
## GRADE SCHOOL COLLECTS SOUP LA' FLS





## BOW HUNT SLATED AT AIRPORT

ANCHORAGE: The Alaska Department of Fish and Game announced today that an either sex moose season will be held within the boundaries of the Anchorage Internatonal Airport from November 1st until March 31 1974.

As no firearms are allowed on the airport, the hunt will be by long bow and arrow only. The State Division of Aviation has requested this hunt to alieviate the moose-aircraft problem and the hazard to public safety.

Rules of the bunt will be as follows:

Without exception, all applicable state game regulations must be followed; permit form must be completed and approved by the Security Chief or his representative based on the following. and inspection of the equipment; long bow of 40 pound minimum weight; broadheads with cutting edge of steel; not less than seven-eighths inch wide, and not less than one and one half inches long. Broadheads sharp to the touch; hunter must certify he

is knowledgeable, experienced in, and capable of handling and shooting the bow in a proficient manner and hunter under 10 years of age must be accom panied by an adult who wi

airport will be limited to a~ maximum of 25 at any one time.

The hunt itself will be managed by Airport Security Police. Hunters are cautioned to remain within the airport boundaries and to stay well away from runways and taxiways. Additional hunt information may be obtained from the Airport Security Police or the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

### FISH REARING AT CRYSTAL LAKE HATCHERY

JUNEAU - The Crystal Lake fish hatchery at Petersburg is operating on schedule and plans to have approximately 800,000 king and coho salmon smolt available for planting next summer, the Department of Fish and Game announced today.

Alex McRea, chief of the department's hatchery section, said that the \$00,000 salmon smolt will be used to fill the stocking requirements ioi Southeastern Alaska next year. The fish will go to various projects operated by the department and also will be released at the hatchery to aid in brood stock development.

"The hatchery also met the stocking requirements of the using projects during this first year of operation and we believe that the facility is now capable of operating at its projected capacity." McRea said.

Fish from the hatchery were stocked in the Mendenhall Ponds project near Juneau and in the caltwater salmon rearing pens at Sitka.

McRea said that hatchery crews have upgraded fish transporting equipment during the first season of operation and that the system is now functioning very well.

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## LIMIT IS PROPOSED FOR SHOPPING CENTERS ETC.

WASHINGTON D.C.: New. opping centers, ball parks, highways, airports and anything else that attracts large numbers of cars or planes would be banned if they cause violations of clean air standards under regulations proposed Friday by the Environmental Protection Agency.

EPA proposed state review of planned "indirect sources" of air pollution under a court order won by the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC), a citizen environment group.

Meanwhile, NRDC has renewed its legal attack by charging that EPA was moving too slowly and was being influenced and impeded by the White House Office of Management and Budget.

In a petition filed Wednesday, NRDC asked a federal appeals court to cite EPA for contempt of court for missing an Oct. 15 deadline to propose its regulations, and to enjoin the OMB from hindering

EPA's issuance of further regulations.

At a news conference Friday, however, EPA administrator Russell E. Train denied that his agency's action was delayed by OMB

## QUINTAR TO BE SUBJECT OF STUDY

ANCHORAGE: Will yearround school workin in Anhorage? A comprehensive study aimed at answering this question is being launched by the Anchorage Borough School District at the direction of the school board.

Peg Benkert, who recently coordinated a two-year statewide survey, has contracted with the district to conduct the "quinter plan" study.

Ouinter, meaning a school year composed of five time units, was the major recommendation of the Refocus report submitted to the board in 1972. Under this plan, the school year would consist of five nine-week periods with one or two weeks break between each. A student could attend any four of the units or possibly all five if he wished to accelerate or catch up in subjects where he needed remedial work. These alternatives will be among those under examination. Recognizing WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER & 'ne complexity of the problems involved in setting up the quinter system, the board directed the current study to be conducted during the 1973-74 period.

#### EXXON PUBLISHES ARTICLES ON ALASKA TUNDRA

ALASKA: Tundra studies in Northers Alaska are the subject of a feature article in the fall issue of Exxon Oil Company's "Exxon USA."

The six-page article includes three full pages of color pictures. The text describes research going on at tundra study centers at Barrow, Prudhoe Bay and the Arctic ivational Wildlife Range.

Tundra in North America is one of six ecosystems chosen for intensive five-year scrutiny by the International Biological Program, the article points out. The U.S. Tundra Biome Program is well into its third year.

Although not all directly involved in the tundra program, last year some 700 scientists and their assistants made their base at the Naval Arctic Research Lab at

#### Barrow.

The lab director, John Schindler, is quoted as saying, "Almost any science you can name is represented In a sense we've become a national all-discipline laboratory."

For example, at the same site, one expert may be examining the vegetation where a bird is nesting; another may follow the incubation of the bird's eggs; a third may note what insects the bird eats.

They do their own independent research, the article pointsout, but exchange insights on a day-to-day basis.

#### BEEF EATING MAY CAUSE SOME CANCERS

NEW YORK: If you have stopped eating occurately because of high prices, you may be doing your health a favor. The American Cancer Society's second national conference on cancer of the colon and rectrum was told that that because heavy beef consumption has been linked to incidence of bowel cancer by surveys in a number of nations.

Heavy beef eating was related to bowel cancer by Dr. John Berg, who coordinated

the data while serving as chief of epidemiological pathology at the National Cancer Research Institute in Bethesda, M.D.

The evidence is mostly statistical. It seems to follow a pattern in a number of nations, including the United States where cancer of the colon and rectum have a higher incidence than any other form of cancer except skin cancer. An estimated 79,000 new cases of bowel cancer are predicted for 1973 by the Cancer Society.
