

# POLICE PROTECTION PLANS TO BE STUDIED

## NEW DENTIST TO OPEN OFFICE IN EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: A new dentist has opened an office in the Eagle River area it was learned today.

Dr. Dennis L. Anderson, DDS is located in the Atwater Building on Artillery Rd. and will be practicing General Dentistry in the community.

Dr. Anderson has wroked for the U.S. Public Health Service in Alaska for 11/2 years in the capacity of "Bush Dentist". He flew to remote villages to provide dental care to the residents. Prior to that he was with CHS STUDENTS TO PERFORM WITH ACME DANCE CO.

EAGLE RIVER: A Police Force for the residents of the local area is the subject of a study currently being conducted by the local Chamber of Commerce.

To date only two methods of obtaining this have been explored. One method is for the residents to vote for police protection under the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, with the Borough contracting with the Alaska State Troopers or the Anchorage City police for the personnel.

The other method would be for the area to incorporate as a city, with it's own police department. One of the arguments in favor of the latter method is that the local area would have more positive control over the police force, with hiring and firing on a local level, and with the members of the force living and stationed in the area.

WASHINGTON D.C.; RCA Alaska Communications has been ordered to submit a specific proposal for bringing Alaska's long-distance telephone rates into line with interstate rates for the rest of the country.

Sen. Ted Stevens said today the Federal Communications Commission order calls for submission of the proposal by March 12, 1974.

"However, a recent revised order specifies the March 12 deadline for a rate integration proposal. This is nonetheless a real step forward in getting our communications rates down to Lower 48 levels."

Once FCC receives the RCA proposal, Stevens said, it will decide whether rate revision is to come with operation of RCA's temporary satellite system or with its permanent system planned for operation in 1975.




#### ACCIDENT WITH "BODIES" TURNS OUT TO BE MOOSE

#### REPORT FROM THE CHUGACH NATIONAL FOREST

REPORTS OF Steller jays being seen out near Bird Point and in the mountains just behind Anchorage have given rise to the hope that this might be a good winter for birds.

Aside from the Steller jay reports, however, there has been no really significant reports concerning rare or uncommon birds thus far. In fact, a Bohemian waxwing invasion, normally occuring in late September, was notable this year by its absnece.

The dippers (water ouzels) have returned to Ship Creek and pine grosbeaks are now being seen along the roadsides up in the mountains. There and elsewhere are the black - capped chickadees, gray jays, magpies and, in lesser num-

bers, hairy and downy woodpeckers, an occasional shrike, ter birds as it is still a cheap form of entertainment.

In past years beef suet was free for the asking at most markets. It is a difficult commodity to locate this year with most of the available stock apparently being picked up by moose hunters to be used in, hamburger. Suet is almost a must for any feeder so if one market doesn't have it try another. A chunk of suet will last all winter. It is sought by chickadees and all woodpeckers as well as gray jays.

Another traditional food for winter birds is sunflower seed. The price of these here in Alaska, however, is almost prohibitive and, by necessity, are used sparingly. Unlike suet, sunflower seeds go fast.

When used, sunflower seeds prove to be a special attraction to chickadees.

PEANUT BUTTER is another favored chickadee food. Nuthatches (very rare) will show up for peanut butter if they're anywhere in the neighborhood. We once read an item that pearut butter is stale bread chunks soaked in bacon grease out as an attraction for birds. But bread and bacon, too, are almost worth their weight in gold and one is inclined to use both sparingly.

THE COMMERCIAL wild bird seed one sees on sale occasionally might look especially good when one considers other prices. Even at sale prices it is expensive and. more often than not, isn't suitable for general feeder use. This feed, with a minimum of sunflower seeds, consists of cracked corn with the bunk of it made up of grain seeds. primarily millet. This type of feed is ideal for ground feeders such as sparrows and juncos during the spring and fall migrations but has little attraction for feeder type birds such as chickadees, nuthatches, jays or woodpeckers.

A feeder loaded with this type of food could go untouched all winter, unless there might be a stray junco in the neighborhood. It isn't that the birds wouldn't like to eat it, it is simply that they are not equipped to.

If you would like hours of entertainment this winter put up a winter bird feeder now.

It is suggested. however, that chunk - style peanut butter is preferable to creamy style.

It may seem incongruous, sait Post, but the girl was simply following her parents way of dealing with pain, by getting drunk, "Her parents had given her a great pattern to follow," he said.

Post suggested some direct, honest approaches to student alcoholism, "Some kinds of controls should be laid down," he said, " so if a person is drunk he is not allowed to keep the whole dorm awake." According to Post, some schools have begun to use mattress-padded rooms to hold notsy students until they calm down. "This approach provides some penalties to drinkers, but it is not punitive and it opeus the door to couuseling and further help.

A drop box for the labels is located in the lobby of the Chugiak Post Office for the convenience of those who may wish to leave them at that location,


