

CHUGIAK FIRE SERVICE TAX MAY BE REDUCED TO ZERO

BOROUGH TO CRACK DOWN ON ILLEGAL BURN BARRELS

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area can expect tougher enforcement of the "burn barrel" ban in the future, according to a spokesman from the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Department of Environmental Quality.

From the number of local residents who still burn refuse in barrels, the Borough thinks that they may not be aware that burn barrels are illegal in areas where refuse collection is available.

Local fire departments are authorized to extinguish any burn-barrels which are brought to their attention, and to issue warnings to the householder. Anyone who continues to burn refuse after being warned will be issued a citation.

SPELLING CONTEST THIS WEEKEND IN ANCHORAGE

ANCHORAGE: If the Borough Mayor's proposed budget is approved by the Assembly, the mill rate for the Chugiak Fire Service District will go from 1/2 mill to zero mills, according to a spokesman for Mayor Rodrick.

While the proposed budget calls for increases in the mill rate in many other borough service districts, the residents of the Chugiak Fire District may be receiving the service without having to pay any tax at all.

The reason for this unprecedented situation was explained by a member of the Mayor's budget staff. It appears that Chugiak's share of State shared revenues are sufficient to cover the Fire District without any additional funds that would be derived by taxing the residents of the area.

Chugiak is the only Fire District in the borough that is completely served by a volunteer fire company. It is also the only Service District in the Borough which is administered by an elected Board of Supervisors.

The Eagle River Fire Service District, which is manned by a paid fire department will see no increase in taxes. Eagle

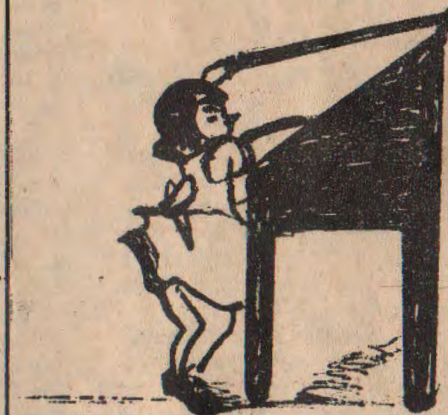
ANOTHER "IN SERVICE" DAY AT CHS

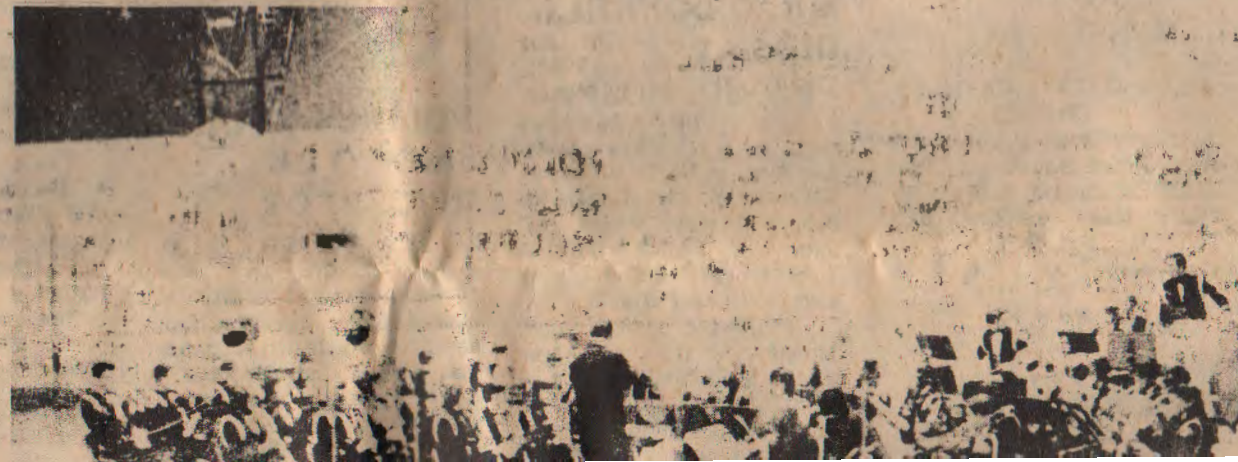

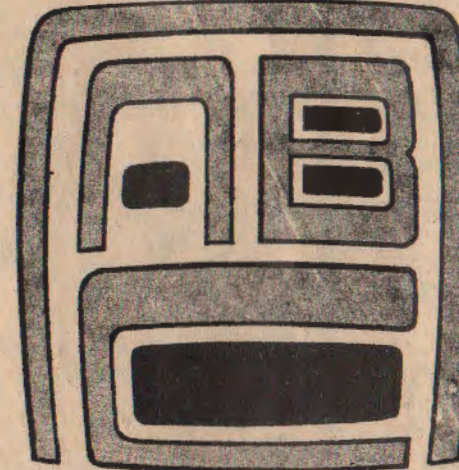

The nature of the illness in either was not disclosed.

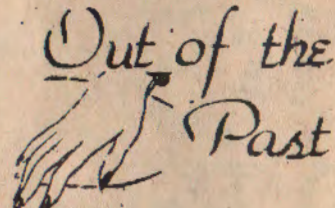
