FORMER EMPLOYEE SUES MTA FOR EAVESDROPPING

IMPROVEMENT FOR EAGLE RIVER FACILITIES PENDING MEA LOAN

PALMER: Addition to the Walter Pippel substation in Eagle River, as well as the construction of a MEA warehouse in that area are pending approval of a \$7.5 million loan which the Matanuska Electric Association had made shortly after congressional approval of the new Rural Electrification Act in May.

The loan application is one of several Alaskan requests totaling \$45 million, according to Representative Don Young.

Young speculates that all the loans would be approved possibly as early as this month.

The funds if approved, will be used to upgrade existing systems and to extend MEA lines in two directions, according to Willard Johnson, MEA general manager. A warehouse in Palmer is

MARIE McDOWELL DIES OF CANCER

KENAI: Word was received of the death of Marie McDowell, former pioneer resident of the Chugiak Area.

Mrs. McDowell, passed away, Sunday, July 9th, at 1:00am at the Community Hospital at Kenai-Soldotna, the victim of cancer.

Mrs. McDowell came to Alaska in 1946, with her husband Jim and son Bruce. They settled at Mile 18.5 on the Glenn Highway, and opened Moosehorn Trading Post, one of the first businesses in the area.

Although she had left the community in 1959 for Homer, she is well remembered for her untiring efforts

Cecilia Hartley, who until last March was employed at the Eagle River office, filed the suit last week in Superior Court.

She has named as defendants MTA Manager Max Clements along with Marne Hanks, office manager at Eagle River and Criss Roberts, Eagle River supervisor.

Clements, said that his office was investigating the charges, and is not in a position to make official comment until later. He said he was aware of the alleged incident and that there was a possibility of legal action.

He did state that Ms. Hartley had resigned of her own free will, and had not been terminated by MTA.

In the suit Ms. Hartley has alleged that she was engaged in a personal conversation with Nita Smith, who is employed by MEA at the Eagle River office, on February 15, 1973. At that

MEAs general manager. A warehouse in Palmer is planned, in addition to the one in Eagle River.

A breakdown of the proposed expenditures is as follows: Over half, \$3,76 million is to go toward providing lights to a projected 2,799 consumers. To do this, 382 miles of distribution will be built, and 19 miles of underground line, the latter mostly in subdivisions.

Many of the lines will just "flesh out" MEAs existing network.

Other, however, will push the MEA service area now past Sunshine on the new Anchorage-Fairbanks Highway into the Petersville-Chulitna River vicinity. Also an extension toward Sheep Mt. along the Glenn highway is planned.

New tie line within the system is down for \$174,000.

Conversions and line upgrading will cost \$293,000. Another \$205,000 is slated for the Oscar Anderson substation at Big Lake, along with the one at Eagle River.

One thousand new transformers and meters will cost about \$500,000 Johnson

er, she is well remembered for her untiring efforts in every project of Community betterment.

She was the first Postmaster, operating the Chugiak Post Office out of the store at Moosehorn. She was a Charter Member of the Chugiak Community Club, and that group's 2nd President. She was one of the committee who pushed for the construction of the Chugiak Elementary School, and was the first PTA President. She helped to bring electricity and telephones to the area, and for the paving of the Glenn Highway. She helped organize the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co, the first Public Library in the Community and the Chugiak Republican Club.

She worked with the present publisher to print the Knik Arm Courier, and left after a year to publish the Cook Inlet Courier of Homer and Kenai.

At the time of her death she was a member of the Alaska State School Board.

Mrs. McDowell came to Alaska from Diamond Lake, in the state of Washington.

She was believed to be 63 at the time of her death.

She is survived by her husband James, of Kenai. The only other known survivor is a nephew, Mike Church who is presently believed to be working somewhere in the Alaskan bush.

Graveside services will be held at 2:00pm at the Memorial Gardens Cemetery in Homer, Thursday, July 12th.

WOMAN KILLED IN HIGHWAY WRECK

EAGLE RIVER: An Anchorage woman was killed last Saturday, July 7th, when the car in which she was a passenger went out of control on a curve at Mile 12.3 on the Glenn Highway.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the victim was Angeline Cook. Driver of the car was her sister, Lillian Komakluk, also of Anchorage.

Injured in the same accident were the drivers mother, Ruby Outwater, age 71, who suffered a broken pelvis and a six year old daughter of the driver, who sustained a head injury. The drivers three other children, age 5, 4 and 8 months were not injured.

Mrs. Komakluk suffered cuts and bruises. The Eagle River ambulance transported the injured to the 5040th Air Force Hospital and then transferred them to ANS.

Citations are pending investigation by the Alaska State Troopers.

OLD CHUGIAK: "The Chugiak 4th of July Parade was better than the one in Anchorage!" This was the opinion of Miss Alaska, Jenny Adams, who rode on her official car in both events.

Miss Alaska said that the participants in the Chugiak parade seemed to put more into it, and the spectators get more out of it than the one in Anchorage.

The local parade, the third annual such celebration was much better than those in past years, all spectators agreed. There appeared to be more participating and entries showed more imagination, with many more decorated floats than previously.

The winning entries in the opinion of a panel of five judges were; 1st Place, a float entered by Smith Masonry of Old Chugiak. The theme of this float was "The

Last Frontier", and featured a parka clad Eskimo paddling a kayak, through the surf, with a seal and a whale peering over the sides. The Eskimo as well as the seal and the whale were the Smith children dressed in costumes.

EAGLE RIVER FIRE STATION TO GET NEW AMBULANCE

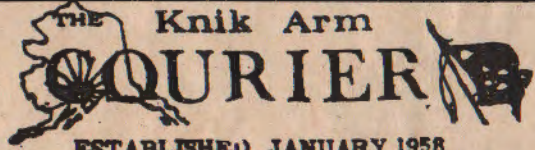
EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Fire station will be getting a new ambulance, sometime this week.

FIRE LAKE MAN HURT IN WRECK

FIRE LAKE: A Fire Lake resident was injured when the car he was driving went out of control and tumbled down an embankment last Sunday, July 8th, at 1:05pm.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, David L. Gaither, of Fish Hatchery Road was eastbound on the Old Glenn Highway at Mile 16 when his right wheel went off the pavement.

He apparently overcorrected and hit the brakes, causing the car to go out of control and down the bank on the left side, striking a telephone pole, breaking it off. The car then flipped over.

Gaither was picked up by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company ambulance and taken to Providence Hospital where he was treated for injuries to his head, chest, neck and back.

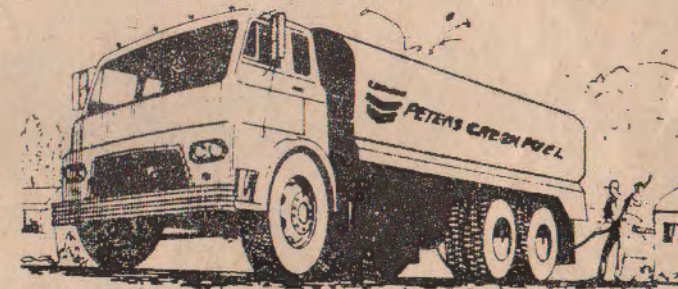
MEA also plans to move the existing Palmer substation to the Herning substation site in Wasilla at a cost of \$65,000.

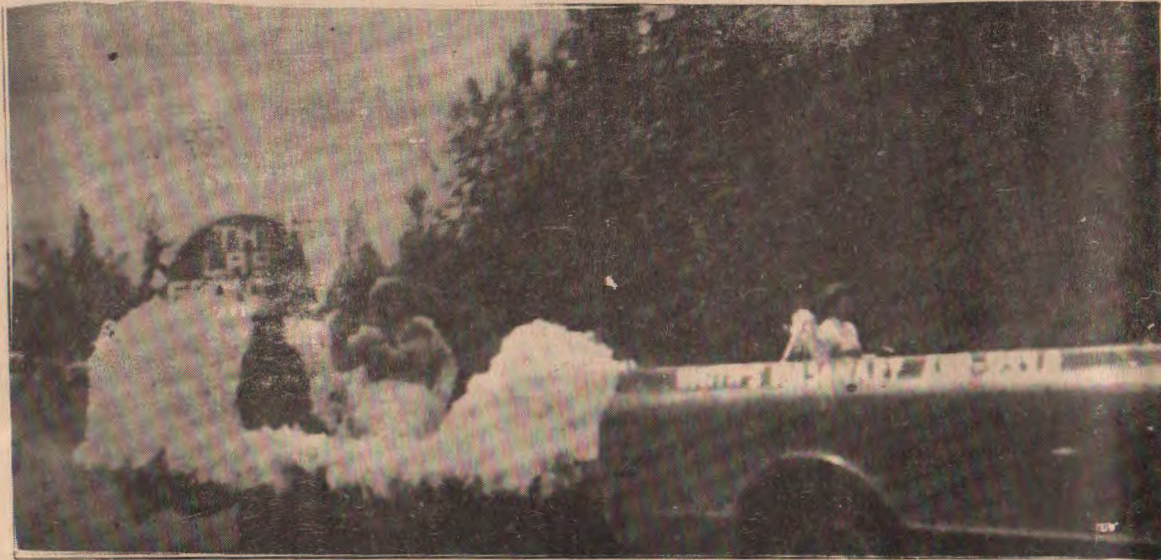

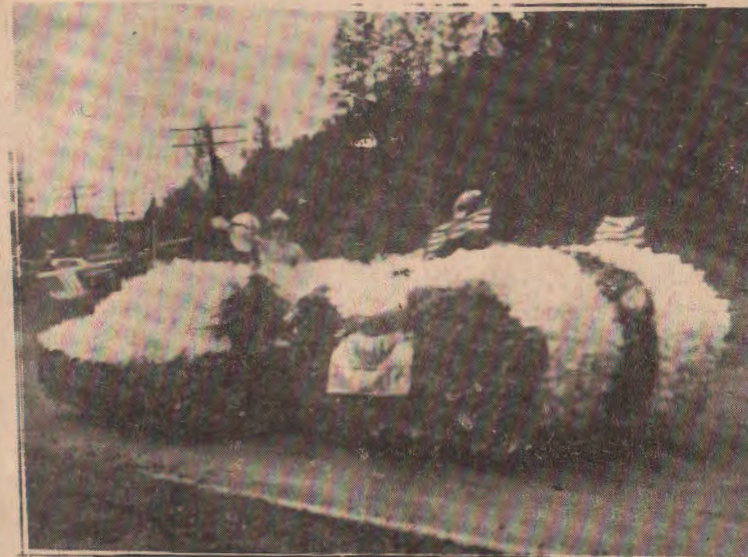

ANTLERLESS MOOSE HUNT PERMITS NOW AVAILABLE

ANCHORAGE: Permit applications for special antlerless moose hunts to be held in Unit 15C and a portion of Unit 7 on the Kenai Peninsula are now being accepted by the Department of Fish and Game reports.

Hunters applying for the special hunts should write their name, address, hunting license number, and the game management unit for which they are applying on a standard post card and mail it to the Soldotna Fish and Game Department office, Box R, Soldotna, Alaska, 99669. Hunters may apply for only one game management unit, either 7, or 15C, and may submit only one card.

Applications for the hunts must be received at the Soldotna Fish and Game office by midnight, July 15. A drawing for 200 permits in Unit 7 and 500 permits for Unit 15C will be held in Soldotna on July 20.

The antlerless hunts will begin September 1, and will be closed by field announcement. Permit holders must have hunting license, harvest ticket and antlerless moose permit in their possession while hunting. Non-residents must also possess nonresident big game tags.

Persons who obtain a permit for antlerless hunts may not apply for additional antlerless moose permits during the 1973-73 hunting season.

EKLUTNA HIKING TRAIL TO OPEN IN NEAR FUTURE

EKLUTNA: The Eklutna basin in Chugach State Park has for a long time been a popular area for hikers and nature-lovers.

An added attraction, a new hiking route, was due to be finished this week in the upper basin area, according to a U.S. Army, Alaska, release. The ten-mile trail was built by the Army, and leads to an unnamed glacier.

The trail starts just east of the bare, rock-strewn valley which hosts Eklutna Glacier, in a smaller valley, lightly forested and containing much thick underbrush along a fast-running stream. The stream, which terminates in Eklutna Lake, runs from springs and the unnamed glacier. The upper section of this ice mass brushes close to the higher expanses of Eklutna Glacier in the Chugach Range.

Many park visitors who had pushed through the vegetation and caught glimpses of the nameless glacier have asked the State Division of Parks to improve the trail, giving hikers a better walk and an unobstructed view of the no-name glacier.

This need came to the attention of Captain Lynn Partington, commander of the 562nd Engineer Company, an element of the 172nd Arctic Light Infantry Brigade at Fort Richardson. His unit has previously spent many hours in the Eklutna area maintaining the access

tools more practical in the underbrush — machetes. The engineers don't seem to mind the trade. "We're having quite a call out here," says one trail-cutter, Private First Class Richard Ramos. The pretty, rustic setting is pleasant during these summer hours, they add.
