RETURN SAFELY

PALMER: Two Peters Creek brothers were found safe on Monday after being reported overdue on a snow-machine trip over Hatcher Pass.

The pair, Michael Dionne age 19 and Rene Dionne, 15 of Mirror Lake were supposed to have returned on Sunday. They were reported missing on Monday, and the Rescue Coordination Center was alerted.

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Borough Assembly last Monday night voted unanimously to renew the ambulance contract with the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company.

The Fire Company had been operating without a contract since July 1, when the contract had expired.

There were some fears among the firemen that the assembly would not renew the contract due to some doubts cast a week earlier by Anchorage Assemblyman Dave Roae as to why paramedic service was not offered in the Chuglak district, and why patients were not being charged for ambulance runs.

It was brought out that the Chuglak district is the only one in the borough which is served by a volunteer Fire Company, who receive no

Air Patrol aircraft. Apparently one of the snow machines had run out of gas on top of Mt. Baldy, and the two were attempting to ride out on the remaining machine.

A helicopter delivered a supply of gas to them and there were able to make it out by Monday night under their own power.

CANCER FILM TO BE SHOWN AT LIBRARY

EAGLE RIVER: The film sponsored by the Anchorage chapter of the "Committee For Freedom of Choice in Cancer Therapy" will be shown this Friday, November 16th, at the public library in the Eagle River Shopping Center.

Starting at 8:00pm, the 56 minute film concerns the controversial Vitamin B17 treatment for cancer, which is legal in 23 countries, but not in the United States.

The film will be shown by Dr. Bob Layman D.D.S, assisted by Kathy Wise, secretary for the Anchorage Chapter, and Fred Bryant, also a member of the Committee.

The group, which was organized in California last year, now has 85 chapters in the country, including the local one.

A question and answer period will follow the film. The showing is free to the public.

In the Chambers emblem of a grizzly bear footprint is given, one to an individual and one to an organization who have performed voluntary public service for the benefit of the community.

Although the Chamber asks a nominating committee to submit the names of candidates for the awards, any resident of the area may also nominate an individual or an organization they feel is deserving of recognition.

Nominations should be mailed to Mrs. Bellinger at Box 90, Chugiak no later than Friday, November 16th.

A panel of judges will review the nominations and select the winners. Each person or organization nominated receives a certificate of merit.

The awards are handed out at the Chambers annual meeting, to be held this year on Monday, December 3rd at the Sportsman's Lodge in Eagle River.

VEHICLES BURNED IN HOME FIRE

EAGLE RIVER: Two cars and 2 snow machines were part of the contents which were burned when fire completely destroyed a home in Eagle River last Monday November 12th.

The vehicles, which included a Jeep Wagoneer, and a pick-up truck were located in the basement garage of the West residence in the North Slope subdivision at Mile 12 Eagle River Road.

The building was completely involved when Engine 11, and Tanker 11 from the Eagle River Fire Station and Pumper 6 from Muldoon ar-

rived at the scene.

The fire was reported at 12:52am, and was believed to have been caused by a faulty furnace.

Damage, including the vehicles was estimated at approximately \$40,000.

Your Social Security

Q. Does Medicare cover persons needing a kidney transplant or hemodialysis treatment?

A. The 1972 amendments make it possible for many people to be considered disabled under social security and eligible for Medicare because they are receiving dialysis. The individual's eligibility for coverage begins with the third month after the month in which a course of renal hemodialysis begins. The individual's coverage ends 12 months after the month the individual has a transplant or dialysis treatment stops. All Medicare benefits are payable.

Q. If age 65 is the retirement age, why does my employer continue to hold out FICA taxes? Since I am still working and not receiving social security, how can this extra tax help me?

A. This is really two

nings, you would receive 7 per cent more per month. This is referred to as delayed retirement credits and is given in addition to any increase you may have based on your taxable earnings each year which is the second way you can benefit.

Your monthly retirement amount is refigured each year to give you the benefit of any delayed retirement credits plus any increased based on the additional earnings.

Q. I am now entitled to the hospital insurance part of Medicare and receiving a monthly social security benefit, but I never signed up for the medical insurance part. Was I automatically entrolled for medical insurance effective July 1?

A. No. If you want medical insurance you will have to enroll in the next general enrollment period Jan. 1, to March 31, 1974.

A. This is really two questions in one. First, there is no cut off age for collecting FICA, or social security taxes. Many workers do not become insured for social security benefits until after age 65 based on continued work. If work was not covered by social security after age 65, many workers would not ever become eligible for payments.

The second part of your question is more pertinent to you. Your continued work and earnings may increase your monthly retirement amount in one or two ways. First, for each month you work beyond age 65, but not past age 72, you will be given a 1-12 of 1 per cent increase in the benefit amount. Should you work from age 65 to 72 and receive no retirement benefits because of your ear-

Q. I am in good health and plan to work until age 70 before I start receiving my social security benefits. Will I receive any credit for the years after I am age 65 and I don't receive benefits?

A. Yes, in addition to your regular retirement benefit, you will receive a delayed retirement credit which will amount to 1 per cent for each year between the ages 65 and 72 that you did not receive benefits. In your case this will add 5 per cent to your benefit.

Q. I was married to my husband for 25 years and was recently divorced from him. I am now 59 years old and have never worked. Am I entitled to

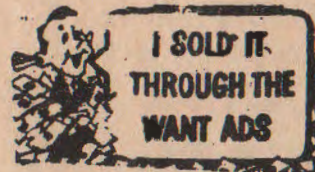

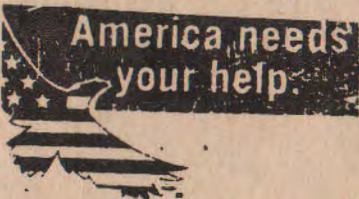

PLATE NO. 3 - ISSUED JANUARY 1, 1975 - Once declared, independence had yet to be won. At Valley Forge during the bitter cold winter of 1777 and 1778. General George Washington and his troops placed their trust in their Creator, then successfully pitted their courage against seemingly overwhelming odds.

"Liberty is Proclaimed"

PLATE NO. 4 - ISSUED JANUARY 1, 1976 - "Proclaim Liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof." Two centuries later this same proclamation still rings. The Liberty Bell with its simple inscription has become one of the most loved and revered symbols of American freedom.

FAIRBANKS: Some 80 local residents were among the 1541 persons who attend the Alaska circuit assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses in Fairbanks recently.

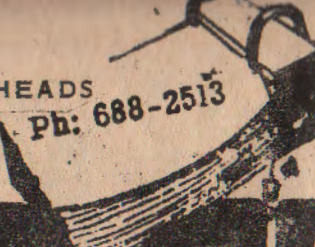
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
