

PETITION TO ASK WITHDRAWAL OF LOCAL AREA FROM GAAB

WOMAN SERIOUSLY HURT IN ACCIDENT

BIRCHWOOD: A Birchwood woman was seriously injured in a two car accident which took place last Sunday March 18th at 2:55pm at the intersection of North Birchwood Road and Aurora Parkway.

Taken to Providence Hospital by the Chugiak ambulance and suffering from an apparent broken neck was Mary Ponder, the driver of one of the vehicles.

According to the Alaska State Troopers Mrs. Ponder driving a 1973 Sabaru pulled out of Aurora onto Birchwood Road, swung wide and into the path of a 1972 Ford Ranchero, driven by Joyce Conley, of Lower Peters Creek who was west-bound on Birchwood Road.

Mrs. Conley sustained a leg injury in the accident. Fifteen year old Madelyn Kramer, a passenger in the Ponder vehicle sustained only

Nugen, commenting on a meeting of the local government committee which he attended at the Owl Cafe earlier this month stated, "Since this self-appointed committee has met they have accomplished absolutely nothing for the people they are supposed to represent. It was nothing but another big stall. The longer they stall, the less chance the people in the Eagle River Chugiak area have to have any say in what direction they want to go."

Nugen pointed out that the committee had studied five options that were open to the residents of this area. They were, 1. To stay as a service area to the Greater An-

VANDALS DO EXTENSIVE DAMAGE AT CHUGIAK HIGH

BIRCHWOOD: Vandals broke into Chuglak High early last Sunday morning, with resulting damage to structure and equipment estimated in excess of \$3,000.

According to the Alaska State Troopers the GAAB School District Security guard was making a routine check at 1:35am when he noticed a broken window in the school.

He told the State Troopers that he saw three persons inside the building. He gave chase to one on foot, but was unable to catch him. Upon returning to the school he found numerous broken windows, desks and shelves overturned, office machines damaged and fire extinguishers discharged around the building and then thrown through windows.

Approximately \$20.00 worth of postage stamps and some cash was missing from one of the desks in the office.

There is also possible damage to paintings and sculpt-

ure from fire extinguisher chemicals.

State Troopers are still investigating the incident.


Nugen pointed out that the committee had studied five options that were open to the residents of this area. They were, 1. To stay as a service area to the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, 2. to incorporate as 1st or 2nd class city, 3. To withdraw and join the Mat-Su Borough, 4. to withdraw and form our own 2nd class borough, 5. to retain "status quo", and make no changes.

Nugen commented on each of the possibilities. "If we are to stay as a Service Area in GAAB, then we will pay for areawide services in the future, but not enjoy them. The present GAAB planning does not include any significant improvements for our community while many improvements are planned for other areas under the areawide concept."

Nugens did not feel that a local Board of Supervisors would accomplish much. "The Chuglak Board of Supervisors only relates to powers associated with the Chuglak Fire Service District. This Board is only provisional and can be terminated by the GAAB at will. There are no other powers delegated by the GAAB Assembly to this board and there is little hope that additional powers will be forthcoming as the assembly is reluctant to relinquish any powers which are not central to the Borough Administration manipulation and control."

On Incorporation as a 1st or 2nd class city... "The incorporation of Eagle River as a 1st or 2nd class city can only lead to the same city/borough fight that is going

on now between the City of Anchorage and GAAB. If we look ten years into the future then it is not hard to envision this cat and dog fight. There is something to be gained by the past history and we should take advantage of it now."

On withdrawing and joining Mat-Su, "If we were to join the Mat-Su borough, it only stands that we would be switching local governments that are distant to our needs and are not able to understand them."

Nugen completed his comments by saying "The proposition to withdraw from GAAB and form our own 2nd class borough appears to be the only reasonable approach. The matter of local government control has been the main issue for this area in the last two charter elections. We have voted to retain the 2nd class borough in the Greater Anchorage Area in order to stop the type of Chicago politics that will eventually emerge in the GAAB as the area continues to grow. It is now time for this area to make our move and centralize our local government within our area so that we can control it, and stop the back-room and under the table

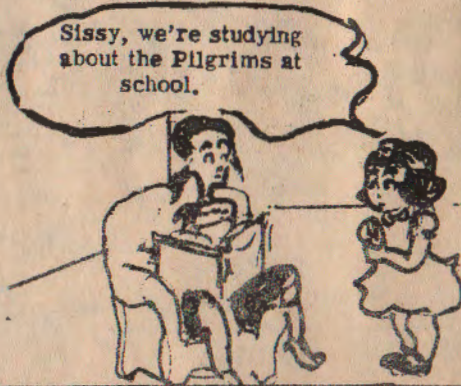

FUNDS GIVEN TO SEA GRANT PROGRAM

FAIRBANKS: A check for \$23,150 to further Arctic marine research was presented to the University of Alaska's Sea Grant Program by representatives of the Alaska Oil and Gas Association (AOGA) in brief ceremonies March 9 at the Sea Grant Offices in Anchorage.

The grant of AOGA's 14 contributing member oil companies will be used for investigations into the dynamics of coastal sea ice, the characteristics of nearshore permafrost and studies of the biodegradation of oil into the Arctic environment. The industry grant supplements \$62,300 in support funds for coastal ice and permafrost studies under the Alaska Sea Grant Program, and Coast Guard support of Arctic oil biodegradation research.

The structure was located in the David Lee Subdivision at Mile 13.5 on the Old Glenn Highway.

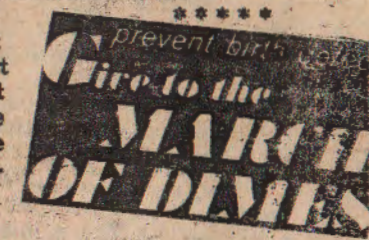

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raffles, giveaway shows that such prizes are taxable. "You must report the value of these prizes on your Federal income tax return," the Internal Revenue Service said.

If the prize is an item of merchandise, you should report its fair market value. Generally, the fair market value is what the item would cost if the taxpayer were to purchase it at a retail store, he added.

Salesmen who win prizes or receive awards in company sales or promotion contests are also subject to tax on the value of the prize, the director said. Such gifts would include vacation trips to resort areas, shares of stock or merchandise. In addition, employee suggestion awards are taxable and should be reported as income on returns, he said.

However, one type of prize is not subject to tax, the director said. There are prizes received in recognition of past achievements in religious, charitable, scientific, educational, artistic, literary or civic fields, where the recipient is selected without action on his part and is not expected to render any further services.
