SUICIDE ATTEMPTED 'I N EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: The victim of an attempted suicide was transported to the ANS Hospital last week, on August 28 by Rescue II from the Eagle River Fire Station.

The man, Terry Schneider age 23, of Anchorage was taken from a home at No. 30 Caribou Street in the Eagle River Heights subdivision.

He was reported to be suffering from an overdose of medication in addition to having attempted to cut his wrists. wao for the opening day of school.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Tracie Lyons, of Colville Street in Eagle River, had turned in front of a 1972 Saab, which was being driven by Carl J. Fernald of Mile 35 Old Glenn Highway.

The youth was thrown from the 1970 Yamaha he was riding, and sustained an apparent broken neck from the accident.

He was transported to the 5040th AIr Force Hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company ambulance.

Early reports had it that the youth was paralized, however, later unconfirmed word was that any paralysis was temporary and appeared to be wearing off.

No citations were issued by the Alaska State Troopers.

HIGH SCHOOLS TO OFFER EVENING CLASSES

ANCHORAGE: High School courses will be offered evenings and Saturdays for persons who are out of school or wish to supplement their regular high school classes this fall.

The program, started last February as a pilot plan, has been expanded to 34 courses because of high public interest, according to Catherine Davis, newly appointed coordinator for the alternative program.

"The purpose of Anchorage Evening High School is to serve out-of-school youth who have not completed high school (Dropouts) and to give additional offerings to students currently in high school," said Mrs. Davis.

The courses will be offered at West and Chugiak high schools, Clark Junior High and the auto mechanic career center. They are open to students from ninth grade through age

The courses are free to Anchorage Borough resident students. Sydents now in high school mu:, have their principal signatures to enroll in the night classes, Mrs. Davis said.

Courses are divided into three areas. Mrs. Davis describes these divisions as basic classes, such as social studies, math and science; job entry skill courses, including auto mechanics, office practice and typing, and special nterest courses, such as thotography, human relations

Classes will be available either Monday and Wednesday and Thursday from 7 to 9:30 p.m., and on Saturday from 9 a.m. 2:30 p.m. Some courses will also be offered weekdays from 2:30 to 5 p.m.

The evening courses will begin Sept. 10 with registration being held Sept. 4 - 8 at the school district administration building, 670 Fireweed Lane.

Weekday registration hours will be from 3 to 5 p.m., and from 7 to 9 p.m. Saturday registration hours are from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.





A REMINDER TO TAX PAYERS

ANCHORAGE: Taxpayers are reminded that their local IRS office is the place to inquire if they have a tax question or need help with a tax problem.

Charles E. Roddy, the Anchorage District Director IRS stated that hundreds of taxpayers call the Ogden Servi Center for Informatton and assistance that is available at their local office of the Internal Revenue Service.

"We have reports of taxpayers who drive hundreds. of miles to seek help from the Service Center staff.

Actually, the Service Centers have no means to service taxpavers since their sole dnty is to computerprocess tax returns and make this information available to local IRS offices.

Even our smallest offices have access to all the information on file in the Service Centers' computer.

With this information IRS is able to answer the tawpayer's question or initiate the action necessary to resolve the problem,"

"So, anyone with a tax problem or in need of an answer to a tax questtion is asked to call us. We're in the telephone book in the white pages under U.S. Government, Treasury Department, Internal Revenue Ser-

The afternoon program is also scheduled to deal with academic matters, programs offered and resources wailable, how to choose a major, tutoring and learning laboratories, dropping and adding classes.

GOOD NEWS FOR DUCK HUNTERS!

and Game Biologists have Canadian geese and the recently flown water fowl surveys in Cook Inlet revealing good numbers of ducks and some geese on a majority of the marshes.

In normal years early season surveys reveal 10,000-15,000 waterfowl; this vear's survey indicates at leas: 20,000 birds to be using the Cook Inlet marshes.

Waterfowl numbers in the Cook Inlet area normally build up towards October with the highest concentrations occurring just before freeze-up in mid-October. When temperatures drop the mass migration usually takes place in a hurry with most of the waterfowl leaving the inlet area within 12-24 hours. They usually stop at the Copper River Delta near Cordova, but sometimes fly nonstop to British Columbia, Washington and Oregon, then later to California and Mexico.

The Canadian Provinces where 80 per cent of the lower 48 state's waterfowl are produced, lacked suffcient water this year to keep all their waterfowl happy. Alaska had excellent conditions which in turn, attracted higher than normal numbers of pintail. literally thousands of displaced Canadian bound ducks nested in Alaska this year. This explains the higher than normal numbers of ducks

Susitna Flats to have good to excellent numbers of ducks and some Canadian geese: the Big Susitna Flats including ANCHORAGE: Good news Stump Lake had good numbers for duck hunters this year, of ducks and some geese Alaska Department of Fiah including white-fronted and Chickaloon Flats had excellent numbers of ducks and some Canadian geese.

> Duck hunters don't forget that to comply with state and federal regulations you must have a signed federal duck stamp and have a valid Alaska hunting license. You can use shotguns only and they must be plugged to hold no more than two shells in the magazine. Waterfowl may be plucked in the field but one fully weathered wing must remain attached to the bird until you reach home. Shooting begins no earlier than 1/2 hour before sunrise and stops at sunset. These times are 5:21 a.m. and 8:07 p.m. on opening day in Cook Inlet. The daily duck limit is six with no more than 18 after at least three days of hun-

This year's duck season promises to be a good one so remember to keep your face hidden, don't snoot until you can see their eyes and feet and leave some for next year. Good hunting.




