

# DELAY IN FEDERAL FUNDS AFFECTS LOCAL HIGHWAY PROJECTS

## BID IS APPROVED FOR EAGLE RIVER SEWER TRUNK

**EAGLE RIVER:** The bid for the sewer trunk and laterals which would serve the area that includes the Homestead Elementary School were approved last Monday night by the Borough Assembly.

Phase I North Valley, will be constructed by the May Contracting Inc. of Anchorage, who submitted the low bid of \$249,559.55.

Construction is scheduled to begin approximately June 1st, with completion to be 90 days after notice to proceed.

A special provision in the contract calls for hook-up of the Homestead Elementary School by August 15th, according to a spokesman for May Contracting Inc.

## PROJECTS

**CHUGIAK:** Highway projects in the Greater Chugiak Area would also be delayed if Federal Highway Funds are not allocated in time to begin scheduled construction.

Projects which would be subject to delay are the construction of two more lanes from Eagle River to Peters Creek; the new highway from Peters Creek to Eklutna, and the Eagle River Road construction.

Maurice Wilson, of the Alaska Department of Highways, discussed the local projects, and told of plans to relocate the interchange from the New to the Old Glenn Highway to 600 feet north of the present Artillery Road connector.

He said the reason for the relocation would be to avoid infringing on the businesses presently located on Artillery Road.

The planned interchange would be an overpass of the diamond design. It would connect to the Old Glenn Highway at the intersection with Monte Road.

The existing Artillery Road connector would then be closed off and become a dead end street.

Wilson said there were no plans at present to close the connector at Mile 15, as long as the public continues to use the road in sufficient volume.

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## GIRL KILLED WHEN CAR IS BLOWN OUT OF CONTROL

**EKLUTNA:** A 17 year old Elmendorf girl was killed when her car went out of control and left the road at Mile 27 Glenn Highway on the Eklutna Flats.

Richard B. Fuller, of Anchorage, a passenger in the car told the Alaska State Troopers that the driver, Kim Bourland, was northbound when winds, which were gusting at 60 m.p.h., caught the 1972 Datsun and caused it to go out of control leaving the road and rolling over.

The victim was thrown from the car, and suffered a puncture wound in the chest. She was pronounced dead on arrival at the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

Fuller was taken to the 5040 by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company ambulance. He was suffering from facial lacerations and a shoulder injury.

The accident took place on Sunday, May 20th, at 1:00pm. Damage to the car was estimated at \$2500. (total).

# NEW TANKER ORDERED FOR CHUGIAK FIRE CO.

**CHUGIAK:** The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company will soon be ordering a new piece of equipment it was learned today.

According to Bob Kallenberg, Chairman for the Chugiak Fire District Board of Supervisors, the equipment is to be a 1,000 gallon Class A pumper, the same as the one delivered last fall but with an automatic transmission.

Kallenberg said that he hoped to have the specifications completed and ready to go to bid within a week. The bids should be awarded before July 1st, he stated.

Kallenberg pointed out that the equipment will be purchased out of existing funds and there will be no increase in taxes to the residents of the fire service district.

He also told that the Fire Company has on order two 1,000 gallon portable tanks which can be transported to the site of a fire and then filled by the trunk truck, which is then free to leave and fill up with additional water.

## SIXTH GRADERS PREPARE FOR MCKINLEY PARK ADVENTURE

**OLD CHUGIAK:** Sixth graders at the Chugiak Elementary School are busy this week preparing for a four day adventure to Mt. McKinley Park.

Fifty four students and 10 chaperones will leave on Tuesday, May 29th on the Alaska Railroad for a field trip during which time they will camp out at the park and prepare their own meals and study the natural environment.

Chaperoning the group will be three teachers, Charles Heath, Terri Menschel and Charles Hennelgarn, along with a group of parents who volunteered to accompany the students.

The students are paying their own way with the \$680 they raised with candy sales, bake sales, a talent show, car wash, play etc.

The trip has been nine weeks in preparation, during which time the students received instruction on survival, camp cooking, viewed films; and heard speakers on such subjects as mountaineering, fish and game, glaciers, first aid and

related subjects.

A variety of tents have been rounded up for the trip and each student will be responsible for his or her own possessions which they will carry in a backpack.

Last Tuesday was a rehearsal for the trip with a colorful collection of tents of all types and sizes pitched around the school grounds, and the students checking out the contents of their packs. While on the trip the class will be divided into groups of five with a adult chaperone in charge of each group.

Mr. Hennelgarn explained that while other schools have had similar field trips he believes that this is the largest group and will be traveling the farthest.

He said that if the trip is as successful as he and Mr. Heath are confident it will be, perhaps it will become a tradition for future classes at Chugiak Elementary School.

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## FT. RICH MAN STILL MISSING AT EKLUTNA GLACIER

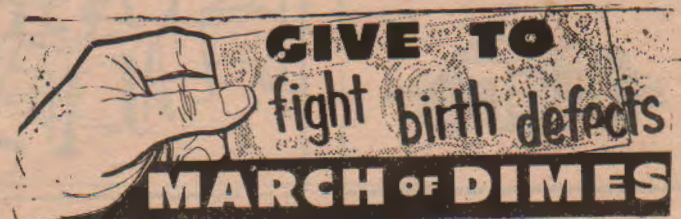
**EKLUTNA:** A search continues for a 22 year old Fort Richardson man who failed to return after reportedly having gone on a hike in the vicinity of the Eklutna glacier.

No sign of Randolph W. Stuebner has been found, although his abandoned car was located near the foot of the glacier.

The army, air force and national guard have participated in both air and ground search for the missing man.

Stuebner was reported to have been an experienced mountain climber, although it was not learned whether or not he was a member of the mountaineering unit which operates a training camp at the Eklutna glacier site.

He was reportedly alone when he left to climb on the glacier.

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**CALL FIRE CO. WHEN YOU GET BURNING PERMIT**

CHUGIAK: Local residents who have obtained a permit to burn brush or grass from the Greater Anchorage Area Borough are reminded that they are required to also personally notify their local fire department when they plan to burn.

Permits must be applied for in person at either the Borough office on Tudor Rd. or at the Greater Chugliak Family Service Center on Artillery Road in Eagle River. A copy of the written permit must be delivered to the local Fire Department.

A spokesman for the Chugliak Volunteer Fire Company pointed out that in several instances when persons with a permit have started to burn, neighbors have reported the smoke to the Fire Company, and if the firemen have not been informed in advance that this is a controlled burn an unnecessary run, involving time and equipment is the result.

Persons who have first obtained the permit are asked to call either 688-2625 or name, address and permit number.

On Saturday, May 19th two fires within a mile of each other were reported.

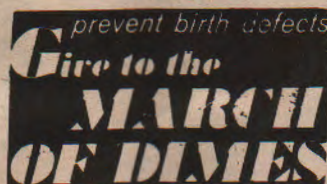
At 6:45pm, burning trees on Homestead Road in Peters Creek had fallen across the power lines, causing a brief power outage in that area.

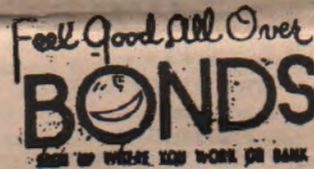

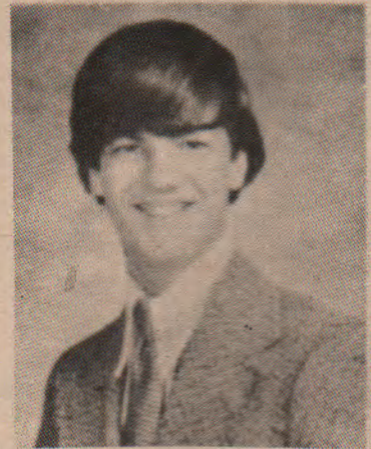
Governor Egan addressed the Assembly, and in addition to presenting the awards also presented the first copy of "Babiche", the new yearbook to the school.

### SUMMER SCHOOL CLASSES TO BE AT EAGLE RIVER ELEMENTARY

**EAGLE RIVER:** Eagle River Elementary School will be the only local school at which summer school classes will be conducted, it was announced this week.

The Anchorage Borough School District stated that Summer School classes will be taught at 6 elementary, 3 junior high and 2 senior high schools.

Registration for these classes may be made by mail or in person starting today, May 23rd, at the Central Administration Building at 670 West Fireweed Lane.

Registration forms may be obtained at all school buildings throughout the District.

Final date for registration by mail is June 6, 1973.

Music courses will begin on June 11th, and continue until July 20th. Other classes will begin June 18th and continue until July 27th. Elementary level classes will include: Reading, Math and Elementary Art for grades 2 through 6. Basic Sewing will be offered for grades 6 through 12.

Junior/Senior High courses will include: Driver Education for grades 9 through 12; Math and Reading for grades 7 through 8; Beginning Typing for grades 8 through 12; U.S. History for grades 10, 11 and 12. U.S. Government for grades 11 and 12.

Tuition is \$10.00 per course for students of the Anchorage Borough School District.

Out of District student fees are \$80.00 for each course except Music. Out of District student tuition for Music courses is \$50.00.

Summer School centers for Junior High are, Central, Romig and Wendler. Senior high classes will be held at East and West Anchorage High Schools. Music courses will be offered at Central, Romig and Wendler.

The purpose of the Summer School courses, according to Mr. Les Wells, Summer School Director, "is to provide opportunities for

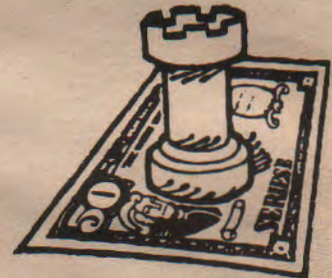
enrichment and reinforcement of the basic learning skills."

"No course credit is offered elementary students and no grade will be issued.

At the end of the session, parents will receive a statement of what was covered in the students program and a report will be filed with the student's school record. Secondary students will receive 1/2 unit credit to apply toward high school graduation for those students in grades 9 through 12 and for those entering grade 9 in September of 1973. Driver Education courses will offer 1/4 unit of credit," Wells concluded.

The Chamber Highway Committee is also seeking to have a street light installed at the intersection of Eagle River Loop and the Old Glenn Highway, and to have the signs indicating South Birchwood Loop moved from the now closed off entrance to Chugiak High School.

Other business included the election of a new Secretary to fill the position recently resigned by Gene Reed. Al Terrault was elected to that office.

The next regular Chamber meeting will be on Monday June 4th. The Chamber meets at the Sportsman's Game Preservation Association Hall at Mile 15 on the Old Glenn Highway at 5pm.

### DON'T PICK UP BABY ANIMALS

ANCHORAGE: Spring has arrived and with it a new crop of cubs, pups, calves, fawns, kids, kits, kittens and other wildlife babies.

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game is again asking people not to pick up any young animals found in the woods.

Each spring, the department receives numerous calls from people who pick up young animals which are not really abandoned.

Many times the mothers of these animals are either off on a feeding foray, or have been hiding nearby.

Chuck Irvine, Anchorage game biologist, said once a baby animal is removed from its mother, it is often impossible to return it.

Anyone finding a baby animal should not crowd or disturb it, Irvin said. If the animal is still abandoned the next day, a call should be placed to the nearest Department of Fish and Game office.

Caution should be taken around wild animals this time of year, Irvine said, as serious injuries have sometimes resulted from an over-protective mother charging the human intruder.
