## SENIOR CITIZENS MAY APPLY FOR TAX EXEMPTION

ANCHORAGE: Applications forms for Senior Citizen Property Tax exemption are available at the GAAB Tax Assessor's office at 3500 Tudor Road in Anchorage.

Property owned and occupied as a permanent place of abode by a resident who has reached the age of 65 on or before January 1st of the year exemption is sought and whose gross annual income total is less than \$10,000, is exempt from taxation of the assessed value of the principal place of abode.

The term real property includes but isn't limited to mobile homes classified as real or personal property.

Applications must be completed and returned to the office of the assessor not later than January 15 of the exemption year.

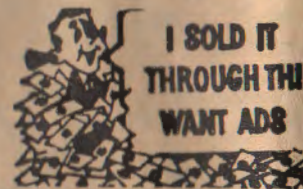
The party was given on Tuesday, December 19th.

### DEPENDENCE EXEMPTION INCREASED TO \$750

**ANCHORAGE:** The Internal Revenue Service today reminded Alaska taxpayers that in order to claim a dependent, they must meet all the dependency tests.

The basic requirement to claim a child as a dependent is that the parent must provide more than half the child's support for the entire year, Mr. Charles Roddy, District Director of Internal Revenue said.

If a child is born during the year, the parent has to meet this support test only after the time of birth he noted.

The requirement that a person cannot have income of \$750 or more a year and still be claimed as a dependent does not apply to a child under 19 at the end of the year or a full-time student for some part or five months of the year, Mr. Roddy said.

If the child is required to file a return, his parents may still be entitled to claim an exemption for him on their return, even though he claims an exemption for himself on his return, Mr. Roddy added.

IRS Publication 501, entitled "Your Exemptions and Exemptions for De-

pendents," furnishes detailed information on the dependency tests. A copy may be obtained free by dropping a post card to the IRS district office.

Mr. Roddy also invited Alaska taxpayers to visit their local IRS office for help with their tax problems.

## Baby doctor says:

# "Twins Mean Double Everything: Twice the Attention, Fun and Prenatal Care"

Twins! No matter how blasé you are about a baby, you feel a twinge of delight when faced with two smiling cherubs—identical from top curl to big toe.

The chances of this happening are about 1 in 73 for black women in the United States, and 1 in 90 for white women. Twinning occurs even less often among Orientals. Women 35 to 40, with several children, are more likely to conceive twins than a young woman pregnant for the first time.

Twins can be identical (monozygotic—from one egg), or fraternal (dizygotic—from two eggs). Geneticists believe that fraternal twinning is a family characteristic, inherited from either the maternal or paternal side.

But they are less certain about the factors that lead to identical twins. Use of fertility drugs, which can result in multiple ovulation and multiple births, may have boosted incidence statistics in recent years.

Whatever the genetic or hormonal mystery, there is no doubt about the extra prenatal care needs of a woman expecting twins. When the diagnosis is made, she is considered a "high risk" mother.

**Early Attention**

A "high risk" pregnancy is one in which the mother has a history of miscarriage, diabetes, high blood pressure, or other serious health problems. A multiple pregnancy is also "high risk" for many reasons. There is excessive stress on the mother's uterus and greater

danger of prematurity.

An unborn twin has the same needs as one growing alone, and it can be a struggle for each to receive enough nourishment, especially in the last two or three months.

Early, regular prenatal care (PNC) is essential for every pregnant woman, but particularly for one at risk. PNC reduces the possibility of premature birth, with its dangers of retardation, lung or heart disease, or many of the birth defects that affect some 250,000 infants annually.

The National Foundation-March of Dimes emphasizes prenatal care in its educational material, and, in cooperation with community organizations, helps support prenatal care clinics for mothers and intensive care nurseries for distressed newborns.

"Forewarned is forearmed" for the obstetrician and the patient. I can't exaggerate the importance of early diagnosis

of a multiple pregnancy.

We now that to prevent prematurity or other complications this mother will need more rest, better nutrition and more attention than the mother with a single pregnancy.

**Special PNC Needs**

When twins are coming, I am particularly concerned about the last three months. We can detect unexpected beginnings of labor and prevent extremely early delivery by confining the patient to bed. Many doctors prescribe long periods of bed rest during the last weeks of a multiple pregnancy.

Twin studies promise to help shed light in physiology, immunology, psychology, genetics, and other scientific fields.

But, just the way it is—twins provide endless subject matter for jokes, pranks, fun, excitement, joy—. Ask the man who's been there; my twin sons are now 29 years old.

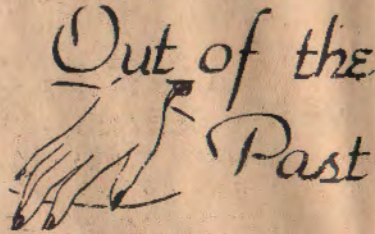

## WOMEN ARE ACCEPTED IN COAST GUARD

WASHINGTON, D.C.: Women will enter the U.S. Coast Guard's officer candidate program next year for the first time since World War II.

Academic and age requirements for women officer candidates will be basically the same as for men, according to Coast Guard Comandant, Admiral Chester Bender.

Those accepted must be college graduates and upon successful completion of the 18 week officer candidate program, they will be commissioned ensigns in the Coast Guard reserve.

All OCS applicants must be physically fit, between 21 and 27 years old and pass a written qualification test.

The Coast Guard recognizes that they have many functions where women can perform equally as well as men. Therefore, the Coast Guard next year will seek legislation to appoint female commissioned officers and to enlist females into the Coast Guard Reserve.
