PERMIT IS GRANTED TO ROSEBUD REFUSE

5000th PHONE INSTALLED IN FIRE LAKE HOME

FIRE LAKE: Matanuska Telephone Association's 5000th telephone is installed at the residence of Ronald and Georgene Reckis in the Upper Fire Lake Area.

The 5000th telephone came after seventeen years of service by the Association.

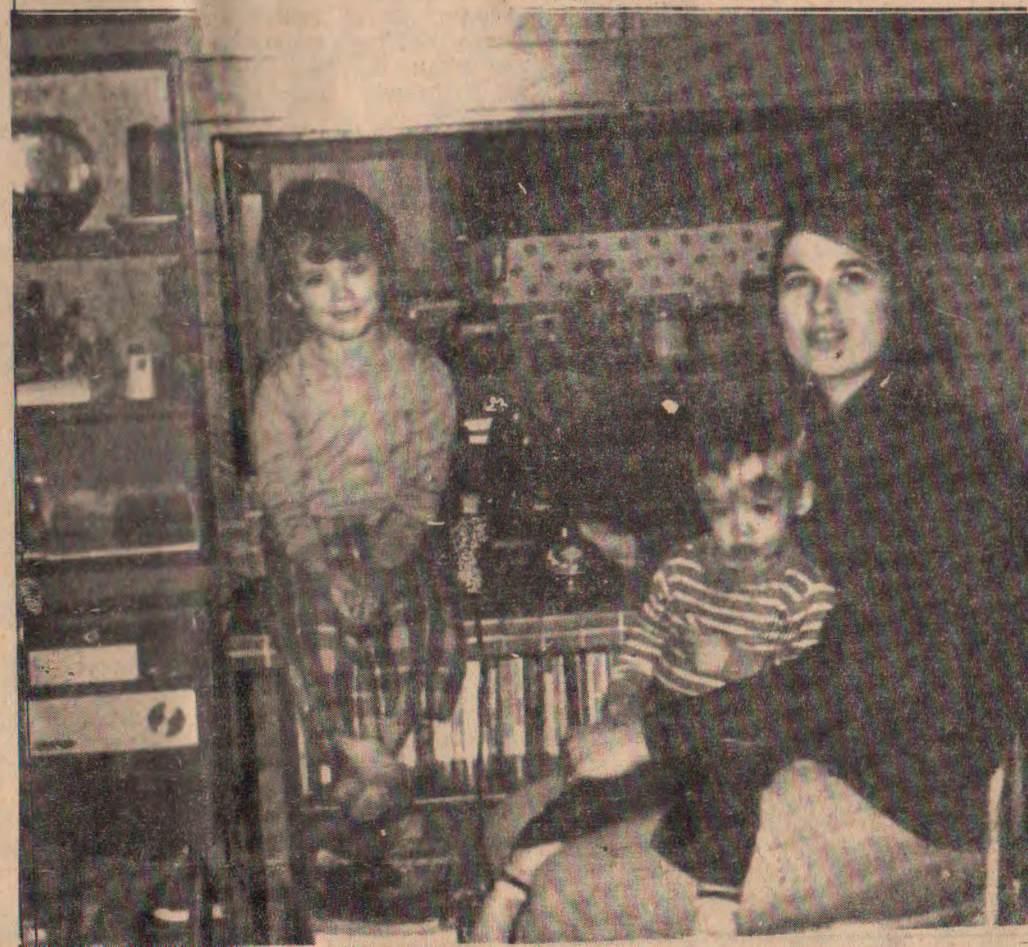
According to General Manager Max Clements present projections indicate the Association's 10,000th telephone will be installed during the next five years.

The telephone itself is a first for M.T.A. It is part of a special line of decorator telephones including candlestick, french and chest telephones, made available by a new provision in the Association's tariff. The provision allows subscribers to purchase the telephones with all routine maintenance being provided through the na-

LOCAL SPORTSMAN IS PRESIDENT OF AK. BIG GAME TROPHY CLUB

ANCHORAGE: Ed Bellringer, of Peters Creek, well known local sportsman, was elected President of the Alaska Big Game Trophy Club at the 10th Annual Meeting held last week at the Captain Cook Hotel.

Bellringer, who is employed as a Wildlife Advisor for the Alaska Air Command, has in the past held high offices in a number of sportsman's organizations in Alaska. He



ANCHORAGE: Rosebud Refuse Company, of Eagle River, has been granted a license to operate a garbage pick-up service in this area by the Alaska Transportation Commission. It was learned this week.

The issuance of the permit was issued following an 18 month battle during which time three public hearings were conducted by the Transportation Commission. During this period, William Pettit, operator of Rosebud Refuse was working with a temporary permit.

In the order, served January 19th, 1973, it was stated that "Applicant William E. Pettit, who does business as Rosebud Refuse Company, is financially able to conduct the transportation service for which he has applied". The order also stated "Applicant Pettit possesses motor vehicle equipment and other real and personal property which is lawfully and reasonably sufficient and/or adequate for conducting the transportation service for which he has applied".

The order goes on to state that "Applicant Pettit has

purchase the telephones with all routine maintenance being provided through the payment of M.T.A.'s regular monthly rates.

General Manager Max Clements explained that this new tariff provision was designed to protect subscribers purchasing decorator telephones from other sources. Many of these telephones require modifications which may actually double their original purchase price, Clements continued.

Total installations during the year 1972 reached 829 telephones. This compares with 269 telephones being installed during a similar period five years ago.

The total amount of telephones installed during December was 115 compared with 35 telephones installed during last December.

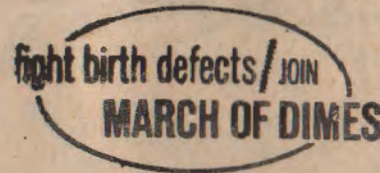
Other officers elected were Vice-President, Dr. Jack Rasmussen, and Norman Grant, Secretary-Treasurer.

The Alaska Big Game Trophy Club was formed in 1962 for the purpose of promoting Fair Chase and Sportsmanship in hunting. The group pioneered Fair Chase, which has since been adopted by the Boone and Crockett Club.

The Club has compiled an official record book of trophies taken in Fair Chase.

Fair Chase, as defined by the Club, is to exclude any game taken with the use of powered air, land or water vehicles for the spotting or herding of a specific big game animal with the view of subsequent pursuit.

Bellringer is an official measurer for the Alaska Big Game Trophy Club, as well as for Boone and Crockett.

MTA BOARD CONCERNED WITH LOAN FUND FREEZE

PALMER: The prime topic of discussion at the January 17 regular Matanuska Telephone Association Board meeting was the recent freezing of Rural Electrification Administration 2% loan funds by President Nixon.

The Board took two actions in response to the freezing of funds. First, the approved a resolution to R.E.A. for approval to secure interim financing in the amount of \$1.2 million. Second, the Board authorized the General Manager Max Clements and Board President Paul Huppert to attend the National Telephone Cooperative Association Annual Meeting in Washington D.C. where a special session has been scheduled with R.E.A. Administrator David Hamil.

General Manager Max Clement explained to the Board that the \$1.2 million in interim financing will be required to finance the 1973 con-

struction season. If interim financing is not secured he continued, the Association program to upgrade service and meet new service requirements will come to a standstill.

A letter from the National Telephone Cooperative Association stating that a special meeting with R.E.A. officials had been scheduled for February 20 directly preceding the N.T.C.A. 19th Annual Meeting was read. The letter stressed that if alternate loan procedures have been established that the attendance at the meeting with Hamil will expedite all pending loan applications.

If alternate loan procedures have not been established, the special session would put additional pressure on R.E.A. and other Federal agencies to establish such alternatives or lift the freeze on 2% loan funds. The board then reviewed

two letters from the Eagle River area to the Alaska Public Utilities Commission asking that the Commission hold hearings on MTA's proposed addition of Cantwell and the Area north of Healy to its certificated area. Both letters expressed strong disapproval of the proposed additions due to present conditions with existing certificated areas.

The Board, after discussing the letters felt no Board action would be appropriate as the letters were addressed to the Commission.

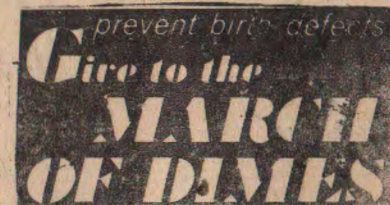
The General Manager presented to the Board his annual salary recommendation. His recommendation was for a six percent increase in all salaried employees' compensation. After some discussion, the recommendation was approved as presented.

plied". The order goes on to state that "Applicant Pettit has sufficient experience in the trucking business, and sufficient knowledge of the governing law and regulations to properly conduct the transportation service which he has applied for."

The order concludes with the statement "Upon compliance with all the requirements of this order, William Elton Pettit, d/b/a Rosebud Refuse Co. shall forthwith be issued a common carrier permit authorizing him to provide transportation service by motor vehicle in intrastate commerce exclusively in the refuse business, and in the following language concerning commodity and territory: GARBAGE REFUSE, TRASH (and other discarded material or articles having no commercial value) BETWEEN points within the area bounded by the Eagle River on the South the Eklutna River on the North and five miles laterally between these points on either side of the Old Glenn Highway, excluding any area set aside as a military reservation."

Pettit stated that he was very happy with the outcome of the hearings, and that he is now free to seek financing to expand and improve his service.

Along with the salary recommendation the General Manager with the concurrence of the Office Manager asked the Board to make the position of Billing Supervisor salaried. Mr. Clements explained that the position does currently entail supervisory responsibility over the Billing Department. In recognition of this position's present responsibility, it was felt the position should not remain on the clerical wage scale. The Board of Directors approved this recommendation.

A write-off list of bad accounts in the sum of \$8,821 was presented to the Board. It was noted that the Association had collected over \$6,000 on accounts which had been disconnected for non-payment. The Board accepted the write-off list as presented.

The Office Manager then presented a projected revenue summary for direct-ory advertising. The projected revenue figure for the Association's 1972-73 directory was over \$12,000 as compared to approximately \$5,000 in advertising revenue for the 1971-72 directory.

The last item to be discussed was the 1973 budget. Gen-

Lucas for Bell, was received December 4th, 1972, for rezoning from U (Unrestricted District) to R-5 (Rural Residential District) of the NE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 and the N 1/2 of the NE 1/4 on Section Lot 1 of Section 18, T14N, R1W, S.M., Alaska containing 155.70 acres for the purpose of constructing a mobile home court, Eagle River Alaska.

The area described is located on the south side of the Eagle River Road between the extensions of Eagle River Loop Road and Eagle River Lane.

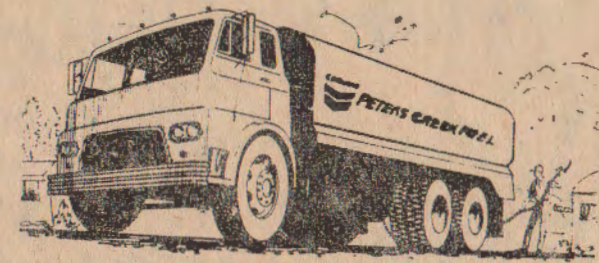

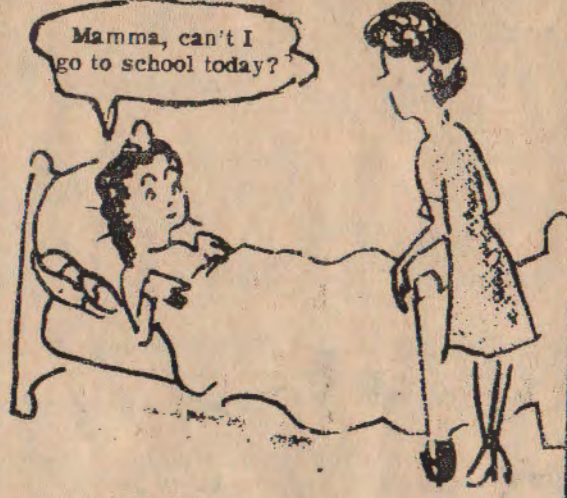

**"Serious Birth Defects Can Result
When Expectant Mother Has VD"**

When a woman has venereal disease during pregnancy, there is double jeopardy. She not only injures herself, she exposes her unborn child to a damaged future.

It is not enough to measure the tragic cost of untreated venereal disease to the person infected. If unchecked, VD

the tragic cost of untreated venereal disease to the person infected. If unchecked, VD has a cruel impact: it can cause severe damage, even death, to an unborn child.

Hospitals around the country are reporting an increased number of innocent VD victims, babies born with venereal infections which can cripple them for life.

Prevention of birth defects is the long-range goal of the March of Dimes, and treatment of congenital damage an immediate goal. Every year in the United States, about a quarter of a million infants are born with physical or mental defects that can deny them full, healthy development.

In the majority of cases, scientists have not yet discovered the causes of these tragedies.

Grim Results

But the grim results of VD acquired at birth need not happen at all. Syphilis and gonorrhea, the two most common forms of venereal disease, can be cured quickly and easily if they are detected early and all infected people receive prompt medical treatment. Medical care in physicians' offices and at public health facilities is confidential and, in a number of states, it is no longer required to obtain permission of parents for the treatment of a minor.

Neglecting VD in the hope that "it will go away by itself" never works. The disease only

becomes more destructive. Untreated syphilis can damage the brain, bones, heart and liver. It can remain hidden for years, then without warning cause mental illness, heart disease, crippling disorders and death. Untreated gonorrhea can lead to sterility, heart damage and arthritis in the mother and can blind her child.

Risks to Unborn

Researchers are working toward development of a vaccine against gonorrhea. As a first step, they are seeking a blood test for the disease. If the test is successful, it can greatly simplify the detection of gonorrhea in expectant mothers.

Until recently, it was believed that gonorrhea never struck an infant until delivery, when it passed through the birth canal and became infected. Now we know that the disease sometimes can reach the fetus before birth if the mother's membranes rupture well before delivery.

Congenital syphilis is an even graver threat to the unborn child. Last year the num-

ber of cases in the newborn rose 31 per cent over 1970. After about the 18th week of pregnancy, syphilis can cross the mother's placenta and harm the baby in a number of ways. At times it may cause death in the womb.

Later Damage

If the infant survives, it may be born extremely small and look wizened or emaciated. Sometimes the skin is covered with sores. If bone damage has occurred, the baby can be crippled, or he may suffer from anemia, enlarged liver and spleen, pneumonia, meningitis, kidney disease, or a combination of these.

Frequently, congenital syphilis is not apparent at birth but creates serious problems later on. It can lead to deformities caused by bone damage, scarred skin, deafness, misshapen teeth, nerve damage, mental abnormalities and early death.

Many public health authorities urge repeated testings during pregnancy for both syphilis and gonorrhea because of the high incidence of reinfection.

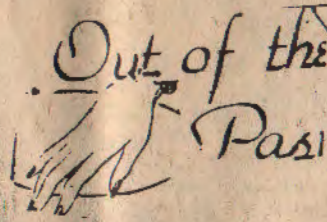

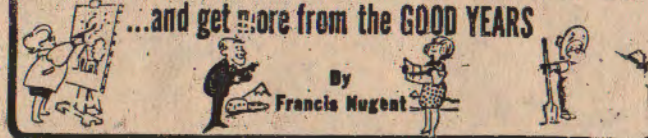

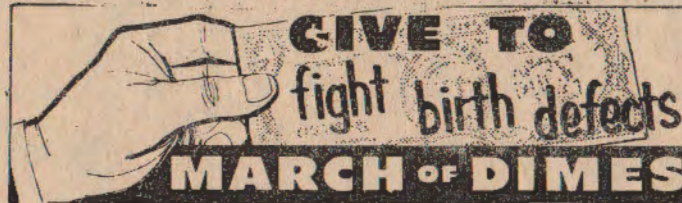
