YOUTH FOUND DEAD AT FOOT OF CLIFF

BORO REAPPORTIONMENT TO HAVE LITTLE EFFECT ON LOCAL REPRESENTATION

CHUGIAK: The recent vote of the Borough Assembly to reapportion on the basis of registered voters is likely to have little or no effect on the Greater Chugiak Area according to Ed Willis local Borough Assemblyman.

Willis pointed out that at the most a larger portion of the Muldoon area might be added to the local section, but it was unlikely that it could involve a large enough section to effect the chance of a candidate from this area from being elected.

He said that the persons most likely to object to the decision of the Assembly were the residents within

EKLUTNA: The body of a 22 year old Anchorage youth was found last Sunday at the foot of a cliff near the Eklutna River.

Marvin Barton, who had been reported missing by his parents, had apparently plunged to his death, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

The youth has been missing since Sunday, June 23rd when he reportedly wandered away from a picnic he was attending in the Thunderbird Falls area.

His body was discovered on Sunday by a group of hikers in the area.

His death has been tentatively attributed to injuries sustained in the fall pending autopsy, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

most likely to object to the decision of the Assembly were the residents within the city of Anchorage.

Willis pointed out that two separate items had been considered by the Assembly these were the composition of the Assembly and reapportionment. He said the Anchorage news media had lumped both of these matters together, thereby confusing many people.

Willis said the ordinance which would change the composition of the Assembly was an entirely different matter from reapportionment, and would be the subject of a public hearing on July 9th. This ordinance would call for the borough to be divided into eleven election districts. These would include areas within the city of Anchorage, as well as those outside the city and some districts could include portions of the city as well as outside the city depending on the population of registered voters.

Willis said the Assembly based this decision on lawsuit held recently in the Northstar Borough when a Fairbanks judge declared that institutional representation was unconstitutional. He felt that this was unfair to the people outside the cities. Under the new ordinance the voters in the city would elect assemblyman from their districts by direct vote, rather than allowing members of the City Council to decide which of their number would hold the dual title of Assemblyman and Council member.

The matter will be put to the vote of Borough residents at either a special or a regular election, Willis said, and will have to pass both inside and outside the city.

These men are part of a group of 15 who have been trained in the Borough's new paramedic program. The type of service they will offer can best be compared to that seen on the TV program "Emergency", which depicts the experiences of a paramedic team with the Los Angeles Fire Department.

REAPPORTIONMENT BOARD APPEARS FAVORABLE TO WISHES

ANCHORAGE: The reapportionment committee, which held a public hearing in Anchorage last Friday, appeared favorable to the request that the precincts of the Greater Chugiak Area be recombined into the same legislative district.

According to Gerry O'Connor, who was one of a committee appointed to plead the cause of the area, the committee was in agreement with the proposal of the local Chamber of Commerce that the area which had been split by the temporary reapportionment of the State Supreme Court last year be rejoined into one district or another.

There will also be a number of booths, some operated by local youth activity groups and some by the concessionaire.

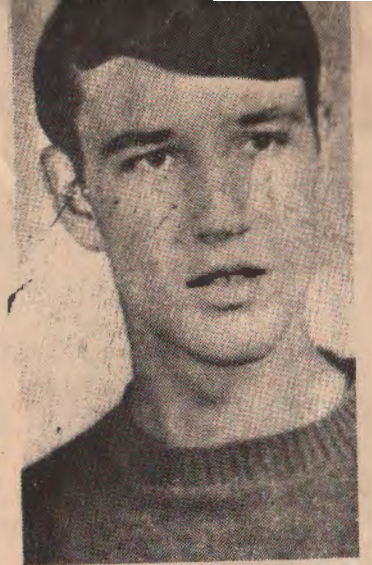
Pepsi Cola will be offering a Free 10 speed bike as a prize. Anyone purchasing a ticket on the rides will get a chance on the bike

insurance under Medicare."

Medicare Medical Insur-
ance helps pay for doctor
bills and many other med-
ical expenses of almost ev-
eryone 65 or over and dis-
abled people under 65 who
have been eligible for
monthly Social Security
Disability payments for two
years or more.

TROOPERS STILL SEEK GAS STATION BANDITS

WASILLA: Alaska State Troopers are still looking for two men who held up a Union 76 Service Station at Mile 47 on the Fairbanks Highway last Wednesday, June 25th.

About \$230 in cash was taken from the attendant on duty at the time.

The hold-up took place at approximately 7:15 in the evening.

The man depicted in the sketch above was described by the attendant as between 5'9" and 6'0" tall, of slender build and in his early 20's. He was carrying a .22 caliber revolver with which he threatened the attendant. He wore a blue jacket and blue jeans and wore a headband.

The second man, who apparently posted himself across the road from the station was carrying a rifle. He was described as having dark frizzy hair and wore a dark shirt. Both suspects were described as white, clean shaven and were not wearing glasses, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

No vehicle was evident, and it was supposed that they had arrived and departed the scene on foot.

The charge was brought on a complaint of the newspaper against Ayers who skipped the state several weeks ago.

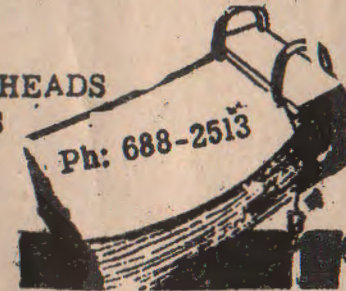
POST OFFICE OCCUPIES NEW QUARTERS: The Eagle River Post Office has moved into new quarters located in the south end of the Shopping Center Building.
