CHUGIAK: “Second Class City Status as proposed by Mayor Roderick and Assemblyman Willis will afford no protection against unification!” stated Leonard Nugens, spokesman for the New Borough Steering Committee.

Nugens was commenting on statements attributed to Roderick and Willis which appeared recently in the Anchorage press and on a television newscast.

Nugens pointed out that while incorporation of the local area into a 2nd class City as recommended by the Mayor and Assemblyman might afford protection against annexation of portions of the incorporated area by the City of Anchorage, that in the event Unification is ever brought to vote again and passed, the 2nd class city would be swallowed up along with Girdwood and all other incorporated municipalities in the Greater Anchorage Area.

ANCHORAGE: The proposed exchange of land at the Chugiak Carnival grounds for the site presently occupied by the Chugiak Elementary School has been granted priority by the Bureau of Land Management it was learned today.

Norma Coleman, of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough said that she had inquired as to the status of the land swap, and was told that while no official action has been taken, the item will be granted priority.

As proposed the Bureau of Land Management would approve an exchange of the Carnival Ground acreage for the existing school site (including all improvements) so that the replacement school could be built on the exchanged land.

Ms. Coleman said that while no construction could begin until official approval was granted, she is confident that with the priority, approval might be received in time to at least get forms poured before the end of the 1973 construction season.

With the exception of the election of officers, high point of interest was the drawing for the numerous door prizes offered by MEA.

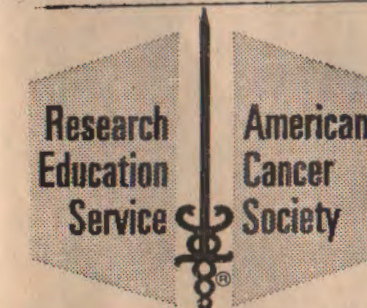
The Grand Prize a color TV set was won by one Wasilla Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars. The Wasilla VFW Post also won an electric heater.

AMMENDMENT TO FAVOR SENIOR CITIZENS

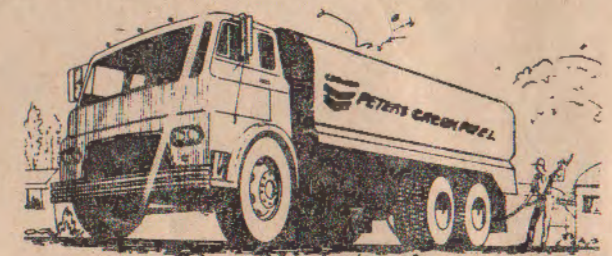
WASHINGTON, D.C.: Senator Ted Stevens has introduced an amendment favoring the country's senior citizens, allowing them to receive the full amount of both longevity bonus and assistance from the federal government to the aged, blind and disabled.

Senator Stevens said currently anyone receiving longevity bonuses, such as those provided by Alaska, consequently receives a smaller amount of federal

aid.

"Because of the harsh climate and high cost of living, many Alaskans found their retirement insufficient to meet their needs in Alaska and were forced to move to the lower 48," according to Stevens.

Continued the Senator, "The bill I am introducing today would make it possible for the senior citizens of Alaska and of any other state where a program such as the longevity bonus is in effect to realize the benefits of such programs without losing or reducing their entitlements to public assistance."

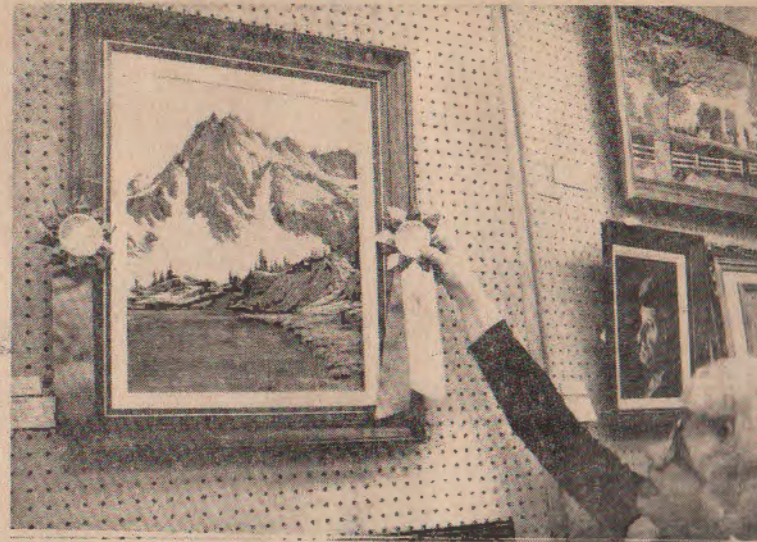

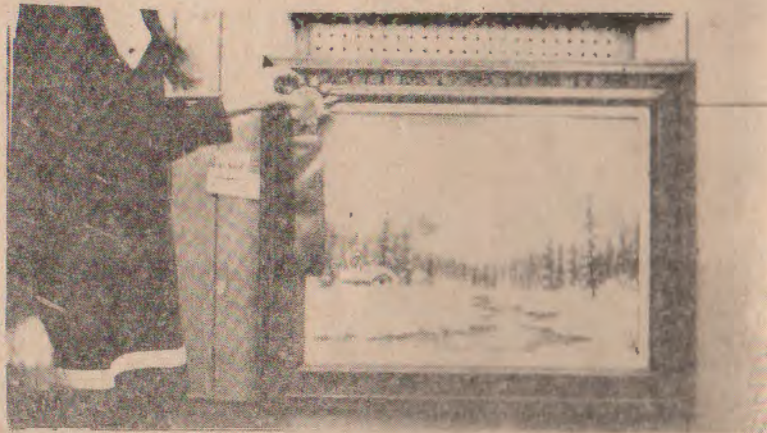

A point of interest in the show was an exhibit of the Japanese art of Bunka embroidery.

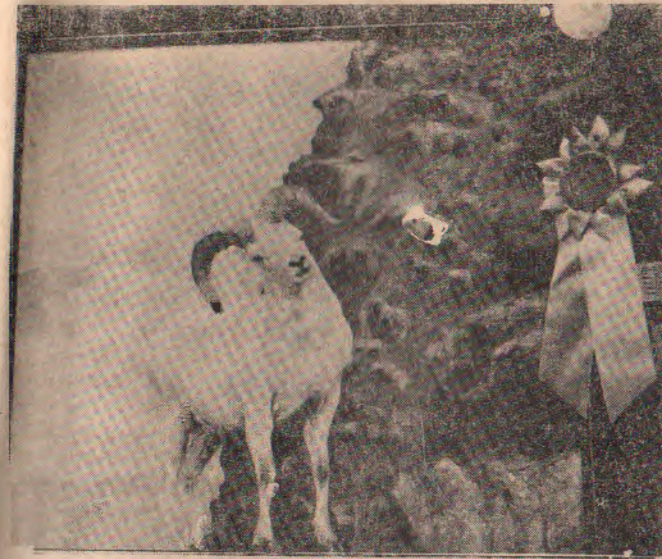

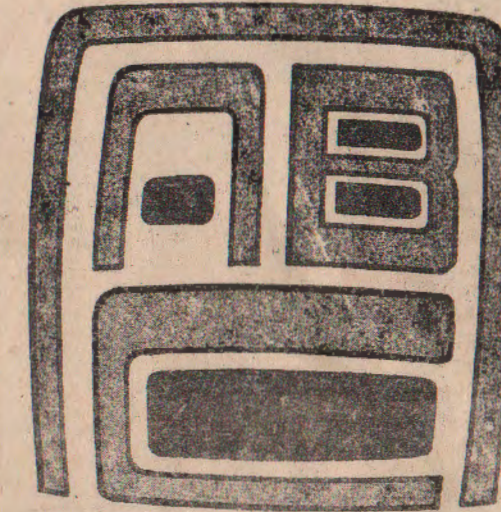

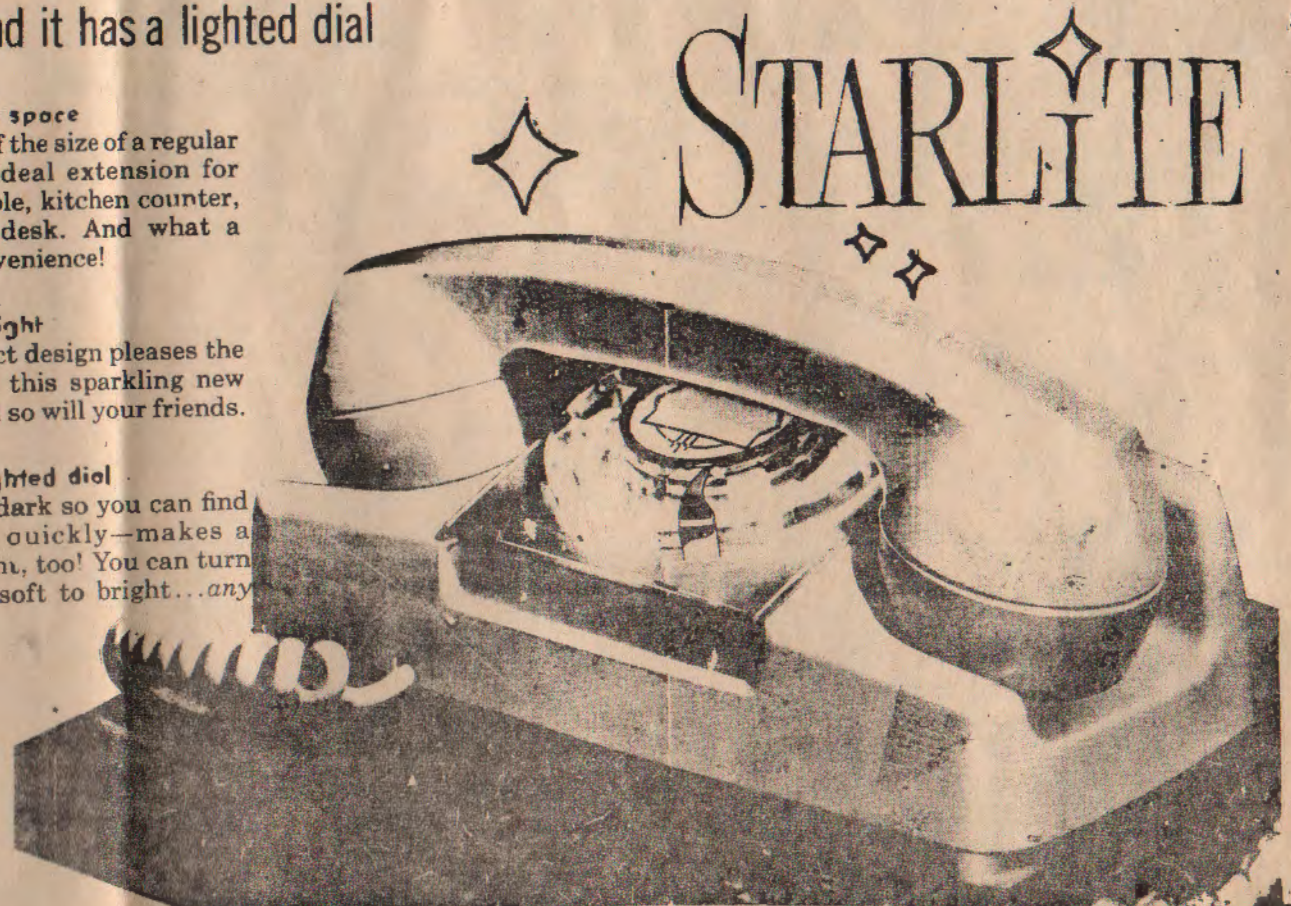

VFW TO INSTALL NEW OFFICERS ON SATURDAY

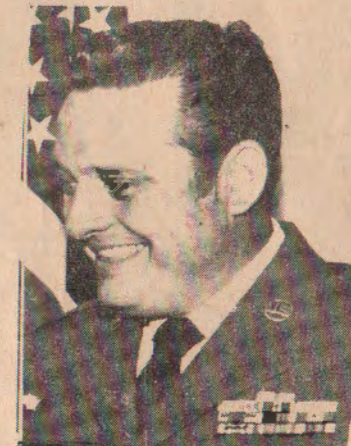

The Chugiak 3 Man Team Relays have always been successful because of the number of people in the local area who have helped to officiate.

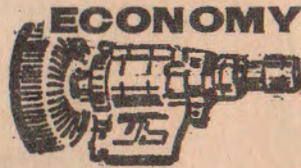

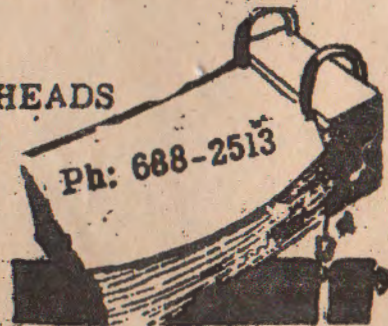

STATE PARK TO BE SCENE OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL PROGRAM

LONG LAKE: Long Lake Wayside, a unit of the Alaska Park System at Mile 86 on the Glenn Highway, will be the scene of an archaeological program during the summer of 1973, according to Ted Smith, Director of the Alaska Division of Parks.

Citing it as a part of his Division's continuing effort to make the public aware of the reasons that disturbing historic sites is a violation of state and federal law, Smith noted that the Long Lake project will provide a forum in which views of professional archaeologists, museum personnel, recreational collectors and others can be discussed.

During the day, Park Archaeologists will excavate and study a site in the wayside first discovered by Dr. Frederick Hadleigh West of Alaska Methodist University.

The excavation site will be open to the public as a demonstration of the rigorous procedures that must be followed if sites are to yield information about Alaska's

CONCESSIONAIRE FOR CHUGACH PARK SOUGHT

ANCHORAGE: The Division of Parks is again seeking a concession in the Chugach State Park.

According to State Park Director Ted Smith, the last invitation for proposals resulted in a variety of interests which did not all coincide with the specified development at McHugh Peak. All proposals were rejected and new prospectus drafted. This is now available from the Division of Parks at 323 E. 4th Avenue.

Smith said the new invitation is specific as to location of development. "We think there is need for some additional ski areas near Anchorage and probably for some lodging facilities in conjunction with them. We're asking the industry to propose such a development in Chugach Park if they agree there is such a need."

Interested parties will have until May 31 to submit proposals according to Smith.
