% more starting traction in snow than snow tires.

In initial tests by the Highway Department the newly

developed elastomeric chains showed some immediate advantages over regular chains. They could be driven on bare pavement roads at speeds of 60 mph with little or no vibration. Application was completed about two minutes per tire.

Total weight of both chains is less than two pounds and they can be mounted and left on regular tread highway tires regardless of road conditions.

The principle behind the elastomeric chain is that the elastomeric band lies flat against the tire tread, except when the tire starts to slip. This causes the band to turn aideways, forming a scoop to dig into the snow or rough ice. They return to the flat position when the tire stops spinning. Elastomeric chains, like steel chains, need to be kept snug at all times to avoid excessive wear and heat build up.

Testing of the new chains will continue through the winter season with results of the tests to be made public upon completion of the testing.





#### BAHA'IS TO CELEBRATE BIRTHDAY OF FOUNDER

CHUGIAK: Every religion. world-wide celebrates the anniversary of the birth of it's Founder. So do the Baha'is.

#### GRAVEL WINS SOCIAL SF.CURITY by the amount of the bonus. EXEMPTION FOR PIONEER BONUS

WASH, D.C: Senator Mike Gravel today won approval by the Senate Finance Committee on which he serves. of an exemption of the Alaska Pioneers' longevity bonus from Social Security income supplement requirements.

The exemption means that Comio, Citizens in Alaska receiving the longevity bonus, will not have that bottom counted as supplemental income, thereby reducing their normal supplemental Social Security payments.

This provision, advanced by Senator Gravel during a meeting of the Senate Finance Committee today, will now be incorporated into a Child Support Bill, containing other Social Security amendments that will be reported to the Senate by the panel. This bill contains a seven percent Social Security cost of living increase to take effect upon enactment.

"The fact that the provision will be contained in the Com mittee bill makes it almost certain to survive on the Senate floor and later in Conference Committee with the House of Representatives", the Senator said. " I fully expect this provision to become law during this session of Congress,"

Last year the Alaska Legsilature extablished the

as income, meaning that sunplmental Social Security Senator Gravel's provision, in effect, exempts the Alaska bonus from such requirements.

"For example," Senator Gravel said, "a senior citizen receiving \$250 in supplemental Social Security each month, would have faced a reduction to \$150 a month when he received his \$100 longevity bonus. This means that he would have gained nothing. The exemption guarantees that he will continue to get his \$250 each month, plus his longevity borus, for a total of \$350.

"In other circumstaces, where an individual was geting \$100 per month or less, he would have lost all his supplement along with his eligibility for Medicare and food stamps when he received his bonus. The new provision means that he will get his payment, his benefits and his bonus," the Senator said.

"This exemption now removes any doubt that Alska's senior citizens will receive the economic relief that the State intended when the longevity bonus was established", he said.

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

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#### THIS IS HOT LUNCH WEEK

#### EMPLOYERS OF HOUSEHOLD HELP MUST PAY SOCIAL SECURITY

ANCHORAGE: If you pay so meone \$50 or more for household services during any three-month calendar quarter, you must report these payments and pay social security taxes to the Internal Revenue Service.

The report for the July, August and September calendar quarter is due October 31, Mr. Charles Roddy, District Director of Internal Revenue for Alaska said today.

Often when maids or other household employees apply for benefits, it comes to light that all social security taxes have not been paid, Mr. Worldy said.

The IRS then has to secure delinquent returns from the employers, sometimes covering several years with a substantial amount of taxes penalties and interest due. This may delay and decrease benefits for the household employees, he as the

The Social Security tax on household wages is 5.35 percent for employee. When filing the quarterly report, the employer should include a check or money order for 11.70 percent of cash wages paid for the period, Mr. Roddy said.

Employers must use Form 942, Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees, to report the Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees, to report the social security taxes due. After the first one is filed, a copy of Form 942 is mailed to every employer in time for the next quarterly report. However, if you do not receive a form, you may obtain one at your local IRS office.

Among those employees considered household employees are: maids, cleaning women, cooks, governesses, housekeepers, caretakers, gardners and cauffeurs, Mr. Roddy said.

However, no taxes are due on amounts paid to persons who are independent contractors and not household employees. This exempts payments to painters, plumbers, repairmen, carpenters and others who provide household services as independent contractors, he said.

Mr. Roddy noted that money given household employees for carfare is to be counted in total wages paid. However, car tokens, passes and the value of meals are not included in wages.

Q. In a few weeks I'll changing my job and moving from Alaska to another State. Should I notify a social security office of my new address?

A. No, not unless you're getting social security checks. Social security doesn't keep an up-to-date record of your mailing address until you start getting benefits. Regardless of where you work or live, social security keeps one central record of your earnings in work covered by social

security. You use the same social security number in any State, and your number and name are enough to credit your earnings to your record no matter where you are.

Q. I'm a widow with five young children. I expected my social security checks to stop when I went to work full time, out I still get the same amount every month. Why?

A. With five young children, your family is still entitled to a maximum family benefit

...ount -ased on your husband's earnings. Since your five children continue to collect social security, your family keeps getting the same monthly amount - the family maximum - whether you work or not. Stopping your check and increasing the monthly amount paid to each of your children could cause an interruption in your family's payments. For this reason, and to save administrative costs, the checks continue in vourname.

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
