YOUTH FOUND DEAD AT FOOT OF CLIFF

BORO REAPPORTIONMENT TO HAVE LITTLE EFFECT ON LOCAL REPRESENTATATION

CHUGIAK: The recent vote of the Borough Assembly to reapportion on the basis of registered voters is likely to have little or no effect on the Greater Chugiak Area according to Ed Willis local Borough Assemblyman.

Willis pointed out that at the most a larger portion of the Muldoon area might be acced to the local section, but it was unlikely that it could involve a large enough section to effect the chance of a candidate from this area from being elected,

He said that the persons most likely to object to the decision of the Assembly were the residents within

EKLUTNA: The body of a 22 year old Anchorage youth was found last Sundayat the foot of a cliff near the Eklutna River.

Marvin Barton, who had been reported missing by his parents, had apparently plunged to his death, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

The youth has been missing since Sunday, June 23rd when he reportedly wandered away from a picnic he was attending in the Thunderbird Falls area,

His body was discovered on Sunday by a group of hikers in the area.

His death has been tentatively attributed to injuries sustained in the fall pending autopsy, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

Willis pointed out that two seperate items had been considered by the Assembly these were the composition of the Assembly and reapportionment. He said the Anchorage news media had lumped both of these matters together, thereby confusing many people.

Willis said the ordinance which would change the - composition of the Assembly was an entirely different matter from reapportionment, and would be the subject of a public hearing on July 9th. This ordinance would call for the porough to be divided into eleven election districts. These would include areas within the city of Anchorage, as well as those outside the city and some districts could in clude portions of the cit as well as outside the cit; depending on the populatio of registered voters.

Willis said the Assemb based this decision on lawsuit held recently in the Northstar Borough when a Fairbanks judge declared that instutional representation was unconstitutional. He felt that this was unfair to the people outside the cities. Under the new ordinance the voters in the city would elect assemblyman from their districts by direct vote, rather than allowing members of the City Council to donie which of

their number would hold the dual title of Assemblyman and Council member.

The matter will be put to the vote of Borough residents at either a special or a regular election, Willis said, and will have to pass both inside and outside the city.

REAPPORTIONMENT BOARD APPEARS FAVORABLE TO WISHES

ANCHORAGE: The reapportionment committee, which held a public hearing in Anchorage last Friday, appeared favorable to the request that the precincts of the Greater Chugiak Area be recombined into the same legislative district.

According to Gerry O'Conner, who was one of a committee appointed to plead the cause of the area, the committee was in agreement with the proposal of the local Chamber of Commerce that the area which had been split by the temporary reapportionment of the State Supreme Court last year be rejoined into one district or another.

There is one voice that we have also heard, but it has been drowned out by the others.



MEDICARE INCREASE IS HALTED FOR PRICE FREEZE

ANCHORAGE: The nonthly premium for Medicare Medical Insurance, scheduled to be increased in July, has been rolled back in keeping with President Nixon's 60 day Price-Freeze policy, according to Charles J. Brodigan, Social Security District Manager in Anchorage.

"The higher amount will continue to be charged until the premium record for each beneficiary can be corrected," Brodigan said.

"Refunds in full will be made at a later date. This also applice to Railroad Retirement Beneficiaries and Civil Service Annuitants who pay premiums for medical insurance under Medicare."

Medicare Medical Insurance helps pay for doctor bills and many other medical expenses of almost everyone 65 or over and disabled people under 65 who have been eligible for monthly Social Security Disability payments for two years or more.
