HIGH SCHOOLS TO OFFER EVENING CLASSES

ANCHORAGE: High School courses will be offered evenings and Saturdays for persons who are out of school or wish to supplement their regular high school classes this fall.

The program, started last February as a pilot plan, has been expanded to 34 courses because of high public interest, according to Catherine Davis, newly appointed coordinator for the alternative program.

"The purpose of Anchorage Evening High School is to serve out-of-school youth who have not completed high school (Dropouts) and to give additional offerings to students currently in high school," said Mrs. Davis.

The courses will be offered at West and Chugiak high schools, Clark Junior High and the auto mechanic career center. They are open to students from ninth grade through age 19.

The courses are free to Anchorage Borough resident students. Students now in high school must have their principal signatures to enroll in the night classes, Mrs. Davis said.

Courses are divided into three areas. Mrs. Davis describes these divisions as basic classes, such as social studies, math and science; job entry skill courses, including auto mechanics, office practice and typing, and special interest courses, such as photography, human relations and child development.

Classes will be available either Monday and Wednesday and Thursday from 7 to 9:30 p.m., and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Some courses will also be offered weekdays from 2:30 to 5 p.m.

The evening courses will begin Sept. 10 with registration being held Sept. 4 - 8 at the school district administration building, 670 Fireweed Lane.

Weekday registration hours will be from 3 to 5 p.m., and from 7 to 9 p.m. Saturday registration hours are from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

COPPER RIVER BISON HUNT OPENS OCT 16.

JUNEAU: The middle Copper River area will be open to bison hunting this fall beginning October 16, for the taking of about 15 bison, says Ronald J. Somerville, 3 regional game supervisor of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game in Anchorage.

All hunters are required to check in and out through the Department of Fish and Game check station at the Gulkana Airport.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. October 15, Somerville said. Hunters who killed a bison during or after 1971 will be ineligible for the hunt. Nonresident hunters must possess a nonresident hunting license and a bison tag.

Registering hunters will be issued a specimen collecting kit. All successful hunters will be required to retrieve the lower jaw or front teeth and a blood sample from their bison.

The hunt will extend from October 16 to 26 unless the allowable harvest of 15 animals is taken prior to the closing date. In that event, the season will be closed earlier by field announcement.

All hunters will be required to have a transistor radio in camp on or their person, Somerville said. Bison hunters must listed to radio station KCAM in Glennallen (790 on the radio dial) at 12:00 noon, 12:30pm and again at 8:00pm and 8:30pm for news of the closure of the bison season.

All successful hunters must report their kills to the check station within 24 hours.

sole duty is to computer-
process tax returns and
make this information av-
ailable to local IRS offices.

Even our smallest offices
have access to all the infor-
mation on file in the Serv-
ice Centers' computer.

With this information IRS
is able to answer the tax-
payer's question or initiate
the action necessary to re-
solve the problem."

"So, anyone with a tax
problem or in need of an an-
swer to a tax question is
asked to call us. We're in
the telephone book in the
white pages under U.S. Gov-
ernment, Treasury Depart-
ment, Internal Revenue Ser-
vice.

GOOD NEWS FOR DUCK HUNTERS!

ANCHORAGE: Good news for duck hunters this year.

Alaska Department of Fish and Game Biologists have recently flown water fowl surveys in Cook Inlet revealing good numbers of ducks and some geese on a majority of the marshes.

In normal years early season surveys reveal 10,000-15,000 waterfowl; this year's survey indicates at least 20,000 birds to be using the Cook Inlet marshes.

Waterfowl numbers in the Cook Inlet area normally build up towards October with the highest concentrations occurring just before freeze-up in mid-October. When temperatures drop the mass migration usually takes place in a hurry with most of the waterfowl leaving the inlet area within 12-24 hours. They usually stop at the Copper River Delta near Cordova, but sometimes fly nonstop to British Columbia, Washington and Oregon, then later to California and Mexico.

The Canadian Provinces where 80 per cent of the lower 48 state's waterfowl are produced, lacked sufficient water this year to keep all their waterfowl happy. Alaska had excellent conditions which in turn, attracted higher than normal numbers of pintail.

Surveys of the areas which can only be reached by air plane and boat revealed Little

Susitna Flats to have good to excellent numbers of ducks and some Canadian geese; the Big Susitna Flats including Stump Lake had good numbers of ducks and some geese including white-fronted and Canadian geese and the Chickaloon Flats had excellent numbers of ducks and some Canadian geese.

Duck hunters don't forget that to comply with state and federal regulations you must have a signed federal duck stamp and have a valid Alaska hunting license. You can use shotguns only and they must be plugged to hold no more than two shells in the magazine.

Waterfowl may be plucked in the field but one fully weathered wing must remain attached to the bird until you reach home. Shooting begins no earlier than 1/2 hour before sunrise and stops at sunset. These times are 5:21 a.m. and 8:07 p.m. on opening day in Cook Inlet. The daily duck limit is six with no more than 18 after at least three days of hunting.

This year's duck season promises to be a good one so remember to keep your face hidden, don't snoot until you can see their eyes and feet and leave some for next year. Good hunting.

Completed examination forms must be filed before practice for any interscholastic sport. Any physical taken after July 1st is valid for the 1973-74 school year.

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
