HIGHWAY ACCESS TO BE PROBED AT PUBLIC MEETING

NEW BORO GROUP SEEKS

SCHOOL COST FIGURES

CHUGIAK: The availability of figures showing a breakdown of operating costs of each school located in the Greater Chuglak Area is being questioned by the New Borough Association.

A spokesman for the NBA stated that they had been promised these figures some time ago, and to date all attempts to get them have been met with delays and evasions.

A request has been made to local Borough Assemblyman Ed Willis to help and expedite this information.

The New Borough Association claims that they will be able to prove (once they have these figures) that the tax base in this area is sufficient to support the local schools without a substantial increase in the mill rate.

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Improvement Association has called a public meeting to discuss the plans for access to the proposed new highway construction between Fort Richardson and Eagle River.

The details of the access to this highway, which were published in a public notice in the Anchorage Times on Monday, July 16th, apparently do not call for any other access to the completed highway, other than the interchange in the Artillery Road vicinity.

Don Schroder, President of the Eagle River Improvement Association said that they are particularly concerned with the fate of the existing connector road at Mile 15. The wording of the public notice (reprinted in an advertisement elsewhere in this newspaper) tends to indicate that there will not be any access at this point when the new highway project is completed.

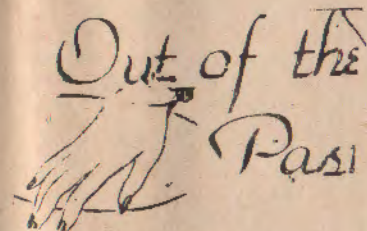
VISITOR INFO STATION IS OPENING

JUNEAU: In response to increased demand, the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife has recently completed a visitor information station on the Kenai National Moose range according to Refuge Manager James Monnie.

The Bureau has jurisdiction over nearly the nearly two million acres which constitutes the Kenai National Moose Range. This large piece of land was established as a National Moose Range in 1941 by Franklin D. Roosevelt. Specifically designated for preservation of moose habitat, the area also supports many other wildlife populations. Through the years recreational use of the scenic country has necessitated facilities for the public.

Members and Residents Welcome

In compliance with Title 23 U.S.C. the State of Alaska Department of Highways has received from the Federal Highway Administration design approval for a proposed highway project on the Glenn Highway between Ft. Richardson and Eagle River. The improvement will consist of the construction of a new roadway adjacent and generally parallel to the present Glenn Highway, resulting in a four lane divided facility. The new roadway will be constructed generally to the northwest of the present roadway. There will be minor adjustments of the present roadway where required by safety standards to meet acceptable criteria for alignments and grade. A full interchange will be constructed at Gate 2 for Fort Richardson and Elmendorf Air Force Base. An interchange will be provided approximately 1,000 feet north of the present intersection

of Hiland Road and Glenn Highway which will provide access to Hiland Road and the south Eagle River Road area. An interchange will be provided in the general vicinity of the present intersection of the New Glenn Highway and Artillery Road which will provide access to the Eagle River community except at Gate 1 at Fort Richardson where a signalized at grade intersection will be provided there WILL BE NO OTHER ACCESS PERMITTED TO THE COMPLETED HIGHWAY FACILITY. 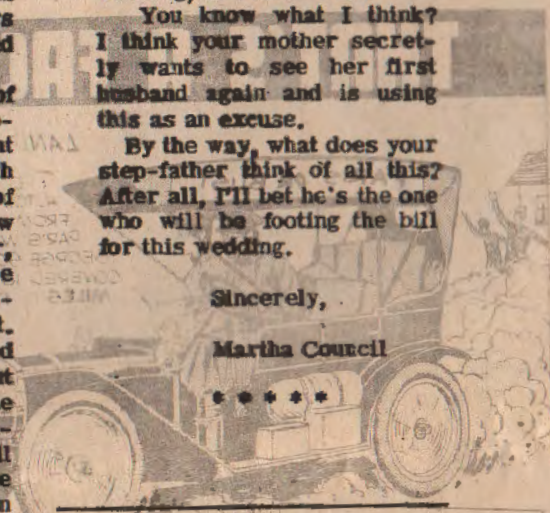

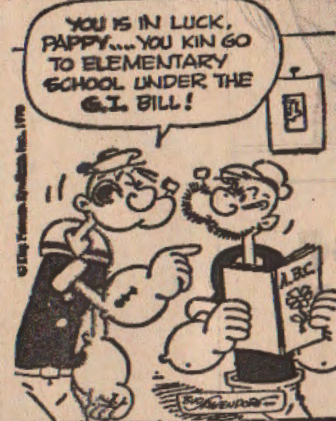

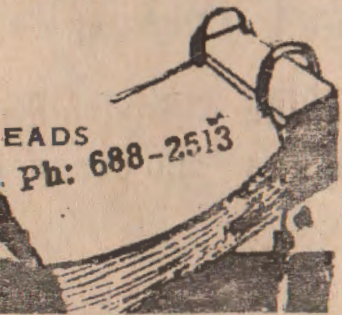

WASH: D.C.: President Nixon has wasted little time in signing the 1973 National Hunting and Fishing proclamation, acting with a swiftness that should provide strong incentive of NHF Day activities throughout the nation.

President Nixon signed the official NHF Day proclamation several weeks earlier than last year's signing, and in so doing reminded all NHF Day organizers that there's no time like the present.

Those sportsmen's clubs and conservation groups who have not yet begun planning for NHF Day activities on Sept. 22, are urged to keep pace with the President and schedule organizational meetings forthwith.

Farsighted organizations like the New York State Conservation Council and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources began their NHF Day plans as early

as January. Still others went to work immediately after last year's successful NHF Day, allowing themselves a full year to plan their 1973 program.

"There is, of course, adequate time remaining for sportsmen's clubs and conservation groups to organize very successful NHF Day affairs," says Warren Page, Secretary of the NHF Day effort and President of the National Shooting Sports Foundation. "We stand ready at NHF Day headquarters to provide any and all assistance that we can. We have a full line of instructional aids to help NHF Day organizers," Mr. Page said. "Our 76-page manual answers nearly every question an organizer could have, and our 30-piece NHF Day aids kit includes all the advertising and promotional materials

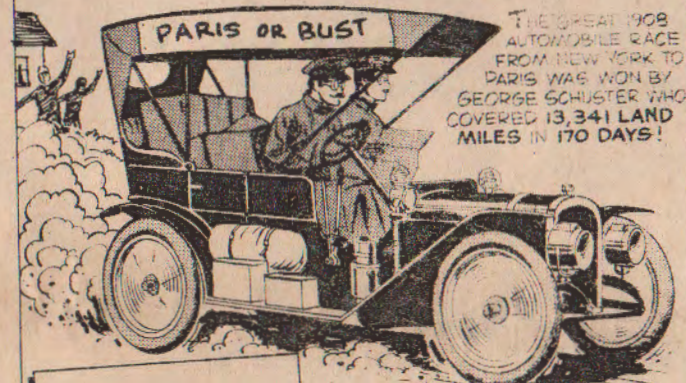
you'll need to get the word out on your activities."

Some 3,000 organizations held NHF Day programs in 1972 with total attendance exceeding 4 million people. The number of programs is anticipated to be far greater in 1973 with total attendance expected to top the 15 million mark. The emphasis this year will be on shopping center and parking lot programs aimed at boosting attendance by the general public. It is expected that typical programs will involve many more people than in 1972.
