## PLANS CONFIRMED FOR INDUSTRIAL PARK AT BIRCHWOOD

**BIRCHWOOD:** Plans for the development of an industrial park on lands adjacent to the Birchwood Yards of the Alaska Railroad were confirmed today by Howard Parks, of the State Department of Labor.

Parks said that his office had made an inquiry to the Alaska Railroad Engineering section as to their plans for the properties adjacent to the facilities at Birchwood.

It was learned that the ARR plans to develop this property as an industrial park because of its key location and accessibility to the Anchorage area market.

Preliminary drawings, including layout of additional railroad spurs are in print.

The spokesman for the ARR engineering section explained to Parks that available land for industrial use ad-

**EAGLE RIVER:** One way traffic on Eagle River bridge will be enforced during repairs which are scheduled to begin on May 15th, according to Guy Green, Construction Engineer for the Anchorage District.

The repairs are to be to the concrete surface of the bridge, which when tested last year, showed wear at some points down to where the reinforcing steel was exposed.

Repairs will be made to one lane at a time, with traffic controlled by signal lights. Poles for the installation of the lights are already in place at either end of the bridge.

Plans call for the removal of from 1/4 inch to 2 inches of old concrete and replacing it with a layer from 3 to 4 inches thick of new surfacing.

The Eagle River bridge is the first structure in a series of bridge repairs scheduled for this summer.

Next in line are Knik River bridges 1 and 3 and the King River bridge.

Preliminary drawings, including layout of additional railroad spurs are in print. The spokesman for the ARR engineering section explained to Parks that available land for industrial use adjacent to rails has become scarce in the GAAB. He cited the fact that such properties in the Anchorage area were all leased or otherwise taken up by industry or zoned for residential use as in Spenard.

He further stated, in effect, that the growing congestion in the immediate Anchorage Area made it inevitable and only a matter of time before the Birchwood industrial property is developed.

Parks also told of an inquiry made to the Division of Aviation concerning property in the same immediate area at Birchwood Airstrip.

He learned that a "Master Plan" for airport expansion is being drawn up. The biggest and most urgent need is for the expansion of parking facilities and parking aprons.

This planning is in response to a projected increase in traffic and the increased use of facilities.

The application of a double bituminous sealer for the runway surface is also being considered.

Design work would be accomplished in the winter of 1973-74 with construction to begin in 1974.

A preliminary figure of \$200,000.00 for parking expansion was mentioned with the qualification that a firm figure awaits completion of design and total scope of expanded facilities.

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The theme for the show this year is "Faces of the North," or "Mugshots, Alaskan Style". This refers to portraits, and a special prize is offered to the painting which best interprets the theme.

With the exception of the theme award, which is judged by popular vote, with all persons attending the art show being asked to cast ballots on which entry they think best in each of the categories.

Entries are divided into three categories, Oil and Acrylics, Mixed media and Three Dimensional Art.

Judging will continue until 4:00pm on Sunday, and the ribbons will be awarded as soon thereafter as the votes can be tallied.

Show hours are 10am to 8pm on Friday, April 27th, Noon until 8pm on Saturday April 28th and Noon until 6pm on Sunday, April 29th.

The Chugiak Ladies Club will purchase one of the paintings in the show and present to the High School to become a part of the collection of original art work the club started for the school seven years ago.

**EAGLE RIVER:** When an Eagle River resident discovered a moose lying down in the yard of her home last Tuesday morning, she called the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

The animal appeared to be either sick or injured, according to the protection officer who responded to the call, and was unable to get up when he approached her.

He said the clotted blood on the animal's flank led him to believe she might have been struck by a car, although there was no recent report of a moose walking away from a collision.

After shooting the ailing animal, he instructed the personnel who dressed the carcass out to bring the liver to a veterinarian to determine the reason for the animal's problem.

The moose was a cow, approximately 4 years old. She was discovered in the yard of Alice Moore on Coronado Road.

**OLD KNIK RIVER BRIDGE TO BE REPLACED**

PALMER: A replacement for the old Knik River bridge built in 1936 and structurally weakened in the 1960's by an over-tall truck striking the crossmembers, will be built this summer.

Senator Jalmar Kerttula, of District D, was notified this week by highways commissioner Bruce Campbell that the bridge project would go to bid next month.

Federal bridge replacement funds had been applied for some time ago by Campbell.

Apparently the recent load restrictions placed on the bridge convinced the federal decision makers, although pressure from residents pushed the load limits back up last fall.

The bridge, originally estimated to cost \$3.5 million, is not planned for construction at \$2.5 million.

Only 500 feet across the river will be a bridge span. The remaining distance will be covered on the west side with fill.

The bridge will be built downstream from the present one.

VFW TO HOLD

**MTA GRANTED RECORD LOAN**

PALMER: A \$4,686 million loan to Matanuska Telephone Association was granted this week, according to Senator Mike Gravel.

The five percent 35-year loan was authorized by the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act.

The loan is larger than all others taken out by MTA combined, in its 16 year history, according to general Manager Max Clements.

Previously \$3,911 million had been expended.

MTA hopes that current rates will be maintained despite an interest increase and jumps in material and labor costs, Clements said.

A major purpose of the loan he said, is to upgrade all MTA phones so that no one line in the system will carry more than four parties.

This is to be accomplished within three years, he said.

Many lines close to an exchange center will be completely private, he added.

One-party service only is slated within two years for Eagle River subscribers. Chuglak users already have only private lines.

Over the next five years. MTA expects to use the loan to connect 3,769 additional subscribers and put in 24 miles of new cable.

A second story on the association's existing head-

quarters in Palmer is to be constructed, hopefully this season.

A 5,000 square foot warehouse will also be built in the Palmer vicinity, with the Palmer industrial park being eyed as a location.

New exchanges and buildings are slated for Willow and Talkeetna.

The new service areas at Cantwell and Clear are to be hooked into MTA's general system late this year, Clements concluded.







The best age of a babysitter will vary, depending on the person. Some twelve or even eleven year olds are very capable and dependable,

while on the other hand, there are some in their late teens that I wouldn't trust to baby sit my dog.

A boy can be a very capable baby sitter, but most boys are a little leery of very small babies. I would not recommend a boy for a sitter if your children are all girls.

A boy or girl with younger brothers or sisters is usually the best one to get for a sitter, with the exception of older women. An older person makes the best sitter, although they usually charge a little more.

I suggest you talk to some of your neighbors and ask them to recommend someone reliable.





## IRON SHOT LAW DUE

**JUNEAU:** "Waterfowl hunters in Alaska may have to use iron shot within three years," Dan Timm, waterfowl biologist with the Department of Fish and Game said today.

The federal Fish and Wildlife Service is moving toward a 1975 target date of converting from lead to iron shot for waterfowl hunting.

"A cooperative study between the federal government and ammunition manufacturers initially shows iron shot to be only slightly less effective in killing waterfowl," Timm said.

Last year iron shot was tested in seven areas across the country. Timm indicated that hunters generally were satisfied with the shot.

Additional tests will be made throughout the United States this coming season.

"We are hopeful that Alaska will be nominated to help with the tests. If we are selected, free shell will be distributed to hunters at a few areas in the state," Timm said.

Duck losses due to lead shot poisoning have been estimated at between five and seven million annually.

Ducks pick up the shot from the bottom while feeding and lead is ingested into the
