LEGISLATORS ONLY HOPE FOR MORE TROOPERS

SEN. GRAVEL MEETS WITH MEA MTA ON LOSS OF LOAN FUNDS

PALMER: U.S. Senator Mike Gravel is meeting today, January 17th, with representatives of the Matanuska Electric and Matanuska Telephone Associations to discuss the impounding of REA loan funds.

On December 29th, 1972, the United States Department of Agriculture in a news release to the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association in Washington D.C. announced that all REA loan funds had been impounded and that effective January 1, 1973, no further direct 2% interest REA leans will be made.

Further, that beginning on that date (January 1, 1973), all future loans will be made as guaranteed and insured loans under authority of Section 104 Rural Development Act of 1972 (Sec. 306 (a)(1) of the Consolidated Farm and Home Development Act). The ex-

EAGLE RIVER: An appeal to the legislature for more State Troopers to be assigned to the Anchorage detatchment is the only hope for improved police coverage for the Greater Chugiak Area.

This was learned by the local Chamber of Commerce at their Monday night meeting.

Col. Dankworth, Director of the Alaska State Troopers for the Anchorage Detatchment, explained to the Chamber members, that 32% of the State Trooper force is statioged in Anchorage. This consists of a total of 21 men, whom he must assign as he sees fit.

Dankworth explained that his schedule calls for one trooper to be on duty from the scale house to the Knik River bridge on a 24 hour basis.

He added, however, that this man may and frequently is called away to assist in emergency situations in other areas.

Dankworth stated that the

sured loans under authority of Section 104 Rural Development Act of 1972 (Sec. 306 (a)(1) of the Consolidated Farin and Home Development Act). The expected rate of interest on new loans will raise from 2% to 5%.

The immediate effect of this action is to abolish by executive order the 2% direct REA loan program established by Congress in the Pace Act of 1944, which made it possible for Rural Electrics to provide area coverage in their territor-

The REA loan program has enabled Rurai Electric cooperatives to serve many areas whether it was feasible or not -- by employing the area coverage principal with the use of 2% loan funds.

The National Administration's action in removing the 2% direct REA loans and substituting the insured and guaranteed loans program with the higher rate of interest will result in a substantial increase in MEA annual debt service expense OR, in other words, raise the cost of doing business.

MEA's loan which granted on December 5th, 1972, was not affected by the increase in interest rate however, borrowings for future years will result in increased costs of line extensions, system improvments, and charges for serice.

MEA's Board of Directors and management met in a special session to discuss what action might be taken in an effort to reverse this executive action by the Nat-

Dankworth stated that the legislature determines the number of State Troopers that are assigned to any one area, and that if additional men can be authorized for the Anchorage Detatchment. the coverage in the local area would be increased accordingly.

Other than trying to get the legislature to assign additional manpower, Dankworth pointed out other options open to local residents for police protection.

He explained that if the area sould choose to incorporate they could hire a police chief and authorize him to recruit a police force. He said that in such a situation the State Troopers were available to help in the recruitment and in training recruits at the State Troopers Academy.

When questioned about the contracting of State Troopers for a local police department, as has been done in Kensi and in Palmer, he said that he felt there were many drawbacks to this

Another answer would be for the area to vote for police service as a service district of the borough. as is now the case for fire protection.

If this were done. borough could contract with the State Troopers or the provide police coverage.

Dankworth estimated that is could cost the area from \$120,000 to \$150,000 a year

GRAVEL NO MARCH OF CRITICIZES DIMES WITHHOLDING CHAIRMAN OF REA FUNDS FOR LOCAL WASHINGTON D.C.- Sen- AREA

ator Mike Gravel has criticized the withholding by President Nixon of funds for the two percent loan program of the Rural Electrification Administration.

These loans, which have provided \$175 million over the past 30 years to 13 Alaskan electrical systems, were recently discontinued by the White House in favor of other loan programs at higher rate of interest.

According to White House statements, the decision was motivated by the President's efforts to reduce federal spend ing.

"I have long been opposed to President Nixon's widespread impoinding of funds for various projects that have been approved by Congress, 'Senator Gravel said. "We in Congress indended to accomplish specific goals with the programs we created and we funded them accordingly. To then have the President flatly refuse spend the money just destroys what we have been trying to do. Such development weaken our constitutional government."

In this instance, 'Senator Gravel continued, "the witholding of REA loan funds is short-sighted. This program has done a great deal to benefit Alaska and has also helped other areas of the country. These loans provided capital for rural electric and telephone cooperaties that was unavailable at any other source.

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


