

HIGHWAY DEPT. PROMISES PUBLIC HEARING ON INTERCHANGE

FATHER AND DAUGHTER DIE IN HIGHWAY

WRECK

BIRCHWOOD: Two people are dead following a collision which took place on Friday, June 15th at 6:10pm at the intersection of South Birchwood Road and the New Glenn Highway.

Dead is the driver of one car, Lynne C. Swan, age 33 of Birchwood and her father, Clarence Cox age 75, also of Birchwood.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Mrs. Swan's car was turning off Birchwood Road, when it collided with the second vehicle, driven by John W. Kinger, of Palmer.

Mr. Cox, was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident. Mrs. Swan was dead on arrival at the 5040 Air Force Hospital.

CYCLE THEFT RING OPERATES IN AREA

EAGLE RIVER: Alaska State Troopers have reported evidence that a motor cycle theft ring may be operating in the local area.

Last week troopers recovered an abandoned motorcycle near Fire Lake which had originally been reported stolen in Homer earlier this year. Another found near Eagle River had been reported stolen a year ago.

In both cases the serial numbers on the machine had been altered. Identifications were made by restoring the original number and then tracing the machines through

EAGLE RIVER: Jack Spake of the Anchorage District of the Alaska High Department promised local residents an official public hearing on the proposed new Mile 14 Interchange, and indicated that he would abide by the wishes of the majority.

Spake made this statement following a heated exchange with area residents at public meeting sponsored last Monday by the local Chamber of Commerce.

Spake, and members of his staff attended the meeting to present a map showing the design of the interchange which would replace the present one at Artillery Road.

All comment on the new design was negative in nature, with most objection to it concerning the congestion it would create at the point where it joined with the Old Glenn Highway at Monte Rd.

Several alternate suggestions were proposed, and in response to that, Spake offered to send a copy of the map showing his department's design to all residents of the Eagle River area asking them for their ideas

ident. Mrs. Swan was dead on arrival at the 5040 Air Force Hospital.

Ambulance from the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company responded, and were assisted by Rescue 3, from the Eagle River Fire Station.

Passengers in the Swan car who were injured and transported to the 5040 Air Force Hospital by the Chuglak Ambulance were Mary E. Cox, age 69, mother of the driver, Jerry McGowan, age 11, son of Mrs. Swan who sustained a neck and back injury, and a passenger in her car, Tom Simon age 14, of Jayhawk, with a leg and back injury. Mrs. Cox was suffering a broken arm and both legs broken.

The Eagle River ambulance transported Lonnie McGowan, age 14 to Providence Hospital with minor lacerations, also Meloday Triplett, age 21, who was reportedly a hitch hiker in the Kinter car, she was suffering a broken ankle.

Citations are pending investigation by the Alaska State Troopers.

An unconfirmed report is that Mrs. Swan had failed to stop at the Stop Sign.

numbers on the machine had been altered. Identifications were made by restoring the original number and then tracing the machines through the National Crime Information Center.

The two cases and numerous other reported motorcycle thefts are currently under continuing investigation by the Criminal Investigation Bureau of Alaska State Troopers.

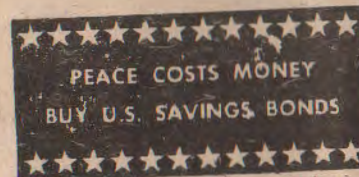
A spokesman for the troopers said the theft ring appears to be engaged in the theft and alteration of serial numbers and in stripping of motorcycle parts for sale.

Motorcycle owners are advised by troopers to protect their own equipment by recording both the frame number and engine number of the machines they purchase.

Owners also are being urged to inscribe an identifying number such as drivers license on the machines and to keep all identifying numbers available to give to police should a machine be stolen.

Troopers also asked that owners keep their machines in a locked garage or building, or securely immobilized with hard link chain and lock to some solid object - with the machine preferably out of sight.

All persons are asked to be particularly suspicious of pickup trucks or vans prowling a neighborhood at night. A description of the suspicious vehicle should be reported immediately to the Alaska State Trooper office

FIGURES SHOW NEW BOROUGH COULD BE SELF SUPPORTING WITHOUT TAX HIKE

CHUGIAK: Figures presented by Jesse Wooten, recently elected Vice-Chairman of the New Borough Association, show that the proposed borough could be self-supporting without a substantial increase in taxes.

Wooten, one of the originators of the New Borough movement gave as the sources of his statistics the Eagle River Land use plan published by the Greater Anchorage Area Borough "Alaska Taxable", municipal property assessments and full value determinations, published by the department of community and Regional Affairs, in 1972, as well as figures quoted from the Greater Anchorage Planning Studies.

Wooten's figures show a total assessed value of \$120,654,439 in 1973 by including lands outside the Chuglak and Eagle River Service areas, as well as those within them.

Wooten explained that his figures differ with the figure of \$60,000,000 assessed value which is quoted by opponents of the New Borough because the latter figure only includes property inside the Service Areas.

He pointed out that while they only quote the value of property inside the Service Area, they show the expenses of areas both inside and outside in an attempt to

prove their point.

Wooten shows by his figures that while assessed value of property inside the Eagle River Service area is limited to 7 1/2 sections or 4800 acres, the Eagle River property which is located outside the service area is 5 1/2 sections or 3520 acres.

In the Chuglak Service area assessed property is 11 1/2 sections or 7,360 acres. The property in Chuglak located outside the service area consists of 7 sections or 4,480 acres.

This brings the total taxable land in the proposed new borough to 20,160 acres.

Wooten pointed out that all this is private land. Public land in the borough would be an additional 15,040 acres.

Based on taxable property, Wooten has been able to arrive at a figure of \$120,654,439 of taxable property in the proposed new borough.

This, he says, is very close to the amount of assessed property in the Mat-Su Borough, which is able to function at a lower Mill Rate than the Anchorage Borough.

These figures were quoted by Wooten at an organizational meeting of the New Borough Association held

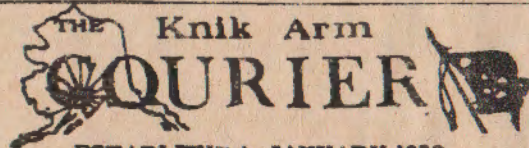
The design which drew all the flak called for an interchange of the diamond design at the new Glenn Highway just 600 yards north of the present Artillery Rd.

MTA COMMITTEE NOMINATES CANDIDATES

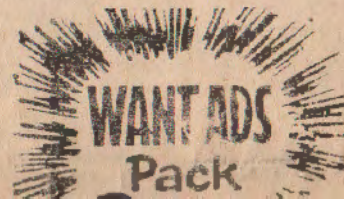
PALMER: Four candidates have been named by the nominating committee for the Matanuska Telephone Association for positions to the Board of Directors.

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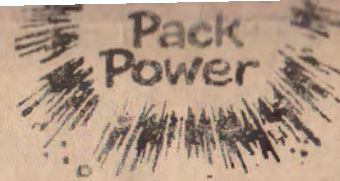

road. Upon the completion of this the Artillery Road would be closed off and become a dead end street.

Several alternate plans were suggested by members of the audience, including several which would permit residents of the Eagle River valley to get on and off the New Glenn without being funneled through the Eagle River Shopping Area.

Dan Bell, representing the recently re-organized Eagle River Improvement Association, presented Spake with a scale drawing superimposed on an aerial photo of the area which he said had been designed by volunteer engineers. He asked Spake to consider this design as a substitute for the one his office has proposed.

Bell said that his organization was trying to look into the future of this growing area with the hope of keeping it from becoming another Mt. View or Spenard. "We've got to look further than yesterday", he stated.

Although most of Spake's discussion was taken up by the disputed interchange, he did take time to comment on other highway construction in the Greater Chugiak Area.

He reported that the Birchwood Loop was now in pretty good shape, and that future plans called for improvement of access, drainage and eventually paving of that road.

He explained that much of the new highway projects were being held up by the delay in approval of highway funding by Congress. He said that if approval of Federal Funds should be given by September, than most of the projects could

He pointed out that the suggested location for the Park Headquarters was in the Campbell Creek area. He said that a Campground is planned for the Eagle River Area with a road to be pushed on to the campground and hiking trails to take off from there. He said that a Ranger Station was called for.

He described the Chugach Park, with a total of 592,000 acres, as the largest State Park in the United States.

Comment from the audience indicated that many felt that too much of the park was dedicated to wilderness area, and that more vehicular access to the interior park should be permitted.

Smith said that he was not entirely committed to follow the suggestions of the consultant, and that his department did not agree with many of the proposals.

It was asked if consideration had been given to locating the Park Headquarters in the Eagle River area.

Smith said it had, and indicated that his office felt that the entrance to the Eagle River Campground. He said that there was already a State facility at the location (the Correction Center) with a ready supply of labor.

He told that present plans called for the completion of the park access at Upper Huffman Road to be first priority, with the one at Eagle River second. When asked for the reasoning for that order he said that most of the pressure had come from that area. When it was asked if the order could be reversed if local residents made a greater outcry, he indicated that this probably could be accomplished.



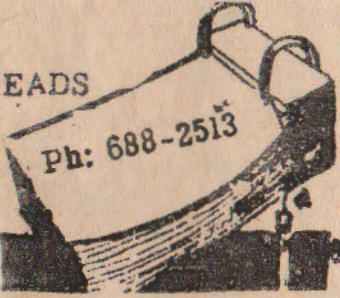
