
MATTER STATE OF ASSESSED IN



In compliance with Title 23 U.S.C. the State of Alaska Department of Highways has received from the Federal Highway Administration design approval for a proposed highway project on the Glenn Highway between Ft. Richardson and Eagle River. The improvement will consist of the construction of a new roadway adjacent and generally paralel to the present Glenn Highway, result ing in a four land divided facility. The new roadway will be constructed generally to the northwest of the present roadway. There will be minor adjustments of the present roadway where required by safety standards to meet acceptable criteria for alignments and grade, Afull interchange will be constructed at Gate 2 for Fort Richardson and Elmendorf Air Force Base, An interchange will be provided approximately 1,000 feet north of the present intersection of Hlland Road and Glenn Highway which will provide access to Hiland Road and the south Eagle River Road area. 

program.






