LOCAL PRIEST TO REPRESENT CHUGIAK AT TRADE FAIR

EAGLE RIVER: Rev. Peter Houck, of St. Andrews Catholic Church at Eagle River, has offered to represent the Greater Chugliak Area at the Alaska Travel and Trade Fair to be held at the Mayfield Mall, near San Jose, California later this month. Father Peter has attended previous Travel and Trade Fairs held in Los Angeles and in Seattle in 1971. He represented the City of Valdez at these events.

Rev. Houck spoke last Monday to the local Chamber of Commerce, and informed them of his intention to attend the Fair and offered to represent the Community and to pass out any brochures or material

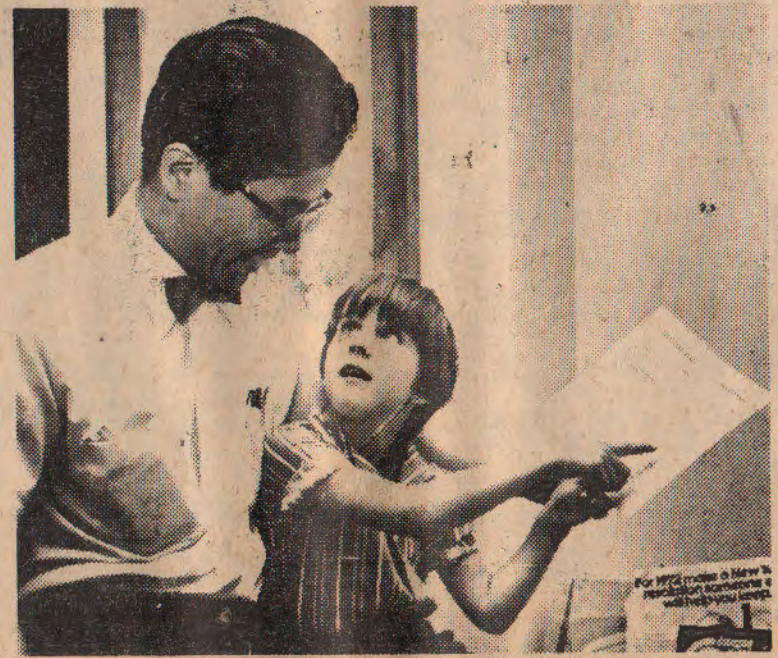
He pointed out that 62% of the tourists who visit Alaska come from California.

TWO COMMITTEES PASS ROAD RESOLUTION

JUNEAU: Word has been received that SCR7, a resolution introduced by Senator Jalmar Kertulla, has been passed by the Senate Affairs Committee and the Senate Finance Committee and is presently in the House State Affairs Committee.

The Resolution calls for the immediate reconstruction of the Birchwood Loop and the Eagle River Roads.

A concurrent Resolution, introduced to the House of Representatives of Al Ose, representative from District 6, calls only for the reconstruction of Birchwood Loop Road.

No word of the progress of the latter resolution was available at this time.

BIRCHWOOD: An education program on drug abuse will be held at the Birchwood Elementary School on Monday, February 12th, at 7:30pm.

This meeting is for parents only, and will feature a panel of guests who have a broad knowledge of the subject, and who have been involved in working on this problem in the community.

Following the showing of the film, "I Think", there will be a brief presentation by the panel. Parents will be encouraged to ask questions about ways of coping with the drug problem, may ask questions about the drug education program to be conducted in grades 4-5 and 6 during the remainder of the week.

This program will be conducted by Trooper Jenkins, of the Alaska State Troopers.

APPROVAL OF HOMESTEAD SCHOOL PLAT HELD UP UNTIL ADDITIONAL LAND IS ACQUIRED

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly voted to advise the Planning and Zoning Commission to hold up the approval of the plat for Homestead Elementary School until an additional 2 acres of land for the school site is acquired.

Mrs. Abigail Dunning, Chairman of the PTA Site Committee advised the Assembly that although 10 acres of land had been called for in original plans for the school, the acreage which had been purchased was only 8,006.1 acres.

The Assembly voted to advise that the Platt approval be held up until the additional acreage could be purchased.

CONFUSION REIGNS IN JUNEAU OVER MILITARY ANNEXATION

JUNEAU: Borough Assemblyman Ed Willis, returning last Friday from Juneau, said that there appears to be considerable confusion and mixed feelings among the members of the Local Government Committee concerning the proposed annexation of Ft. Richardson and Elmendorf Air Force Base by the City of Anchorage.

Willis, along with Borough Assemblyman Jim Garrigues, Jesse Dodson and Walt Parker, and Borough Attorney Sheila Gallagher, had gone to Juneau to voice opposition to the proposed annexation.

Willis said that there is a possibility that public hearings may be called for in the Anchorage Area on the matter.

The legality of the Annexation has been questioned by Attorney General John Havelock, and it is possible that the State

CHAMBER OPPOSES ANNEXATION OF BASES

EAGLE RIVER: The local Chamber of Commerce has gone on record as opposing the annexation of the military bases by the City of Anchorage.

At their Monday meeting the Chamber voted to write to all the legislators asking them to vote against this annexation.

In their letters, the Chamber will list as their objections; the increased cost of education caused by the possible loss of Federal funds the annexation might cause; the possibility that the extension of the borders of the City of Anchorage to the proximity of Eagle River could prevent this area from incorporating as a city (under the present law), the event that if in the future military lands should be declared surplus they should be available to the highest governmental entity (the state or the borough)

Also listed as a reason, is the question of the legality of such an annexation, as stated by the Attorney General.

The Chamber also voted to give their support to a number of pieces of legislation which have been proposed. These include the bill to move the Capital; the bill for stiffer penalt-

ies for repeated offenders; and the bill for stronger narcotics control.

The Chamber discussed the bill calling for the establishment of a State Trooper Post in Eagle River as proposed by Rep. Hartig, and agreed it would be better to support instead getting additional Troopers for the Anchorage Detachment. It was felt that the latter stood a far better chance of being passed, and the Chamber had the word of Colonel Dankworth that if his Detachment were enlarged this area would get additional troopers as a result.

The Chamber will also give their support to Resolutions in both the House and Senate calling for the reconstruction of the Birchwood Loop and Eagle River Roads.

Other matters brought to the attention of the Chamber were the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission to Zone the Eagle River Area B-4. This is not in agreement with the land use plan which was recommended by the Chamber which called for a B-3 classification. B-3 is more in keeping with the balanced community which the majority of the local residents had indicated they prefer-

LITTLE LEAGUE UNIFORMS ARE STILL MISSING

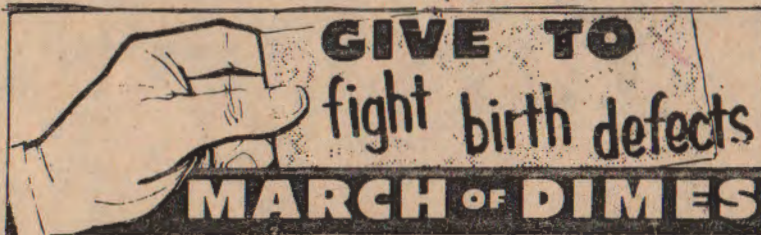
CHUGIAK: Officials of the Knik Little League are becoming increasingly concerned with the failure of a number of last year's team members to turn in their uniforms.

would not recognize the Annexation should the Legislature fail to vote it down. In that event, the City would have to sue in order to attempt to get the shared revenues.

The opinion of the Attorney General is that the bases can not exist in an unorganized borough at the same time as in an organized borough. He feels that if annexation were allowed to take place a loss of 3.5 million dollars if Federal Funds earmarked for education could result.

Although city officials argue that the above is not necessarily true, Willis stated that he hoped the legislature would not gamble when no one is sure just what the results can be.

FIFTY TAKEN AT FT. RICH MOOSE HUNT



TIPS FOR MILADY

FT. RICH: A special permit hunt on Ft. Richardson ended with 50 moose taken, the Department of Fish and Game has announced.

Dimitri Bader, Anchorage game biologist says the hunt was held to reduce the moose population in the area and bring it in line with available winter range, and to reduce the moose/auto collision potential along the Glenn Highway.

Many of the moose now on Ft. Richardson spend most of the year on good summer moose range such as upper Ship Creek drainage.

During the winter, however, the moose are forced together onto small patches of available winter range among developed and heavily populated areas on Ft. Richardson, Mt. View and the Muldoon area.

Of the 34 adult moose taken during the special hunt 28 were cows and 8 were bulls. Sixteen calves were taken, of which 10 were fe-

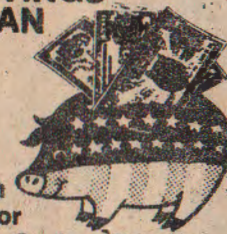

Biologists and Ft. Richardson wildlife agents acted as guides on the hunt to insure safety, to make certain hunters took specific animals and to collect biological specimens.

Aerial surveys flown over the area in the winter of 1971 showed 394 moose.

Surveys flown prior to this year's hunt showed a total of 391 moose, with a good percentage of the moose still at higher elevations.

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
