

HOMICIDE ATTEMPTED IN EAGLE RIVER

LOCAL PEOPLE NAMED FOR BORO POSTS

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Assembly last Monday night re-appointed three local residents to positions on Borough Boards and Commissions.

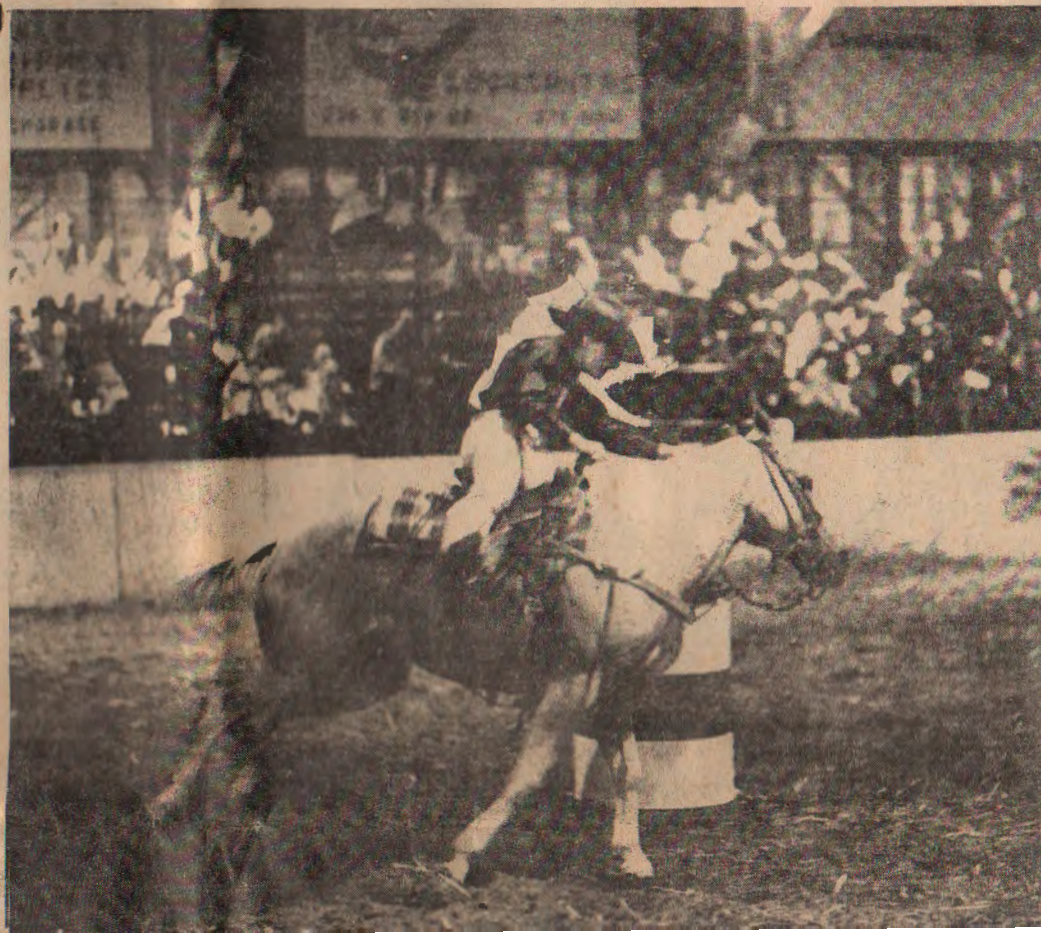

AUTOPSY ON BRAY YOUTH IS NOT CONCLUSIVE

ANCHORAGE: The final autopsy report on the body of 14 year old Charlie Bray failed to divulge the reason why the youth lay down in the snow and remained there until he died of exposure only a few hundred yards from his home.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, there were no marks on his body to indicate violence, nor were there any traces of alcohol or drugs to indicate that he might have been using them that night.

The body of the boy was found near his home in the Debora subdivision on February 16th, almost two weeks after he was reported miss-



EAGLE RIVER: An apparent attempt at homicide was reported today by the Alaska State Troopers, with an Eagle River man the intended victim.

According to the report, Thomas Hawkins, who is employed at Elmendorf Air Force Base was returning home from work Tuesday morning at just after 12:00am. He had just turned onto Farm road (off old Glenn Highway at Mile 14 3/4) when a blast from what was later judged to be a shotgun shattered the drivers side window of his car.

Hawkins escaped with only minor glass cuts.

No further information is available pending investigation by Alaska State Troopers.

This was believed to be a deliberate attempt on Hawkins life, rather than the work of a random sniper according to a spokesman for the State Troopers.

MUSTANGS ARE CLASS A CHAMPS

BIRCHWOOD: "We blew them off the court", were the words Chugiak basketball coach Don Sanders used to describe the game last Saturday when the Mustangs defeated the Ellson Ravens to win the Class A basketball championship.

Chugiak met Ellson after a close opening game last Friday, when they defeated the Palmer Moose 67 to 60.

There was never any question in the game with Ellson.

Chugiak ended the first quarter with a lead of 34 to 13, and when the final buzzer sounded the Mustangs were ahead 68 to 55.

Two Chugiak players, Kelly Samuelson and Durstin Wilson were selected for the All Tournament Team.

This is the first time in the school's nine year history that they have won a tournament championship.

Sanders feels that this is the kind of basketball the team is capable of playing and is looking forward to a great season next year.

TROOPERS INVESTIGATE BURGLARIES

EAGLE RIVER: Alaska State Troopers are investigating two more in the rash of burglaries which have struck the Greater Chugiak Area during the past week.

On February 19th, a report was received of an apparent forced entry to a shed at the Lappo residence at Mile 2.5 Eagle River Road.

The Lappo family was apparently not living at the house since February 1st, and their children were staying with friends and returning to the family residence to feed their dogs. It was on the 19th that they noticed that the shed had been forcibly entered.

It is not determined at this time whether anything had been taken. Whoever had entered the building had apparently dropped a pair of work gloves according to the Alaska State Troopers.

Also under investigation was a burglary which took place at the Donalyn A. Payes home at Lucas Road and Wren Lane in Eagle River.

This incident apparently took place on Monday, February 26th sometime between 7am and 3pm.

Entry to the house was apparently gained through the garage. Items valued at approximately \$2,000 were missing. These included jewelry, a radio and stereo equipment.

MOTOR HOME IS BURNED FOLLOWING COLLISION

PETERS CREEK: A motor-home, owned and driven by Cyrus D. Boring of Anchorage caught fire and burned following a collision at Mile 21.5 Glenn Highway at the entrance to Peters Creek Service.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the accident took place when the driver of the motorhome turned into the path of a southbound 1973 Chevrolet pick-up driven by Patrick M. Henyon of Eagle River.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company responded to the call, but the 1972 Dodge motor home was a total loss.

Damage totaled to the amount of \$13,500 to both vehicles.

Both drivers sustained minor injuries. Boring took knee and Henyon to his hand.

Boring was cited for failure to yield by the Alaska State Troopers.

NONE CITED IN TWO CAR ACCIDENT

EAGLE RIVER: There were no citations given following a two car accident which took place at the intersection of Artillery Road and the Glenn Highway last Monday February 26th at 3:10pm.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the collision took place when a 1972 Mercury driven by Danny Gibson, attempted to avoid a third car which failed to yield and swerved into the path of a 1969 Mercury driven by Debra A. Smith.

Total damage to both vehicles was estimated at \$1,550 by the Alaska State Troopers.

JUNEAU: Applications for absentee ballots must be postmarked no later than midnight, March 2nd, 1973, the Lieutenant Governor H. A. Boucher reminded voters today.

Any application bearing a later postmark cannot be accepted as a request for an absentee ballot for the special election, as stated in the Alaska Statutes.

The Statutes also require each applicant to sign his own request for an absentee ballot. A signed letter to the Lieutenant Governor listing the voter's Alaskan residence and the address to which he wants his ballot mailed is all that is required in the application.

The marked ballot and completed affidavit envelope must be postmarked no later than March 6, 1973, the day of the election.
