

KERTULLA SPONSORS IMMEDIATE RECONSTRUCTION OF RIVER AND BIRCHWOOD ROADS

WIND, COLD AND SNOW ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR POWER OUTAGES

PALMER: High winds and heavy snow following the long cold snap caused numerous power outages on MEA's system on Sunday, January 28th.

Eagle River and Big Lake Willow areas were hardest hit. Most of the trouble was caused by snow laden trees being blown into the lines by the strong gusting winds.

Wind also broke wire connections.

Calls reporting power outages in the Eagle River area began coming in early Sunday morning and by Sunday evening, outages had spread to the Big Lake area north to Willow.

Falling trees and wind also knocked out telephone lines, further complicating service restoration work.

As the magnitude of the outages situation developed, the Palmer dispatch operation was set up and the

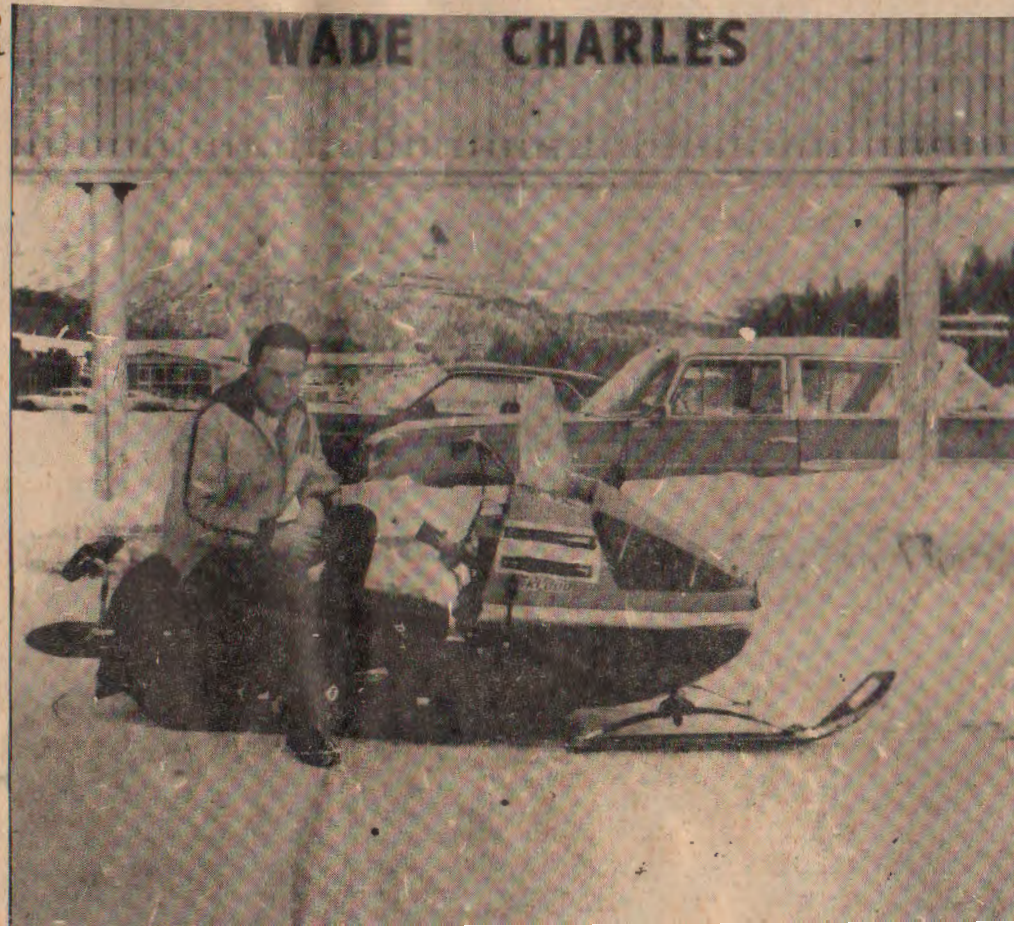
often that at times they could hardly stand up.

At times there were seven men and five trucks involved in the work in the general Eagle River to Mirror Lake area as well as the people answering the Eagle River office telephone.

Two trucks and four men worked the Big Lake-Willow area with two men dispatching from the Palmer office.

Over 530 calls were received. Most repairs were completed in the Eagle River Area by 2:00am. Monday morning and in the Big Lake Willow area by 5:00am Monday morning.

Considering the extremely difficult weather conditions and the hazards involved, MEA's men and women who work throughout the day and night during these emergency conditions deserve a lot of praise for the outstanding jobs they do. These people report in to see what



JUNEAU: Jalmar Kertulla, State Senator from District E, has sponsored a resolution which would call for the Legislature request the Governor direct the Department of Highways to plan for the immediate reconstruction of the Birchwood Loop and the Eagle River Road, by making their reconstruction the highest priority during the 1973 construction season.

Senator Kertulla, in his resolution called attention to the fact that both these roads are heavily traveled arteries and that in addition to the high volume of traffic, are located in densely populated areas.

He also called attention to the unsafe condition of these roads which endangers the motoring public, as well as pedestrians in the vicinity.

He also pointed out that with each passing day, more deterioration occurs and these roads are already beyond the stage where they could simply be repaired.

In a statement to the Knik Arm Courier, Kertulla said that this legislation has gone through the State Affairs

Willow. Falling trees and wind also knocked out telephone lines, further complicating service restoration work. As the magnitude of the outages situation developed, the Palmer dispatch operation was set up and the Eagle River crew-- Hunk Petranovich and Bob Lund-- first responded to calls in the Eagle River Heights where trees had broken the lines down, shutting off power to people in that area. Following that, winds in the vicinity of Al Cross' place broke the main line affecting a large area that included Fire Lake and beyond to Peters Creek and part of Birchwood. A third truck was dispatched from Palmer to assist the two that had moved from the Eagle River Hgts. Later in the evening, a number of reports of small outages were received and another crew and truck was dispatched to the Peters Creek and Mirror Lake area. It seemed as if the storm was moving northerly because about that same time trouble developed in the Nancy Lake-Willow area. The main feeder line at the Wasilla substation was knocked off affecting MEA members all the way out to Big Lake and north to Willow. Line repair and restoration work involved two of MEA's crews in that area. About 11:00pm Sunday night the trouble area moved to above the Eagle River Hgts. up on McCrary Hill where trees had been knocked down on the line by severely gusting winds. Workman rep-

difficult weather conditions and the hazards involved, MEA's men and women who work throughout the day and night during these emergency conditions deserve a lot of praise for the outstanding jobs they do. These people report in to see what they can do as soon as they become aware of trouble developing on the lines. To handle off-duty time trouble calls, MEA has arranged it so that when a member anywhere in the system from Eagle River to Big Lake calls the Power Outage Number, the call will be taken by the trouble-assistance answering service in the Matanuska Hotel in Palmer. A serviceman or service crew is then called out to make repairs and restore service. If there is a major outage, the trouble assistance operator will immediately alert the MEA supervisors, and begin calling dispatchers and crewmen. MEA's operations center is activated and manned by the supervisors and dispatchers who take over the operation. All incoming calls are logged and service crews are dispatched to the trouble areas. Records are maintained, and repair activities are directed from the central headquarters by radio until all service is restored. During major storms, this operation will continue around the clock. As needed, an MEA employee also mans the telephone at the Eagle River office to take calls and

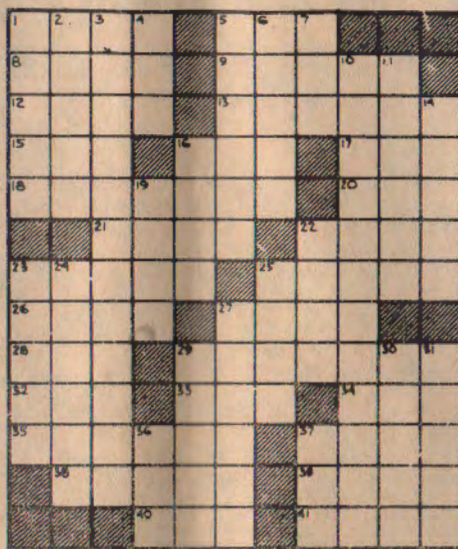

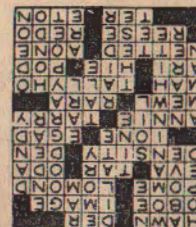
