## TROOPERS SEEK TWO MEN LAST SEEN WITH DEAD WOMAN

**ANCHORAGE:** Alaska State Troopers are now seeking two men who were reported to have been seen in the company of Linda Sue Miller the day before she was found critically injured in the middle of North Birchwood Road in the early morning hours of July 23 by a passing motorist.

Miss Miller was reportedly seen leaving Eureka Lodge on the Glenn Highway in the company of the two men in a pickup truck with a small aluminum camper on the back.

Miss Miller was taken to the ANS Hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival.

Her death was attributed to a fractured skull and other injuries. She had not been sexually assaulted, accord-

**CHUGIAK:** There is no chance for the completion of the replacement for the Chuglak Elementary School before January 1975 at the earliest. This statement was made to the Knik Arm Courier by William Klingner, of the Anchorage School District.

The school, which is to be constructed on land presently owned by the Chuglak Benefit Association, cannot be constructed until the Bureau of Land Management approves the proposed exchange of CBA land for the land and improvement at the existing grade school site.

The land exchange proposal is now being delayed by the refusal of the BLM to approve the survey and plat which had been prepared for the Greater Anchorage firm of Hewitt V. Lounsbury Associates. The BLM claims that the legal description of the land to be exchanged by CBA does not meet their requirements.

## MTA INCUMBENTS RE-ELECTED TO BOARD


The bike was valued at \$70. No arrest has been made in connection with the theft.



## GEESE AND SWANS ARE TAGGED

**JUNEAU:** Colored collars have been placed on hundreds of geese and swans this summer and the public is urged to report sightings of any tagged birds to the Department of Fish and Game.

Dan Timm, waterfowl biologist for the department, said that more than 300 Canada geese were tagged with white neck collars in Glacier Bay during early July.

"These collars are about four inches wide and have two black letters. The geese may be sighted from Southeastern Alaska to Oregon," Timm said.

He added that yellow neck collars were put on several hundred Canada geese in the Cordova area.

Department of Fish and Game personnel also assisted a team from Johns Hopkins University in putting blue neck collars on trumpeter swans near Cordova.

Federal personnel also tagged swans in the Kenai area. The swan collars have white letters and numbers.

"The color markings is part of several water fowl research studies in Alaska and the public can be of assistance by reporting sightings and collar numbers to the department," Timm said.

## WOMEN CAN ENROLL IN ROTC PROGRAM

**FAIRBANKS:** Women will be officially accepted in the university's officer-training programs for the first time this year, according to Lt. Colonel Lucein Prokopowich, head of the Department of Military Science at the University of Alaska.

"We had seven girls auditing our Reserve Officer Training Corps classes last year", he said, "at the same time that ten colleges in the nation experimented with officially enrolling women in the previously all-male program.

"Women in the program were widely accepted," he said. "In courses, it's done wonders to have the woman's point of view in discussions. It's been like a shot of adrenalin into the classes to eliminate the strictly male environment."

Because of the success of the enrollment of women in the R.O.T.C., any host college desiring to have women as full Corps members may now participate in the program. Females at the University of Alaska will not only receive academic credit in the future, but can also work toward receiving a 2nd lieutenant's commission on graduation.

"We have a four-year program offering one course in military science each semester," said Prokopowich, "but the student is under no obligation to the military until after the sophomore year. For the first two years the courses are strictly electives, and anyone can drop out at any time. If they de-

The first year program consists of "contemporary leadership," in which "the student is forced to ask himself (or herself) questions and come up with some original judgements, and 'land navigation' in the spring which includes two four-hour outdoor exercises in which the class takes part in a timed competition using maps to follow a prescribed course.

In the second year of military science, "leadership skills" courses teach methods of instruction, showing the student how to get up in front of a group for five minutes, fifteen minutes, or an hour. Television video tapes are used so the student can observe himself in front of a group and learn to improve his teaching methods.

"military science no longer consists of endless drill sessions," said Prokopowich. "Drill has its place, but it is optional for our students. We are more interested in teaching leadership than in instilling automatic responses. We discuss race relations, drug abuse, military justice, arms limitations and anything else which might have an impact on today's leader.

"Students have told me that our courses are some of the best on the campus," he continued. "A student majoring in education said our course in teaching methods was the best he ever had. We feel that our program is one of a few that gives the student a personalized critique of his progress over his four years in school. We care about the development of the individual, and we offer both men and women another option when they graduate; not only do they have a college degree in the field of their

Women participating in the ROTC program will not be required to bear arms or participate in marksmanship training, although they may do so if they wish. They may not be married or have dependents, and they are not eligible for flight instruction, airborne training, rafter training, field combat training and training beyond the normal physical strength of women. The length of a woman's hair will not be regulated, but it must be worn up off the shoulders when she is in uniform.

Prokopowich also announced that at the University of Alaska in the future, two credits will be given for each course in military science during the first two years of the program, instead of the one and one half credits as in the past.

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

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

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## HUNT AND BAG LIMITS ARE PUBLISHED

**PALMER:** Classification of the major portion of Game Management Unit 14C into the new Chugach State Park may require some adjustments to sportsmen's hunting schedules, announced Jack Didrickson, area game biologist for the Department of Fish and Game in Palmer.

Opening dates for waterfowl, upland and big game hunting seasons within the park lands, including moose and sheep, have been set back to Sept. 4, a loss of 15 days.

Also new this year is a complete closure of all Eklutna River and Eklutna Lake drainages within Chugach State Park. Didrickson cited state park officials concern with public safety and desire to create viewing areas for park visitors as the chief reasons for the new rules within that area.

Moose seasons will generally be ten days shorter in most accessible areas of the South-central region, with an Aug. 20-Sept. 10 season. Unit 13C will be closed to all moose hunting.

Classification of the major portion of Game Management Unit 14C into the new Chugach State Park may require some adjustments to sportsmen's hunting schedules, announced Jack Didrickson, area game biologist for the Department of Fish and Game stationed in Palmer.

Other new regulations will also curtail some hunting activity in southcentral Alaska generally.

Deer seasons in Unit 6 and 8 are about the same as last year's with the exception of the one deer area along Kodiak's road system, which has been enlarged.

## FINANCIAL AID AVAILABLE FOR EDUCATION

**FAIRBANKS:** Financial aid to persons wishing to continue their education beyond high school will be available during the coming school year in amounts up to approximately \$450 a year.

The money has been appropriated through a federal program called Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, and will not need to be repaid by the students.

On Monday, July 30, Marcus M. Lowthorp, student financial aid program officer for the tenth region of the U.S. Office of Education, conducted a workshop at the University of Alaska describing the new program. Attending were high school and university counselors and others interested in financial aid for students.

"The program this year is only for persons who have not attended an educational institution since high school," said Charles R. Fields, director of financial aid at the University of Alaska, Fairbanks. "Participating in special programs such as Upward Bound will not cause someone to be ineligible, however."

"The purpose of the grants is to encourage people to further their education who otherwise might not be able to afford it," he said.

"There are \$122.1 million available. The amount given to each person depends on the financial situation of the applicant as well as on the cost of attending a particular school. The grants are available for any eligible college, university, vocational school or technical

## INCOME GUIDES FOR FREE LUNCHES ARE TOLD

**JUNEAU:** Income guides for free and reduced price school lunches in Alaska were announced for the coming year by Commissioner of Education Marshall L. Lind.

Under federal legislation, schools are required to serve free meals to all children from families whose income is at or below the applicable family-size income level in the Secretary of Agriculture guidelines.

Any local family falling under the following income levels are eligible for either free or lower-priced school meals, and should notify the Mat-Su Borough school system upon enrolling in the fall.

Guidelines follow, the first figure is the maximum allowable for free lunches, and the second is the highest for reduced price meals.

For a family of one, figures are \$3,300 and \$3,960 per year; for two, it's \$4,430 and \$5,200; three is \$5,370 and \$6,440; four is \$6,330 and \$7,670; five is \$7,340 and \$8,800; and six is \$8,230 and \$9,930.

If a family has seven members, income must be below \$9,140 and \$10,970; eight, \$10,000 and \$12,000; nine, \$10,780 and \$12,920; ten, \$11,540 and \$13,840; 11 \$12,300 and \$14,760; and 12, \$13,060 and \$15,680.

When families are larger than 12 members, each added person raises the maximum level of eligibility by \$760 for free lunches and \$920 for reduced price lunches.
