EAGLE RIVER: The local Chamber of Commerce voted to halve their \$50 membership fee for the balance of the year.

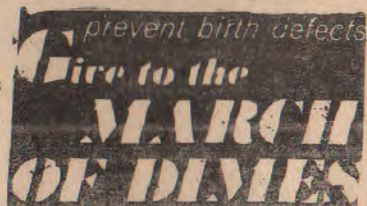
This was decided at the regular Chamber meeting last Monday night.

SATURDAY, MAY 12 IS "CLEAN-UP DAY"

CHUGIAK: Everything is "Go" for Clean-up Day, to be held this Saturday, May 12th, through the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

The area has been divided into sections with various local civic organizations responsible for one of the sections.

Pick-up points for sacked trash have been established strategically throughout the community under the direction of the PTA group from that area.

The Birchwood Elementary PTA will man the following stations in the Birchwood Area: Birchwood Elementary School, Carmen's Beauty Shop, MTA building, Beverly Drive, Bogle Bender Club, Jayhawk Drive, Birchwood Spur, White Birch Lane, 1st Baptist Church of Birchwood.

Under the direction of the Homestead PTA, Eagle River Loop pick-ups are at the Homestead Elementary School, Lions Park, Yellow Rock, Alaska Industries (Tuck's).

The Eagle River Elementary PTA will man pick-up stations at Eagle River Elementary School, S&S Upholstery, Echo Street, Harry's Auto Parts, Peters Creek Fuel and Powder Magazine Connector Road at Mile 15.5.

Under the direction of the Chugiak Elementary PTA, pick-up points are, Ray Gay residence, Fish Hatchery Road, Rolling Garage, Chugiak Texaco, Hillcrest entrance to Chugiak High, Chugiak Senior Center, Peters Creek Service, Mt. Ek-lutna Drive and Halverson residence.

Organizations which have volunteered to supervise the clean-up have divided the community into the following areas.

Chugiak Lions Club, Ek-lutna to Peters Creek Bridge, Chugiak High Lettermen's Club, Peters Creek to Chugiak High School, Chugiak High Freshmen, Eagle River Campground, Eagle River Lions Club, Chugiak High to Powder Magazine Road at Mile 15.5, VFW Post 9785 and American Legion Post 33, Fort Richardson sign site to Eagle River Shopping

Center along New and Old Glenn Highway. Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, Eagle River and Eagle River Loop Rds. Knik Little League, Eagle River Shopping Center to Wheeler Im, Girl Scouts, Cornado Road to United Bldg Supply.

Chugiak Elementary School students, side roads from Halfway House to School.

Organizations who have volunteered trucks to pick-up trash and haul to the dump are Rosebud Refuse, the Army Reserve and Anchorage Refuse plus the BLM.

This year many prizes are being offered to participating youngsters who pick up the most roadside trash during clean-up day.

Prizes offered range from free tickets to the carnival rides to 10 speed bicycles.

One ten speed bike will be a prize at each junior High School in the borough.

A standard bicycle will be offered at each elementary school, while 2 gift certificates are being offered at each senior high school.

In addition to this each school will offer 40 tickets to the Shrine Circus. Carnival ride tickets will be awarded on the basis of the number of bags of trash turned in at each collection point. One ride ticket for each bag.

OBEDIENCE CLASS TO GRADUATE SATURDAY

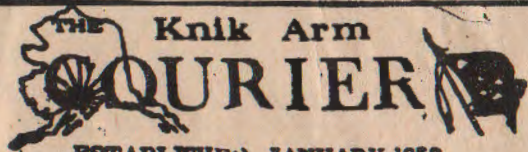
OLD CHUGIAK: The class in dog obedience training which has been conducted for the past nine weeks will hold a graduation match this Saturday, May 12th.

BILL WOULD CHANGE FISCAL YEAR ENDING

WASHINGTON D.C.: Senator Ted Stevens has introduced a bill to change the fiscal year to coincide with the calendar year.

The bill would also divide each year into separate legislative and appropriations periods.

Stevens, who co-sponsored the bill said, "The bill fulfills a great need by having Congress blow the whistle on its own fiscal irresponsibility. This bill is in line with needed Congressional reform and updating."

"I am extremely hopeful this measure can be enacted so we may begin to enjoy -- as a nation -- the smoother and more efficient fiscal functioning of Congress."

BABE RUTH LEAGUE TO HOLD CRAB AND SHRIMP SALE

EAGLE RIVER: The Knik Babe Ruth League will conduct their annual Queen Crab and shrimp sale this Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 11, 12th and 13th.

The sale will take place in the Eagle River Shopping Center and at Proctors Market.

Queen Crab sells for \$1.50 a pound, or will be discounted if purchased in 5 or 10 pound quantities. Five pound packages will sell for \$7.00 and ten pound blocks for \$13.00.

A one pound package of sock-tail shrimp will sell for \$2.25 per pound.

Proceeds from the sale will be used by the local Babe Ruth League for travel expenses, and lodging for Alaska District and State tournament play and miscellaneous expenses during the regular season.

THREE CAMPGROUNDS TO OPEN

ANCHORAGE: Three major Chugach National Forest campgrounds will open for public use by May 15, 1973, with remaining Forest Campgrounds scheduled to be ready for use by May 24, 1973.

Richard E. Woodrow, Chugach National Forest Acting Supervisor, reported that the three campgrounds to open early will be Quartz Creek (26 units), Crescent Lake (9 units), and Cooper Creek (19 units).

It is expected that drinking water will not be available at Quartz Creek at that time, however.

Campgrounds opening May 24 include those at Portage Bertha Creek, Granite Creek, Coeur d'Alen, Tenderfoot Creek, Tern Lake, Trail River, Ptarmigan Creek, Primrose Landing and Russian River.

Firewood, furnished at Forest Service campgrounds in previous years will no longer be provided. Campground users are asked to bring their own wood or use charcoal in the campground fireplaces.

Chugach National Forest campground entrance fee this year will be \$1 per night per party, payable at an entrance receptacle.

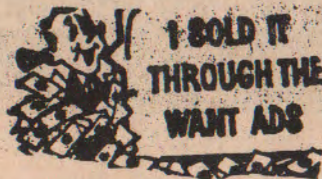

The accident is still under investigation by the Alaska State Troopers.

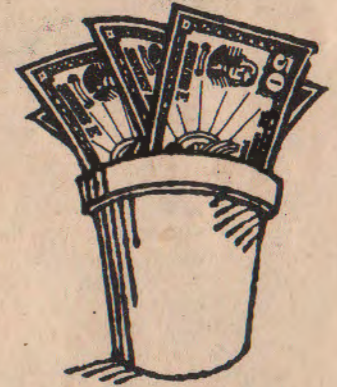

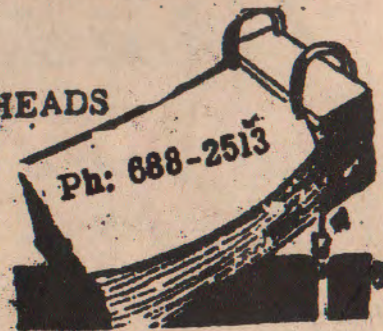

Beauty you can buy, but maybe shouldn't . . . Semi-permanent false eyelashes may give your eyes the best batting average on the block, but there are some drawbacks you should know about, before you dash to your local beauty salon. The lashes, which are individually applied for that coveted natural look, are expensive, probably will not last as long as implied, and can cause medical problems.

If hypoallergenic surgical adhesive is used to attach the lashes (they're glued directly to one's own eyelashes, eliminating the eyelid band), there shouldn't be any problem. Sometimes, however, epoxy glue is used because it holds better — and epoxy glue is too strong and dangerous for the eye area. The danger is that it can easily get onto the surrounding skin, and even into the eye.

Nor are the lashes as permanent as the manufacturers want you to believe. In fact, they shouldn't be expected to last more than two or three weeks. And each time they fall out, they have to be replaced, at additional cost. Also, they may be stiffer or longer than natural lashes and will cause even more irritation if

cy. The failure rate among the 27,712 women using the IUD for a total of more than 500,000 menstrual periods, was only 0.8 percent, compared with 1.4 percent for the pill. In the study, conducted by Archibald F. Caraway, M.D., of the Florida Bureau of Maternal Health and Family Planning, the expulsion rate was 7.5 percent and the removal rate only 3.7 percent.

Menstrual cramps . . . Aspirin, or other simple painkillers, and normal activity are the best treatments for teenagers suffering from menstrual cramps, says the American Academy of Pediatrics. Warning against excessive restriction of activity, the Academy says it's unhealthy and "can actually make the pain worse."

Menstrual pain occurs only after ovulation (if ovulation does not take place during a cycle, the next period will be painless). If the pain is incapacitating, hormone therapy can be used to suppress ovulation. But this treatment is not recommended for every case and should only be used after consulting with a gynecologist experienced in caring for adolescents.
