The girl, Sandra Cannon, of Dillingham, who lives at Start Rt. A Box 175 in Eagle River while attending AMU was in the company of a group of other AMU students who were climbing the North Face of Eagle River canyon.

While climbing, the girl was struck in the back with a rock which caused her to fall approximately 30 feet down a cliff. This took place at approximately 8:50pm on Saturday, March 31st.

Rance Brannon, age 19 a member of the party believed to be the girl's brother, came down the mountain and notified Rescue 3, of the Borough Fire Department from the Eagle River Station.

At 7:10pm the ambulance, manned by Captain Fielding, engineer Bartholomew, and firefighter Lamb arrived at Lucas and Raven Drive. While Lamb remained with the ambulance, Fielding and Bartholomew climbed the mountain and

MEA ANNUAL MEETING TO BE IN CHUGIAK THIS YEAR

PALMER: For the first time an Annual Membership Meeting of the Matanuska Electric Association will be held in the Greater Chugiak Area it was announced today.

ing, engineer Bartholomew, and firefighter Lamb arrived at Lucas and Raven Drive. While Lamb remained with the ambulance, Fielding and Barthelemew climbed the mountain arriving at the side of the injured girl at 8:45pm.

The girl appeared to be suffering from a broken back and Captain Fielding relayed a message to Rescue Coordination, requesting that a helicopter be sent. Rescue Coordination responded, saying that a night pick-up of a patient with a broken back was extremely dangerous, and should not be attempted unless absolutely necessary.

Foot teams of of Emergency Medical Service personnel then started toward the victim, one from the bottom of the mountain and one across the face. E.M.S. Marshall and Wood were forced to turn back, but E.M.S. Teutel continued until he reached the victim.

The foot crew which started at the bottom arrived with blankets, coffee, etc.

Major Clare of Rescue Coordination then okayed a HC 130 to make flare drops and a helicopter to drop survival gear. After the gear was dropped, it was decided by the crew that a cable lift was possible. A helicopter with a winch was dispatched and the victim was cable lifted to the copter and flown to Providence Hospital. There it was determined that her back was not broken, only badly bruised.

After the rescue, Captain Fielding escorted the remaining climbers down the mountain.

The rescue finally was accomplished at 3:04am. on

Flethcer; Chairman Russell Train, of the President's Council on Environmental Quality and his Special Assistant, Mrs. Shirley Temple Black, the Honorary Chairman of 1973 National Wildlife Week (March 18-24).

Also on the program which focused on "Land Use and Related Energy Problems" were Atomic Energy Commission Chairman Dr. Dixy Ray, former Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, Maurice Strong, the noted director of the U.S. Secretariat on the Environment; Everest climber and ecologist

Barry Bishop; famed wildlife naturalist, Dr. Roger Troy Peterson and television personality Arthur Godfrey.

Just prior to the three-day session, First Lady Pat Nixon formally dedicated the Federation's new 20 acre Laurel Ridge Conservation Education Center in Northern Virginia. Assisting Mrs. Nixon were Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz and Interior Under Secretary John Whitaker.

WITNESS CONVENTION REPORT

ANCHORAGE: Jehovah's Witnesses focused attention on rulership during their two-day convention held at Anchorage this past weekend.

Sunday afternoon 70 delegates from Chugiak were among the 1472 persons who heard P.G. Ronco, Branch Overseer for Alaska and the Yukon, deliver the public address, "Decide Now for Divine Rulership."

Ronco stated, "That rulership is of world-wide concern is evidenced by political activity, given much attention in the news today. This often distracts persons from recognizing the supreme rulership by God over the entire universe."

Ronco continued by stating that each person must decide whether he will advocate divine rulership.

"It is easy," he warned, "to give mere verbal acknowledgment of God's rulership; but do we manifest in our lives the significance of that rulership? Truly advocating divine rulership involves the whole range of one's life - how we 'walk' each day."

CAR BURNS DESPITE AID FROM SCHOOL BUS DRIVER






PROPERTY FROM BURGLARIZED HOME RECOVERED

EAGLE RIVER: Some of the items taken from a burglarized home in Eagle River, have been recovered by the Alaska State Troopers.


Dear Another etc.

Now you see it, now you don't . . . It's plastic that solves its own litter problem by "disappearing" when exposed to the sun's ultraviolet rays. Developed by James Guillet, Ph.D., of the University of Toronto, the plastic becomes brittle when discarded in the environment and is broken into small particles by natural erosive forces: wind, rain, and waves. As the particles become part of the natural soil, they are susceptible to biological breakdown. (Substances which are subject to this natural, biological process are termed "biodegradable".) Conventional plastics, on the other hand, are not biodegradable and can be expected to last at least several years.

This year American companies will be able to experiment with the manufacturing process that converts conventional plastics into these biodegradable plastics. The new plastics will cost an estimated 10 to 15 percent more to produce and currently are being tested in Europe. They've also been approved for some food packaging by the Canadian government.

But store owners and house

keepers can rest easy; the plastics will not biodegrade before their eyes, spilling package contents onto floor and shelf. The decomposition will not occur indoors, not even if products are displayed under an artificial light or in a window. Why? Because ultraviolet rays, the triggering mechanism, can't pass through glass and aren't present in artificial light.

Sight-savers . . . One in every 20 pre-school-age children in the United States has a vision problem. Moreover the sight-problem may go undetected until the child is well into his school years. But now parents can test their child's vision while he is still at home with a free eye testing kit, checking for problems that, if not corrected, could interfere with the child's development. The kits are available, at no charge, from the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness. To obtain one, write NSPD Home Eye Test Kit, 79 Madison Avenue, New York, NY 10016.


