CORRECTION CENTER COMPLETION DELAY SEEN

EAGLE RIVER: There will be a delay of approximately one month in the completion of the Southcentral Correction Center, it was announced today by Stanley Zaborac, Director of that facility.

Zaborac said that a delay in the receipt of essential security and electronic equipment has made it necessary to move the projected completion date from June 15th to some time between July 15th and August 1st.

placement of the Chugiak Elementary School.

CBA had entered into negotiation with the Borough a year ago when the latter agreed to exchange the 25 acres at Mile 21 on the Old Glenn Highway for the 14 acres at the site presently occupied by the Chugiak Elementary School.

The purpose of the exchange was to provide a site for the school which would have a better water supply and drainage ability than the existing location. In exchange for the 25 acres, CBA would get in addition to the land at Mile 19.5, the buildings which would be replaced by the construction of a new school at the Mile 21 location.

Some local residents had been concerned that a rumored problem involving the land description was causing a delay in the BLM approval of the swap.

Clarence Smith of the Anchorage office of the Bureau of Land Management said that the description problem was a simple one which had already been corrected and should cause no additional delay in processing the paperwork. He explained that the seemingly long time it was taking for final approval was caused by the unusual nature of the exchange. He said this was not a routine type of process, and therefore he could not give an approximate date as to when the school district could expect the go ahead to advertise the project for bid.

Norma Coleman, who has been representing the Borough in the transaction said she is still hopeful that the ground breaking for the new school could at least be started before the end of the construction season.

A public meeting has been called for 8:00pm in the multi-purpose room at Chugiak High School.

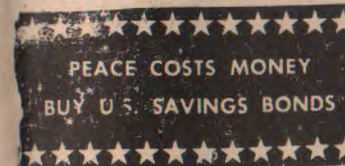
The meeting will be held in the multi-purpose room of Chugiak High School, starting at 8:00pm.

The invitation to attend the meeting is extended to those who believe they oppose the move as well as those who favor it, according to Leonard Nugen, publisher of "The New Borough Bulletin".

Nugen said that the committee is anxious to hear all views on the subject.

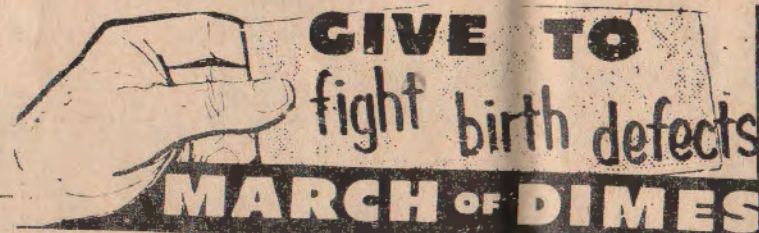

MAT-SU SCHOOLS GET EXTRA FUNDING

JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan, announced today that the Matanuska-Susitna Borough School District has received a special allocation of \$129,000 under Title I, an educationally deprived category of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

Governor Egan also announced a similar grant award to the Fairbanks-North Star Borough School District amounting to \$52,000.

The two districts qualified since the funds are of an "incentive" nature. All Alaska communities are ranked on the basis of their assessed evaluation of property within the district and the amount of local revenue appropriated for education during fiscal year 1972.

The grant awards are to be used for special projects or to expand and improve existing projects which show special promise of meeting certain education needs of educationally deprived children. The monies are for use in fiscal year 1974, which starts on July 1, 1973.

The formula used is based on the amount that each district would receive if they obtained the total authorized funding under the percentages used to determine the number of students qualified for such assistance at the poverty level.
