

# ASSEMBLY APPROVES \$50 CHARGE FOR AMBULANCE

## CONTRACT FOR CHUGIAK AMBULANCE WAS NOT CANCELLED

ANCHORAGE: The contract for ambulance service between the Greater Anchorage Area Borough has not been cancelled for the fiscal year of 1973-74, according to George Maxwell, Director of Public Safety for the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

Maxwell stated that this was but just one of the misunderstandings which has developed between his department and the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company as a result of an article which appeared in a local publication recently.

Maxwell, who claims that he was quoted out of context in the article, said that the misunderstanding arose over his department's plan to place a team of paramedics at the Eagle River Fire Station, whose services would be extended to the residents of the Chuglak Fire Service District.

He stated that his department would not force the residents of the Chuglak Fire Service District to accept the services of the para-medical team if they did not wish them, but he felt they should be given an opportunity to learn what they would be turning down.

He explained that the men would be trained to administer much more sophisticated medical treatment than those qualified in first aid.

He made the comparison to the TV show "Emergency", which depicts the activities of the para-medics of the Los Angeles Fire Department, and said that the local team would have similar training.

Maxwell stated that a total of 15 para-medics have been certified in the Anchorage Borough Fire Department.

He said that two of these would be assigned to the Eagle River Fire Hall.

Maxwell said that he hopes to meet with members of the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company, and the Board of Supervisors, and get all the misunderstandings ironed out.

He said that it is very possible that the para-medical team can supplement the ambulance service in Chuglak, rather than replace it.

## NEW BOROUGH ASSOCIATION TO ORGANIZE AT PUBLIC MEETING

CHUGIAK: A public meeting, for the purpose of organizing an official group to be known as the "NEW BOROUGH ASSOCIATION" will be held in the near future, according to Leonard Nugen, publisher of the New Borough Bulletin.

The Steering Committee, who for the past several weeks have been gathering information on the procedure for breaking away from the Greater Anchorage Area Borough and forming a new 2nd class borough have drafted a set of By-Laws for the Association, which will be voted upon at the meeting.

In addition to adopting the by-laws, officers will be elected, and committees will be formed to handle such matters as public relations, finance, assessment base, mill rate, petition circulation, local and State government affairs and a coordinating committee for the establishment of a commission to bridge the transition to separate Borough Status.

A copy of the proposed By-Laws is attached to the latest edition of the New Borough Bulletin.

ANCHORAGE: Last night the GAAB Assembly approved a proposal to levy a charge of \$50 for every ambulance run in the Borough.

George Maxwell, Director of Public Safety for the Borough said that the Assembly will now have to draft an ordinance to cover the proposal, which, he was assured, would be passed without difficulty.

Maxwell explained that most persons who carry health insurance have a clause in their policy which covers ambulance fees. He said that this would bring increased revenue without adding to the burden of the taxpayer. In cases where the patient did not carry health insurance, he would be billed directly for the ambulance fee.

Maxwell pointed out that in instances where the individual was financially unable to pay the fee, it would be waived.

## BIDS INVITED FOR NEW CHUGIAK FIRE TRUCK

CHUGIAK: Invitations to bid in the new fire truck for the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company were placed in the mail yesterday (Tuesday, May 29th,) according to Bob Kallenberg, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors for the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company.

Kallenberg stated that he had met last Thursday with Claus Hackenberger, purchasing agent for the Greater Anchorage Area Borough for the purpose of settling on the exact specifications for the new equipment.

Opening of the bids and the submitting of them to the Borough Assembly for approval is expected to take place prior to July 1st.

Kallenberg pointed it out that funds to pay for the new truck would come from the 1973-74 budget with no increase in the 1/2 mill tax levy.

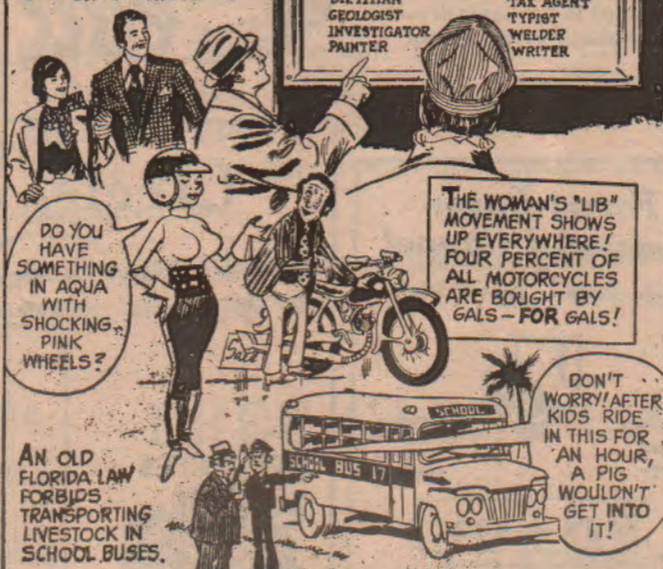

## CALL FIRE CO. WHEN YOU GET BURNING PERMIT

Permits must be applied for in person at either the Borough office on Tudor Rd. or at the Greater Chugiak Family Service Center on Artillery Road in Eagle River. A copy of the written permit must be delivered to the local Fire Department.

A spokesman for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company pointed out that in several instances when persons with a permit have started to burn, neighbors have reported the smoke to the Fire Company, and if the firemen have not been informed in advance that this is a controlled burn an unnecessary run, involving time and equipment is the result.

"Where is my refund?" is a question asked by thousands of (State) taxpayers every year, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

For many, the answer is that the refund is held up because the Post Office cannot deliver the check. People move without leaving a forwarding address, the IRS said.

Another reason is that the taxpayer's name or address is illegible on the return. You can avoid this problem by using the pre-addressed label on your tax forms package.

Peel the label off the outside of the tax forms package, and place it on the return filed. You can make corrections on the label itself.

## DON'T PICK UP BABY ANIMALS

ANCHORAGE: Spring has arrived and with it a new crop of cubs, pups, calves, fawns, kids, kits, kittens and other wildlife babies.

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game is again asking people not to pick up any young animals found in the woods.

Each spring, the department receives numerous calls from people who pick up young animals which are not really abandoned.

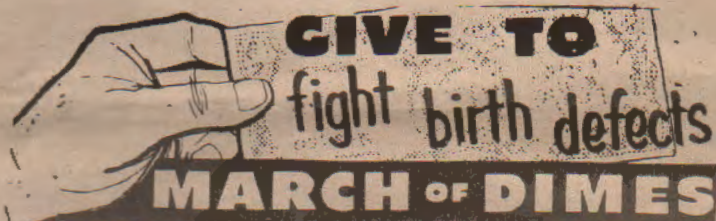
Many times the mothers of these animals are either off on a feeding foray, or have been hiding nearby.

Chuck Irvine, Anchorage game biologist, said once a baby animal is removed from its mother, it is often impossible to return it.

Anyone finding a baby animal should not crowd or disturb it, Irvine said. If the animal is still abandoned the next day, a call should be placed to the nearest Department of Fish and Game office.

Caution should be taken around wild animals this time of year, Irvine said, as serious injuries have sometimes resulted from an over-protective mother charging the human intruder.

**Keep Track of Medical Expenses**

You can deduct on your Federal income tax return part of the amount you spent for medical and dental expenses, if you itemize deductions.

Expenses for your medical care and that of your husband or wife and dependents are deductible if the expenses exceed three percent of your adjusted gross income. For example, if you have an income of \$6,000 you can deduct the expenses over \$180 (three percent of \$6,000).

However, one-half of the premiums paid for medical insurance, but no more than \$150, may be deducted in full without regard to the three percent rule. Include the rest of the premiums with the other medical expenses.

Special rules apply to medicines and drugs. Add the cost of these, but only the amount over one percent of adjusted gross income, to the other medical expenses subject to the three percent rule.
