to the Shrine Circus. Carnival ride tickets will be awarded on the basis of the. number of bags of trash turned in at each collection point. One ride ticket for seach bag.



BIRCHWOOD GIRL GETS CAP IN CEREMONY AT AMU







Menstrual pain occurs only after ovulation (if ovulation does not take place during a cycle, the next period will be painless). If the pain is incapacitating, hormone therapy can be used to suppress ovulaton. But this treatment is not recommended for every case and should only be used after consulting with a gynecologist experienced in caring for adolescents.

"Menstrual cramps are common in tcenagers," says the Academy. They are not a sign of ill health or disease of the reproductive organs.
