HEARING TO CONCERN BORO SUPPORT OF LOCAL DUMP SITE

A NIGHT OF CRIME AND VANDALISM IN EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: Alaska State Troopers are investigating two burglaries and five acts all of which took place sometime during the night on December 3rd.

Burglarized were Phil's Texico Service and Harry's Auto Parts in Eagle River. A shotgun was taken from the Service station and an undetermined amount of auto parts are missing from Harry's.

The Eagle River businesses which were vandalized were, Jones Tool Rental, which sustained an estimated \$15 damage to doors and windows, the North Slope Drive In, with an estimated \$500 damage: the

CHAMBER ANNUAL MEETING IS POSTPONED

EAGLE RIVER: The annual meeting and Bearfoot Award night of the Chuglak- Eagle River Chamber of Commerce has been postponed for two weeks it was learned today.

Originally scheduled for Monday, December 3rd, the meeting was moved to December 17th to comply with the by-laws which call for a 30 day notice in all Chamber



ANCHORAGE: A public hearing to air two proposed ordinances which would enable the Greater Anchorage Area Borough to assume the responsibility for operating and maintaining the dump at Eagle River have been scheduled.

The hearing will be held on Monday, December 17th, at 7:30pm at the Borough Assembly meeting hall on Tudor Road.

Ordinance 73-253 would establish a borough operated solid waste disposal site for Borough Service Area 70 (which comprised all of the Greater Chuglak Area from the South Fort of Eagle River through Eklutna).

This would be on a temporary basis pending implementation of the Borough-wide solid waste disposal master plan later this winter.

Ordinance 73-254 would provide for funds to cover the upgrading and maintenance of the site over and above what would be collected.

North Slope Drive In, with an estimated \$500 damage; the Jolly Jug Liquor Store, with \$500 damage in broken bottles and damage to the premises; the Chugiak Candy Kitchen and My Favorite Cleaners with a combined damage of \$350 and the office of Buddy's Mobile Home Corral, with \$200 damage.

The vandalism is all thought to have been the work of juveniles. It was not determined if the burglaries were the work of the same group.

CITATION IS GIVEN IN TWO CAR ACCIDENT

OLD CHUGIAK: The driver of a 1968 Ford pick-up truck was cited for failure to yield following a two car collision at mile 18 3/4 on the Old Glenn Highway.

The accident took place at 1:10pm on Friday, November 30th.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Dave Williams, driving a 1966 Bronco, was struck by the pick-up which was driven by Billy DeFrance of Chugiak.

Damage to the Bronco was estimated at \$125. The truck sustained an estimated \$200 damage, it was reported.

ASSEMBLY VOTES TO REJECT ALL BIDS FOR LOCAL OFFICES

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly last Monday, voted to reject all bids for the renting of office space for a satellite office for the Borough Health Department in Eagle River.

The only two bids received had been from Thomas Slanker (who owns the building in which the Health Center is presently located, and from the Parkgate Building.

Slanker, the original low bidder, had reportedly withdrawn his bid when informed he would be required to make extensive changes in the partitioning of the space. The remaining bidder, Parkgate Building, had submitted a bid which, while it contained provisions for partitioning which met the standards as set forth by the Borough, was judged to be too high.

The assembly voted to readvertise, with the stipulation that the lease would be for one year, with the option for renewal. The specifications for the partitioning of the space would be somewhat altered as has been determined by more recent study of the needs.



agement unit where harvest tickets are required, it was announced by Anchorage game biologist Ray Kramer.

Unit 12, the last caribou hunting area accessible by road to remain open, was closed to caribou hunting on November 7th.

Hunters have 15 days after the season closes to mail in their harvest reports and avoid getting reminder letters.



toys and a projector and other photo equipment to be used at the mission school.

The mission, which receives no state or federal funds to operate, relies heavily on donations. The school, which consists of primary grades on up through senior high, has a staff of about 45. There are about 155 boarding school students, and 55 students who reside permanently in the village of St. Marys.

The population of St. Marys is 500 to 550 people. The mission school has reached its capacity and now has a waiting list of 50 students.

Although the people of St. Marys were indeed happy to welcome the Air Guard to the village, it was the Air Guard who received the biggest treat of all. A special program put on by the children of St. Marys was performed for the Air Guard and their guests.

The program, which was held in the school gym, consisted of singing and dancing.

Children of all ages had their own special part to play, and there was a tremendous feeling of well being by all.

The temperature was about 8 below zero and a steady 30 mile per hour wind was blowing as the Air National Guard took off and headed back to Anchorage, but there was a warm feeling experienced by all as the day came to an end.



STUDENT RIGHTS DOCUMENT DISTRIBUTED

ANCHORAGE: The recently adopted document delineating students' rights and responsibilities is currently being distributed to all secondary students and all elementary parents, according to an Anchorage Borough School District spokesman.

High school and junior high students will receive their copies in their respective buildings, while parents of elementary students will be mailed copies.

The document was produced by the Student Advisory Board composed of representatives from each of the secondary schools.

After several revisions, the school board adopted it in the current form at the November 6th meeting.

The statement outlines procedure for suspension, expulsion, search and seizure and regulations on student publications.

Also explained are student responsibilities regarding firearms, smoking, attendance, and disruptive conduct.

The document guarantees students certain rights and

and due process of law with regard to administration of discipline in the schools.

Anyone not receiving a copy of the student rights and responsibilities document may do so by contacting the school district or their respective buildings.


