## CHUGIAK SUPERVISORS UNHAPPY ABOUT TAX CUT

### PUBLICATION TO PUSH FOR NEW BOROUGH

CHUGIAK: A new area publication which is aimed at gaining support for the separation of the Greater Chugiak Area from the GAAB has made its appearance.

Named the "New (you name it) Borough Bulletin", the mimeographed newsletter is being distributed throughout the area by the New Borough Steering Committee.

This first issue of the bulletin includes a map which shows the boundaries of the proposed new borough (the map is reprinted in this issue of the Courier), also the reasons behind the move to form a new borough are outlined.

The publishers of the bulletin have tentatively referred to the proposed new borough as the "New Knik Borough", although it is understood that when and if the matter comes to a vote by the residents of the area, they would also probably be asked to vote on a name for the borough also.

Leonard Nugen, spokesman for the new borough steering committee, promises that future issues of the bul-

Nugens said that they intend to prove that a mill rate can be developed based upon the facts outlined. ### RESIDENTS PROTEST PLATTING OF HOMESTEAD SCHOOL

ANCHORAGE: A petition protesting the platting of the area around the Homestead Elementary School in Eagle River was presented to the Borough Assembly last Monday night.

The petition bore the required signatures of 20% of the residents of the area involved.

The portest concerned the concern of the residents that the borough would be able to select the additional acreage now in private ownership which is needed to bring the school grounds up to the standard area for borough elementary schools.

Earlier this year the borough assembly had okayed the acquisition of 2 additional acres by the school administration. It was pointed out that this gave the school property an unsuitable configuration, and that by acquiring an additional .9 acres, the configuration of the property would be more uniform.

A motion was made to remand the replatting back to the Platting Board, author-



CHUGIAK: With the Borough Mayor's proposed budget drawing flak from all quarters, the most unlikely source of criticism was from the Board of Supervisors of the Chugiak Fire Service District the only one in the borough to experience a tax cut rather than an increase in mill rate.

Robert Kallenberg, Chairman for the Chugiak Board of Supervisors explained why he plans to ask the Borough Assembly to restore the .5 mills that the Mayor had proposed be reduced to zero.

Kallenberg said that at the time the Board of Supervisors drew up the budget for the coming year the annual report for 1971-72 had not been published, and the budget was based on their estimate of shared state revenues plus an estimate of \$9,000 to \$10,000 in tax revenue.

The subsequent publication of the annual report in February showed that not only had the Board of Supervisors underestimated the \$25,000 in state shared revenues by \$20,000, but they had also underestimated the tax revenues.

Kallenberg reminded the residents of the Fire Service District that back when the District was formed he

Juanita Hahn, of Mile 18, Old Glenn Highway, said that she could not say just when the jewelry was taken.

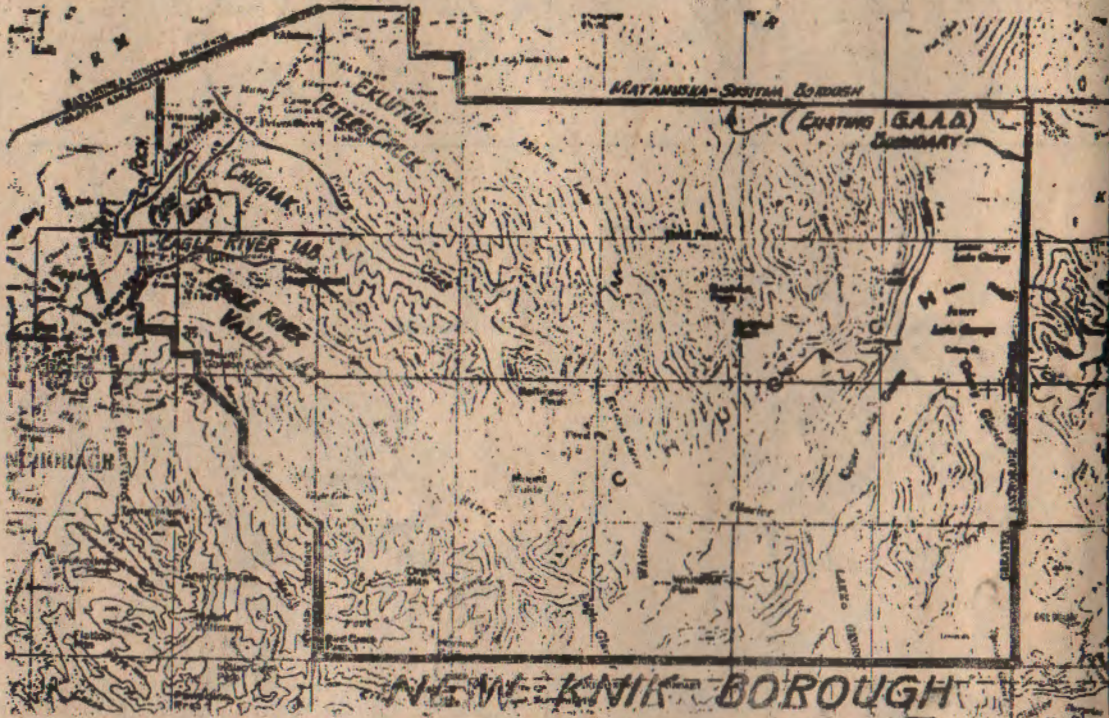
Alaska State Troopers reported that there was no evidence of forcible entry.

## MAN WOUNDED IN SHOOTING AT LOCAL BAR

**PETERS CREEK:** A Fort Richardson man was wounded in a shooting which took place in the parking lot of the Half Way House bar at mile 23, last Sunday, April 15th.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Tommy L. Jackson, age 25 was wounded in the stomach with a 357 magnum revolver following a reported argument.

The incident took place at 7:30pm on that day. An unconfirmed report indicated that Jackson might have been wounded accidentally

while trying to intervene in an argument between Andrew J. Crane, the welder of the revolver, and an unidentified third party.

Jackson was transported to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the Chugiak Ambulance. State Troopers interviewed Crane, but have made no arrest pending further investigation.

No information as to the seriousness of Jackson's wound was available.

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revenues by \$20,000, but they had also underestimated the tax revenues.

Kallenberg reminded the residents of the Fire Service District that back when the District was formed he had pledged to hold the tax to .5 mills.

He said it has been the policy of the board of supervisors to provide the very best service that can be had for the .5 mills.

When the budget was drawn up for this year, it was limited to what the board thought would be coming in at .5 mills based on the figures available at that time. Although some items were deleted from the budget to keep the mill rate from being raised higher than the .5

Kallenberg said that the surplus of State Shared revenue would make it possible to buy the new class A pump-er the fire company needs and still keep the pledge to stay under .5 mills.

He pointed out that in the six years the Fire Service District has been in existence they have with an operating budget of \$7,500 to \$9,000 per year in taxes, constructed one 4 stall fire hall in Old Chugiak, a 2 stall fire hall in Birchwood, have purchased an ambulance, a 4 wheel drive crash wagon, a new fire truck and provided the volunteer firemen with the necessary protective clothing. This plus bringing the Fire Company out of debt.

Kallenberg pointed out that the next goal in fire hall construction, a station in the Peters Creek Area is pending the construction of the new highway in that area.

### REP. HARTIG REPORTS TO CHAMBER

EAGLE RIVER: Representative Bob Hartig, reported to the local Chamber of Commerce last Monday on the recent legislation session.

It was apparent that any benefits to the local area were what had spilled over from legislation benefiting Anchorage.

The most apparent of these was in the area of law enforcement. With the addition of five more State Troopers to the Anchorage Detachment, the possibility was seen that Major Dankworth would honor his promise to the Chamber and assign one trooper to be on patrol in the Greater Chugiak Area with continuous 24 hour coverage.

Hartig also reported on the Drug enforcement bill which gives the State Troopers \$350,000 for enforcement of drug violations, and the legislation on methadone treatment and other drug rehabilitation.

He also reported on the bill which allowed the city of Anchorage to annex the two military bases and by that act bringing the City Limits of Anchorage right up to Eagle River.

Regular Chamber business included the survey of phone problems which the chamber has been conducting among the membership.

It was decided to continue the survey for another two week period before reviewing the results.

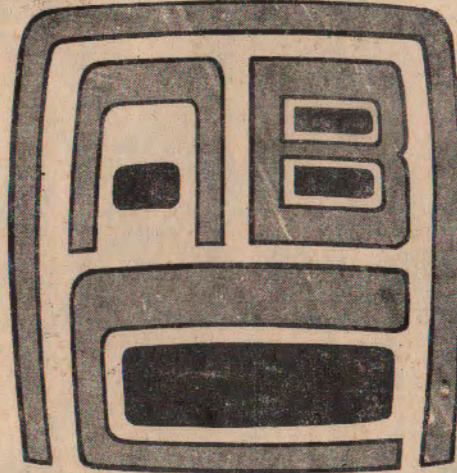
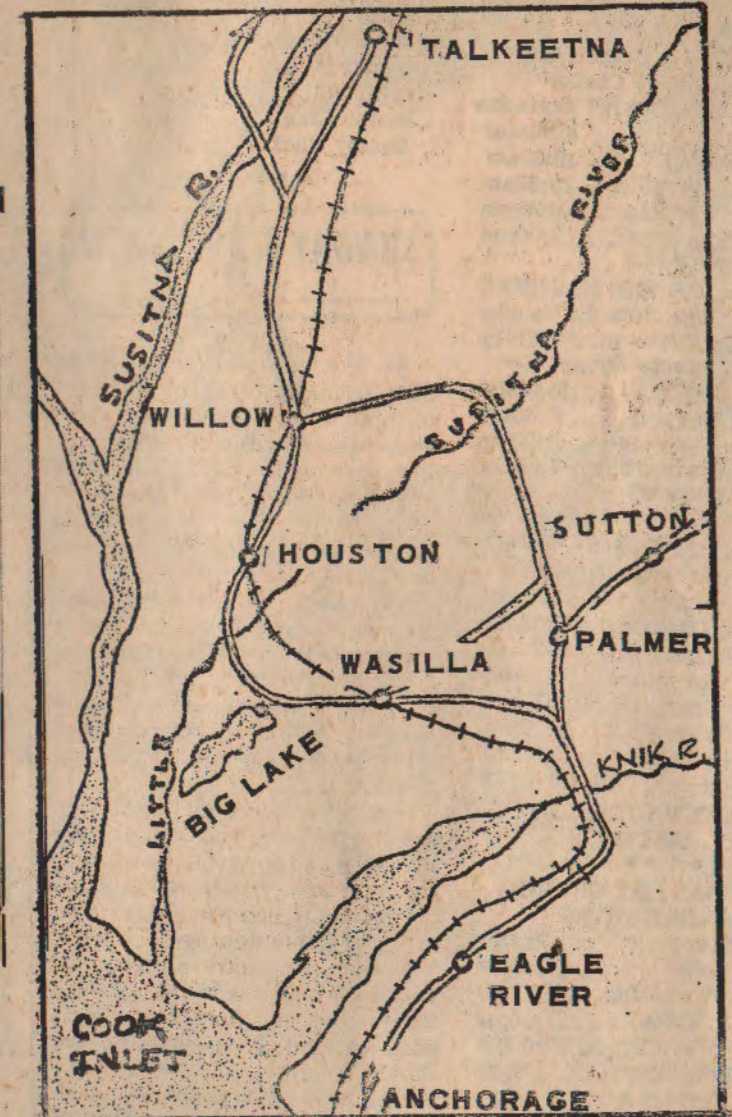

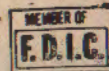

## Today's Health News

**When little Marie Hothand** burned her finger on the stove, she cried for 10 minutes while her parents argued about what to do. Mrs. Hothand reached in the refrigerator for a stick of margarine to rub on the wound, but her husband insisted on using baking soda. Both of them were wrong, victims of old wives' tales that make good reading but little medical sense. Grease, ointments, and baking soda are not recommended for burns, according to the doctors surveyed by Today's Health. Today, immersion in cold water and application of ice are the recommended treatments.

But that's not all, according to our medical experts. Here, then, is their list of other medical fallacies to be avoided in emergency situations.

Tourniquets are out — they destroy tissue and stop circulation. Instead, stop excess bleeding by applying pressure to the wound. Use a tourniquet only when a decision must be made between loss of life or loss of limb.

A slap on the back is a good greeting for an old friend, but for one who is choking, it may be a goodbye. Most choking situations arise when a large chunk of food is lodged in the throat. A slap on the back will only cause the victim to involuntarily gasp in air and suck the blockage down further. Yet, in most cases, the solution is simple: Open the victim's mouth and reach into the back of the throat with a finger and hook out the object, being careful not to push it further down. If unable to reach the obstruction with a finger use a fork, salad tongs, anything that will serve the purpose.

Iodine and other antiseptics, once daubed on every wound, also have lost ground to washing with water. Medical

risk of side effects. And, finally, for cases of poisoning, stay away from the concoctions touted as universal antidotes (this includes the old home-brewed mixture of burned toast, tea, and milk of magnesia!). All of the physicians interviewed by TH recommended that syrup of ipecac, available at any drugstore, be included in every medicine chest. Ipecac is used to induce vomiting and should be given except when definitely contraindicated as in poisoning from a petroleum product, bleach, lye, and other alkali solutions, which often call for stomach pumping. Nor should vomiting be induced if the victim is unconscious or suffering from convulsions.

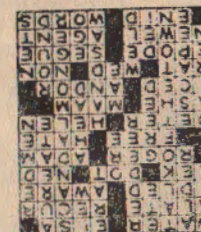

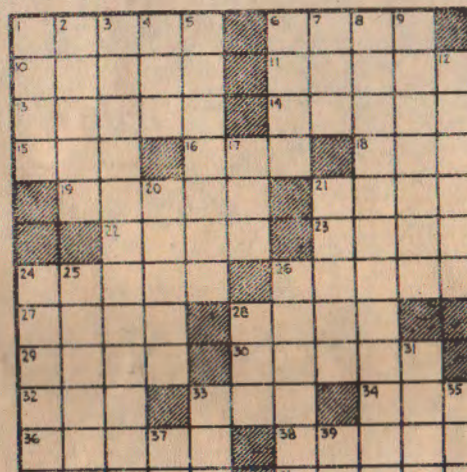
