CHUGIAK: The petitions to withdraw the local area from the Greater Anchorage Area Borough should be drawn up and ready for signatures within a week, according to Leonard Nugens, spokesman for the petition committee.

Nugens stated that the committee is preparing maps which would show the boundaries of the proposed new borough, and designate the seven borough voting precincts which are planned.

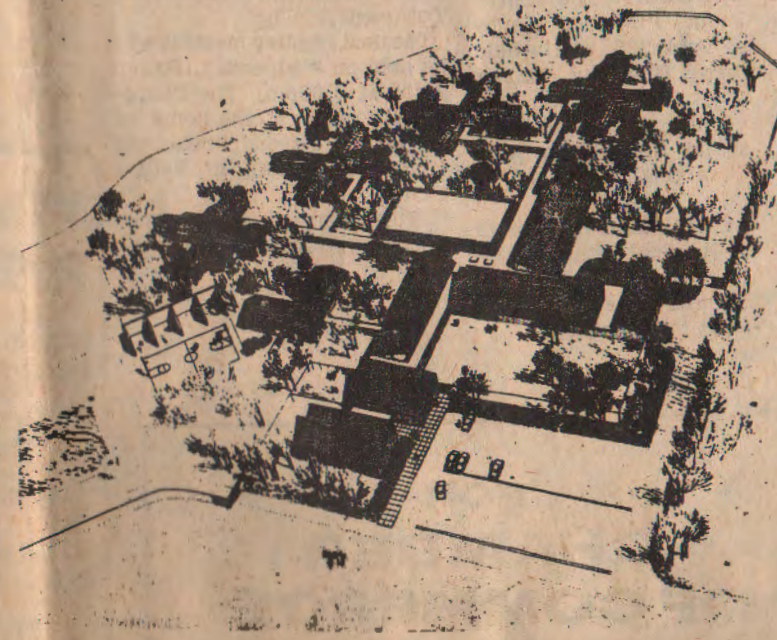
The petition (plans of which were unveiled last week) call for withdrawing the Greater Chugiak Area from the GAAB and forming a new second class borough.

Debbie Wentland, of Birchwood is now able to boast of this doubtful distinction.

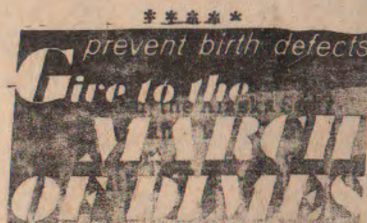
Last Tuesday, March 20th at 7:12pm, the car she was driving hit a moose at Mile 13 on the Old Glenn Highway.

The department presently proposes to hold informal public meetings to discuss the plan in ten Alaskan communities located throughout the State. Further information concerning the exact locations and dates will be published shortly.

In explaining the basic principle of the plan, the Commissioner said, "We are planning to make procedural changes to clarify and improve the existing processes by which the social, economic, and environmental effects of proposed projects are evaluated and to insure that all these factors have been given proper consideration in the final decision making procedure. It is essential that information be gathered and preliminary evaluations made as early as possible in the development of projects.

"The Action Plan," Campbell concluded, "will also indicate, to a great degree, how the State will utilize the expertise of various skills in the investigation of problems, especially those of a non-transportation nature.

Public attitudes concerning plans and individual projects will be a vital ingredient in making decisions in the public interest."

# JUNE SCHEDULED FOR COMPLETION OF CORRECTION CENTER

EAGLE RIVER: June 15th is the scheduled date for the completion of the new South-central Correctional Center in Eagle River, according to Stanley Zaborac, Superintendent for the institution.

The original completion, scheduled for this month (March) was delayed by the usual construction problems experienced in Alaska, Zaborac, explained.

At the present time, Zaborac estimated that the project was 80% completed.

He said that he expects to start hiring staff sometime after July 1st, and that the first inmates would arrive at the Center after October 1st.

Zaborac said that they are planning to hold an Open House sometime close to the end of August. The public would be invited to tour the new facility at this time.

Zaborac is presently occupying a temporary office in the Slanker Building on Artillery Road in Eagle River. He is the only staff at

this time, although he expects he will be provided with a Secretary sometime next month.

At present his duties consist of ordering supplies, drawing up programs and the like.

Zaborac says he encourages local residents to apply for jobs at the Center. He said that while some positions call for college trained personnel, many require only a high school education, and that the department of corrections will train those who will be hired to fill these jobs.

Applications forms for employment at the Center may be picked up at the Eagle River office.

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## EAGLE RIVER CLUB IS RESPONSIBLE FOR U.S. SENATE BILL

WASHINGTON, D.C.: A c from Eagle River is responsible for a bill recently introduced by U.S. Senator Tom Stevens of Alaska.

The bill would exempt commercially manufactured black powder for antique firearms from federal explosive control laws.

The McKinley Mountain Muzzle Loading Rifle Club Eagle River, had pointed out the need for the bill to Stevens. Presently, no more than five pounds of black powder may be purchased at one time.

These sportsmen fire historical rifles under conditions similar to those in the Civil War and earlier, according to Stevens. "The manufacture and load their own ammunition, and some reconstruct their rifles themselves," Stevens said.

"Commercial black powder has seldom been used in bomb devices," Stevens said. "My bill will protect a small but important segment of shooting sportsman. With the interest of the Congress in the reevaluation of our gun control bills, I shall attempt to get the Senate to consider my bill with the others."

The House Finance Committee budget is unrealistic. While allowing for numerous small projects, it completely destroy important programs that are job-intensive. For instance, \$158,000 was deleted from the Alcantra Youth Camp and \$80,000 was deleted from Nancy Lake maintenance, destroying both programs and a great number of jobs. A typical deletion having significant negative effect are the cuts in the student-teacher ratio for State Operated Schools. For instance, a sixteen teacher school has been cut to twelve, a twelve teacher school cut to six, etc. Also, in my opinion, the economic development program has been destroyed, the forgiveness clause of the Scholarship Loan Program has been deleted, and on and on.....

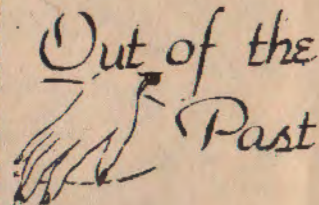
