## PUBLIC MEETING TO AIR PLANS FOR FORMING NEW BOROUGH

### A SSEMBLY SETS MILL RATE

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Assembly last night set the mill rate for the coming year.

Assemblyman Ed Willis reported last night to the Knik Arm Courier the following break-down in taxes.

In Service District 8 (Chugiak) .5 mills for Fire Service. In Service District 9, (Eagle River) 1.45 mills. Up from .6 mills over last year due to having a paid fire department.

Libraries will be .33 mills, Areawide Borough Government will be 2.67 mills up last year from 2.57 mills. Mill levy for schools is 9.9.

This brings the mill rate for Eagle River to a total of 14.35 mills and in Chugiak, 13.4.

Included in the areawide tax is 2/10 mills for areawide transportation. Willis stated that he had voted against this as an areawide tax in the belief that only areas which would be included in the transportation system should be taxed for it. He stated that he was later assured by Mayor Roderick that the Greater Chugiak Area would be considered when the master transportation plan was drawn up.

## MAN KILLED IN CYCLE WRECK ON EAGLE RIVER ROAD

EAGLE RIVER: An Anchorage motorcyclist was killed following a collision with a car on Eagle River Road last Sunday, June 3rd.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Jack D. Organ, age 21, was riding on Eagle River Road with a companion, Richard Dossett, also of Anchorage following on a second cycle.

Organ reportedly made a curve to the right and swung wide into the path of an oncoming car, driven by William J. Konesky of Anchorage, who was proceeding uphill in the opposite direction. Konesky apparently tried to avoid the collision, but the left front fender of his car struck the rear of the cycle. Organ was thrown off into the path of the cycle ridden by Dossett.

# CHAMBER TO PROPOSE RE-APPORTIONMENT PLAN

EAGLE RIVER: The local Chamber of Commerce voted last Monday to undertake official sponsorship of two reapportionment plans which had been drawn up by a bipartisan committee.

Robert Kallenberg, chairman of the committee said in his presentation of the proposed plans to the Chamber Board, that they were alternate proposals either of which would accomplish the immediate purpose of combining all communities of the Greater Chugiak Area into the same voting district and not splitting them as was accomplished by the temporary plan under which the last election was held.

Kallenberg explained that either plan would comply with the one man one vote concept.

In the first plan, the six local voting precincts would be added to a portion of Ft. Richardson to bring the population up to the required number. According to the 1970 census the local area is short 1,127 residents to come up to the minimum

population requirement.

The additional 1,127 residents could be found by drawing a line through Ft. Richardson at some point to be determined.

The alternate plan would call for taking all of Fort Richardson, along with the six local voting precincts and combining them with House Districts 6 and 5 and Senate District D.

This would result in a district which could elect four house members and two senators.

The committee, which now functions under the aegis of the Chamber of Commerce will make an official presentation of both proposals to the re-apportionment board, and also plans to prepare petitions asking that they be considered, which will be available for local residents to sign.

The Chamber also voted to ask the Re-Appportionment Committee to hold a public hearing in this area.

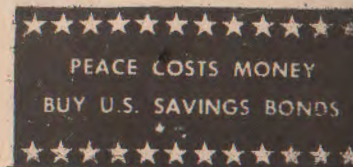

EAGLE RIVER: Representatives of the State Department of Parks and Recreation and of the Alaska Department of Highways will be special guests at the June 18th meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce and will attempt to answer any questions local residents may have on future plans for this area.

This has been designated a General Membership meeting of the Chamber, and is open to the interested public.

The Chamber had invited Ted Smith, Director of the Parks and Recreation and Jack Spake, head of the Highway Anchorage District to discuss several matters of local interest.

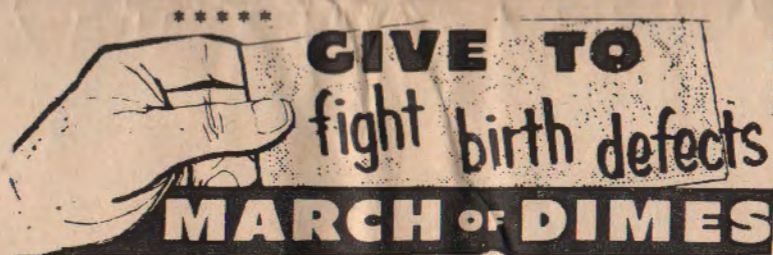

### EAGLE RIVER PROPERTY AVAILABLE FOR BALLPARKS

EAGLE RIVER: Approximately 15 to 18 acres of land across from the Eagle River Shopping Center has been made available to the community for the construction of three ball diamonds.

This land is owned by a Mr. Bally, who presently resides in California.

Mr. Bailey has given permission that the land be developed into ballfields with the stipulation that all work be under the auspices of the Lions Club.

Sam Sumrall, of the Eagle River Lions Club stated that the land will be available until such time as Mr. Bailey requires it for his own needs. This is not anticipated to be for three to five years. For this reason, all improvements will be of a temporary nature.

### VISIT FROM COW DRAWS CRITICISM

FAIRBANKS: Several weeks ago, the University of Alaska and several Alaska businesses cooperated with a Bethel school teacher to send a registered dairy cow to the village.

Residents of Bethel gave the animal an enthusiastic reception. The adults were interested to see live representative of the animal which supplies them with cow hide for parka trim and mukluks, and the children signed up to take turns feeling the animal and tasting its warm milk.

A recent issue of Sports Illustrated magazine, however, criticized the project. An item in the Chicago-based magazine says that "most Alaskan Indians have had little or no experience with cow's milk and would seem to need none."

Today, however, there is no Alaskan village so remote that fresh groceries cannot be flown in on a regular basis. "Fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, milk and every other food product has been available in every Alaskan village for more than twenty years," said Carol Linday, a Fairbanks grocer.

Bethel has only 2,000 residents, but it is a supply center for the entire Kuskokwim river area. Many native children there eat more white man's processed foods than the wild game and salmon that has been their staple diet in the past. The problem is they tend to eat sugars and starches lacking in important nutrients.

"Alaskan villagers have the same deficiencies in vitamins A, C and calcium that are a problem through out the U.S.," said Jean K. Burand, coordinator of the University's nutrition program. "And in Bethel there is a particular lack of calcium because the traditional staple is fish, which is low in calcium."

The characteristically poor diet of many Alaskan villagers causes poor teeth and bow legs and contributes to problems of mental de-

pression and alcoholism. Bringing a cow to Bethel was seen as a way to interest the people, particularly the children in using more milk.

"At least now they know that milk doesn't start out in a tin can or a cardboard box," said Arthur L. Brundage, professor of animal science at the University's Institute of Agricultural Sciences. "Perhaps we should fly a dairy cow to Chicago from Alaska so the children there can be equally informed."

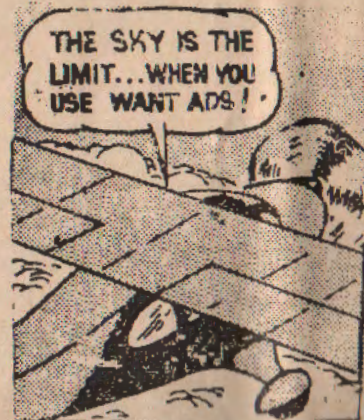

### MUSIC FESTIVAL MONTH IS TO BE JUNE

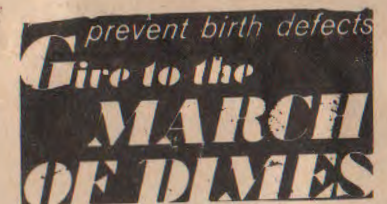

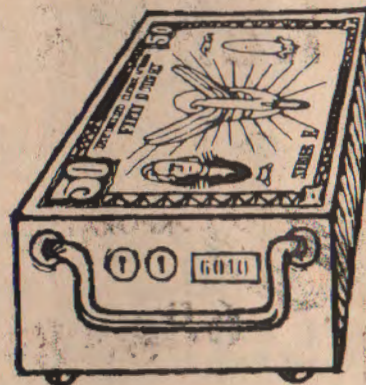

PLAN WOULD INCREASE SHARE OF REVENUE TO SERVICE AREAS

ANCHORAGE: The plan implemented last night by the GAAB Assembly would, if it receives final approval, mean an increase in shared Federal Revenue to the local service districts.

The plan adopted, referred to as Schedule D, is a compromise with Schedule which it replaces.

Under schedule "B", the Eagle River Service District would receive \$3,000 shared revenue and Chuglak \$2,000.

Under Schedule "D", Eagle River gets \$15,335 and Chuglak \$14,457.

Assembly Ed Willis said he would recommend the funds for Eagle River be used to retire the deficit incurred by the sewer service district.
