



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Dear Editor,

The Eagle River Improvement Association presented its position again on the needs of highways and accesses for Eagle River, Fire Lake, Birchwood and PETERS CREEK, at a meeting with the Highway Department last Friday.

After six months of personal contact and letter correspondence the association feels that very little progress has been made toward improving the planning and design work on the highway projects serving these areas.

We do not accept the position the State Highway Department is taking to restrict the growth and safe transportation of these communities with obsolete and outmoded highway designs that are years behind the times. We deserve something better than accesses that compare to the one at Turpin Road and Glenn Highway.

We were informed Friday that the section from 800 feet north of Artillery Road to Peters Creek will be the next section constructed.

This will result in channeling four-lane traffic into two-lane traffic just 800 feet from the present Artillery intersection.

Artillery is already grossly overloaded and dangerous and this type of planning will multiply the problems. We want the section from Ski Bowl Road to Eagle River including Artillery Inter-




BULLET HOLES FOUND IN HOME AND BUSINESS
